Randy Giese, KHS Senior, Edmund Socha Killed in Head-On Crash

A Kewaskum High School senior, who was to graduate at commencement exercises tonight (Friday), and a rural Kewaskum man became Washington County's sixth and seventh traffic fatalities in a head-on crash Sunday night.

Randall S. Giese, 18, of 1126 Roseland Drive, Kewaskum, and Edmund F. Socha, 33, of R. 2, Kewaskum, residing in the Johnson Trailer Court, were killed in the crash at 10:45 p. m. on a curving section of U. S. Hwy. 45, just south of the Village of Kewaskum.

Both men were pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, where they were taken by the rescue squad of the Kewaskum Fire Department.

According to the sheriff's department report, Giese was headed northbound on Hwy. 45 and for some unknown reason drove on the right shoulder of the road for some distance. His car then went back into the northbound lane and skidded some 82 feet, crossing over into the southbound lane. Giese's car struck the southbound auto driven by Socha head-on and both cars were demolished. Both of the fatally injured drivers were alone in their cars.

Socha was on his way to work in the tool and die department at the Kieckhafer Corp. in Cedarburg when the mishap occurred. Giese was on his way home. The accident was the first dual fatality in the county in 1973.

Randall Scott Giese, 18, was the son of Walter and Betty Ann Prost Giese. He was born Feb. 23, 1955 at West Bend and was a lifetime resident of Kewaskum. Randy was a student at Kewaskum High School and would have graduated with the Class of 1973 tonight, June 8. He was also employed at Regal Ware, Inc. for the past three months.

Randy was a member of St. Lucas Lutheran Church in Kewaskum and the Young People's Society, and was an usher and candle lighter at the church.

Surviving are his parents, one brother, James W. Giese, and his wife Maye of Kewaskum; one sister, Cheryl Lynn (Mrs. Thomas McElhatton) of Kewaskum; his grandmother, Mrs. Alice Giese, of R. 2, Kewaskum; aunts, uncles, cousins, and many other relatives and friends.

Visitation was at Miller's Funeral Home from 2:30 p. m. (Continued on page 2)

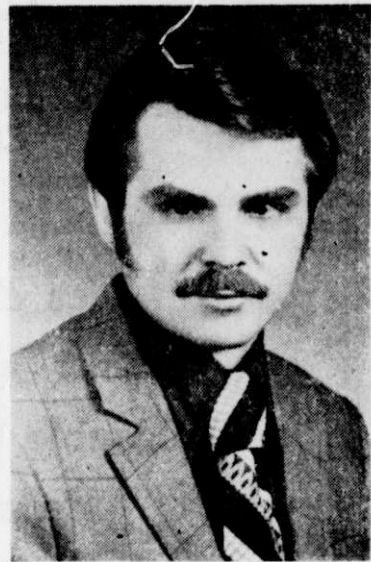
Dr. Schlamer Receives Degree

Board Opens Bids for Waste Disposal, Ambulance, Mower; Take No Action

Bids were opened for solid waste disposal in the Village of Kewaskum by commercial firms, for an ambulance and for a power mower during Monday night's meeting of the Village Board. No action was taken on any.

Board members are seeking the most economical and best way to dispose of refuse following the Feb. 28 closing down of the village incinerator on orders of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

During the month of March, on a trial basis, solid waste was picked up and hauled by village workers to a sanitary landfill site near Slinger. Since then, also on a trial basis, village crews are collecting and hauling to a landfill site near Lomira, which is a shorter run.

Records of what it costs the village to dispose of its refuse in these ways are being kept and will be compared to what it would cost to have the whole job done by a commercial firm, based on their respective bids, before the board reaches a decision on a permanent disposal plan.

Ambulance bids were received from four firms ranging from \$13,163 to \$14,758 for new vehicles. There were also alternate bids of \$13,000 and \$13,795 for demonstrator models. All were turned over to Fire Chief Armin Oppermann and his committee for study and recommendation.

The volunteer fire department provides the rescue squad and ambulance service and the vehicle will be bought with fire department funds with the aid of a \$6,200 federal grant. Four bids on a power mower ranging from \$868.35 to \$1,300, plus trade-in, were referred to the public works committee for recommendation.

The board voted to reject all bids taken May 7 on phosphate removal from sewage effluent, and on enclosure to house the equipment, because of the limited number of bids received and the spread, cost-wise, between them. Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers, were instructed to re-design and re-advertise for bids. The village is under orders of the DNR to remove phosphate from the effluent.

Village Commissioner William Martin was granted permission to attend the League of Municipalities clerk's conference at Burlington June 26-29. Building permits were approved for two homes to be built by Wimmer-Blatter, Milwaukee, in Bel-Ric Acres.

At the suggestion of Trustee Daniel Schmidt, the board voted to send letters to Gervase Hephner, our representative to the State Assembly and to State Senator Thomas Petri, stating that the village board is opposed to the Milwaukee Metropolitan Road Tax as proposed by Milwaukee Mayor Henry Maier. The proposed tax would be as-

49 Beginners Register for Swim Lessons

Due to the unexpected number of beginners registered for swimming lessons at the Kewaskum beach, the program previously outlined will be changed to accommodate three beginning groups.

Forty-nine beginners ranging from the ages of five to 12 will be separated into groups according to age. Seventeen 8 - 13 year olds registered in the advanced beginner class, and two registered in the intermediate class.

A revised list of times for the classes will be published next week. Sign-up for the second session is July 3 at the river.

Parents of swimming students are asked to cooperate with the program by making sure their children are on time for their lessons. Before and after the lessons parents are responsible for their children's whereabouts and behavior.

If a child cannot make it to his lesson because of poor health, or if the weather hinders a majority of the lessons, fees will be refunded.

Because weather conditions and water conditions are unpredictable, the cooperation of students and parents is essential to operating the lesson and beach program until a safer and more complete swimming facility is built.

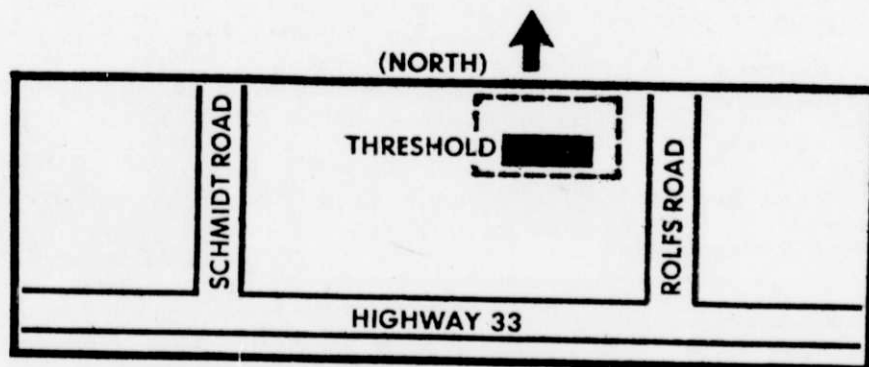

Requirements would include a business background as other duties would include some responsibility for budgeting and managing of non-educational portions of the budget. Salary was left open. The board also continued its review of the proposed 1973-74 budget.

In other business, the board agreed to supplement funds raised by the Beechwood PTO for the purchase of an intercom system for the Beechwood School. The PTO had raised \$450.00 and needed \$167.53 to complete the system.

Graef and Van der Jagt were approved to do the annual school audit. They have also done the audit the previous two years.

Miss Mary Lehman, a graduate of Oshkosh State University, was approved as elementary school librarian for next year. This will be her first year of teaching.

A special board meeting was held Monday, June 4, at 8 p. m. to open building proposals. Since the proposals include design and building costs and specifications, they will require extensive review. No action was taken at the meeting except to open the proposals, review gross costs, and acknowledge receipt of the proposals. Committees will be formed to review proposals for educational function and building quality. It is hoped that a decision can be reached by late June, so that construction can begin as soon as possible.

Knop hit a perfect 3 for 3 for West Bend, including his homer in the 2nd. He batted in 4 runs. Eggert had 3 RBI's on his homer, a walk forcing in a run and a sacrifice fly. Mueller, Jazak and Falkner all got 2 hits.

The Indian JV's were also defeated 5-1. They played to a 2-2 tie until the final 2 innings when West Bend scored 3 runs. Kewaskum scored their 2 in the 3rd frame, in which they got their only 2 hits by Rohlinger and Koepke. Winning pitcher was Al Bird and the loser was Koepke. It was also the Indian JV's opener.
