The Kewaskum FFA Chapter was represented at the FFA State Convention at Green Lake by delegates Steve Ebert, Vice President Henry Haack, Secretary Anita Czerwonka and Tom Schoofs. The chapter received a plaque for the area BOAC program. The letters stand for Build Our American Communities. The chapter was cited for work in conservation and community activities. Kewaskum also received the Superior Chapter award.

Five senior members received the Wisconsin Farmer degree. This is the highest degree at the state level and is limited to the top 2% of the boys with emphasis on leadership, project work and coop activities. ## 3 Students Attend Badger Girls State

Patricia Roe, 9240 Werner Dr., Mary Schowalter, 1036 Hillside Dr., and Robin Bier, R. 2, Kewaskum, were among the 537 high school girls from throughout Wisconsin taking part in the 30th session of Badger Girls State June 10-16 on the University of Wisconsin campus in Madison.

Miss Schowalter was elected Alderman, Ward 2, Elm City at Badger Girls State.

Co-sponsored by the Wisconsin American Legion Auxiliary and University Extension Institute of Governmental Affairs, the girls spend the week learning about government on city, county and state levels in a program designed to prepare them for their future responsibilities as citizens. The girls, all seniors-to-be in Wisconsin high schools, were selected by school officials on the basis of leadership, scholarship and character. Each is sponsored by the Legion Auxiliary or a civic group in her home town.

During the week the girls hold mock elections, organize city, county and state governments, conduct campaigns and attend lectures on various phases of government. A high point of the week is the legislative session at the State Capitol where the girls who are elected senators and assemblymen enact laws and send them to their governor and other executive officials.

Refuse disposal was again discussed by the Village Board Thursday evening, this time with a member of the commercial firm that submitted the low bid on June 4. Again, the board came to no decision.

Village trustees have been trying to decide if village workers should continue hauling to an out-of-town sanitary landfill site or whether a contract should be entered into with a commercial disposal firm.

Appearing at the adjourned session, at board request, was a representative of the A-1 Disposal Service, Inc. of Germantown. Its base bid for refuse pick-up and disposal, excluding industrial firms, was \$1,090 per month. The bid holds for 120 days, the firm member said.

When asked why his bid was about \$200 less than one he submitted last year, he said he would "like to get my foot in the door;" and he would like to come in on a 60 to 90 day trial basis to find out exactly what his costs would be. He would then be in a better position to make a proposal, he said. "I would like to set up a five-year program with you," he told the board.

Salaries for swimming beach personnel were set by board action. Misses Debbie Behnke and Debbie Rumsey will each be paid \$250 per month for a 40-hour week. Miss Nancy Backhaus will receive \$200 per month for slightly less than a 40-hour week. They will serve as swimming instructors. For part-time work on week-ends Richard Butz and Miss Cathy Ahl will be paid \$1.70 per hour. Elmer Yoost was appointed to serve as a member of the village board of review.

An art program to be associated with the summer recreation program was approved on a trial basis. Known as "Kewaskum Art Works," it will be directed by Daniel Meilahn. At a recent appearance before the board, he said its purpose is to improve and beautify the village, and will probably include projects such as decorating beach equipment, painting a mural on the baseball grandstand, decorating village-owned vehicles. He mentioned the garbage truck, in particular.

After being referred to committee for recommendation, it was voted to try the program for three weeks, meanwhile taking pictures of what the students are doing. After trial, it can be continued or dropped. Meilahn offered the program for \$250, which amount will be pro-rated if the program is dropped. He will be an art intern in Racine schools this fall.

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## Indians Lose 2 Out of 3 Games, Drop From Lead

After winning 4 straight games and sharing the Scenic Moraine lead with Hartland, the Kewaskum Indians dropped their next 2 in action the past week.

The Indians notched their 4th in a row over Pewaukee last Thursday night, 4-3. Most of the scoring came in the first inning. Pewaukee jumped off to a 2-0 lead in the first of the inning but Kewaskum came right back with 3 in the bottom half to go ahead, 3-2. Gary Marx, who later got 3 straight hits, led off with a walk. Scott Koth singled and Jim Gaffke's grounder sent home the first run. Mike Koepke's single made it 2-0. Koepke stole 2nd and went to 3rd on a throwing error, then scored the 3rd run on the 1st of Steve Spoerl's 2 singles. The Indians made it 4-2 with a hit in the 5th. Then Hansen hit a long homer for the Pirates in the 6th to make it 4-3 but this ended the scoring. Gaffke, giving up 6 hits, striking out 6 and walking 1. Murphy was the loser.

Kewaskum's streak came to an end at Grafton Monday when they were bumped 5-1. The In-

dians scored in the very first inning on a walk to Jeff Ketter and back to back singles by Gaffke and Mike Koepke. That was it, however, as the Black-hawks' pitching got tough and allowed only 2 more runners to reach 2nd base. Grafton scored 1 in the 1st, 1 in the 3rd and 3 in the 4th for its winning margin. Losing pitcher Scott Koth didn't do bad, striking out 10 and walking just 1. But after giving up unearned runs in the 1st and 3rd, he had 1 bad inning, the 4th, in which 3 runs crossed the plate on 4 hits and an error. Grafton got 7 hits and Kewaskum 4. The loss dropped the Indians to 2nd place, a game behind unbeaten Hartland.

Tuesday night Hartland and Kewaskum met headon here for first place and the Indians were nosed out again 3-2 in a toughie that put unbeaten Arrowhead alone in first place. A

win would have given the Indians a tie for the lead. Hartland took a 1-0 lead in the 3rd on 3 successive singles and made it 3-0 in the 5th on 2 singles and a walk, followed by Dave Soch's bases loaded single. Kewaskum didn't have a run or hit for the first 5 innings until Marx, losing pitcher, led off the 6th with a triple. Koth walked and when the catcher couldn't find the ball he went to 2nd, putting runners on 2nd and 3rd with nobody out. Pitcher Daley got Ketter and Gaffke but Kewaskum scored 2 runs to 3rd went through. The Indians had a good shot at tying it up in the 7th but a perfect throw from the outfield to the plate cut down the tying run. Koepke singled and when the pitcher threw high to 2nd on Donath's bunt, both runners were safe. Marx's long fly moved the runners to

2nd and 3rd. Koth sent another high fly to left and it appeared the game would be tied up. Koepke raced in from 3rd after the catch but a fine throw cut him down at the plate. The Indians are now 4-2.

Thursday the Indians were scheduled at Slinger, Monday they travel to Kettle Moraine, Tuesday to Mayville, and next Thursday Germantown comes here.
