School Board Approves \$2.3 Million Budget, Agrees on Building Firm

Following three meetings of discussion, the Board of Education approved a budget Monday evening for presentation to the annual meeting. The budget calls for expenditures next year of approximately \$2,360,554.00. This compares with a 1972-73 budget of \$2,200,000.00. The new budget includes \$47,300.00 to pay off the Beechwood note, and approximately \$139,000 on the note issue for the new buildings. Last year's budget figure included \$139,000 in expenditures for the addition at the high school building. Thus expenditures excluding buildings and debt service will be up approximately \$120,000 under the proposed budget. Included in this figure is the addition of four new staff members for next year.

Because the state legislature has not yet acted, the receipt section of the budget is uncertain. If there is no change in the state formula, aids to the district would decrease by nearly \$70,000, and would call for a local tax rate of about 20.3 mills. Various aid plans have been proposed, one of which would result in a local rate of about 15 mills. Thus the situation at present is that, depending on state action, the local tax rate for next year could vary anywhere between 15 mills and slightly over 20 mills.

Following interviews last week with three firms concerning their building proposals, the board voted Monday evening not to conduct any further interviews. Interviews had been held with Bray, Cravillon & Zeiner of Sheboygan, Metal Structures of Oconomowoc and Thern Associates of Oshkosh. The board decided to continue its negotiations with Thern Associates of Oshkosh, with the intent of agreeing to a contract for all projects.

Approval was given for purchasing a Saxon copy machine for the central office and for proceeding with the low bid on remodeling the former central office area at the high school for science purposes. The agenda for the annual meeting was approved.

An easement was granted General Telephone to bury telephone cables in the Kewaskum Elementary School parking lot, provided they return the lot to equal or better condition than it is presently.

A diploma was granted to Mrs. Florence Faber Kutz, who attended Kewaskum High School a number of years ago. She has finished work qualifying her for a diploma.

Beach Crowded On Opening Days

The Kewaskum village beach officially opened Monday, June 18. As the weather was warm and humid Monday through Wednesday, and the water temperature reasonable, lesson turn-out was good. The two morning classes of advanced beginners were combined to make a slightly larger class, but also allowed more time for the class. Twelve students are enrolled in the advanced beginner class (out of nearly 20 that registered earlier in June).

The beginner classes in the afternoon were larger, with 18 students in the older class, 14 in the seven year old class, and 13 in the 5 and 6 year old class. As the water became colder on Wednesday and Thursday, little noses were becoming very hesitant about dipping into the water. A few students became easily discouraged due to water temperature, river bottom conditions, and the murkiness of the water.

The crowded beach on the first three days was attended by one lifeguard and two instructors during lesson hours. A young girl was rescued by Nancy Backhaus on Monday afternoon during lesson hours.

Water and air temperatures decreased Friday, causing lessons to be cancelled. However, a lifeguard was on duty to watch the few swimmers that did come.

Weekend hours were not followed exactly, as air and water temperatures on Saturday kept many swimmers away. The beach closed Saturday afternoon due to a late afternoon hailstorm. Sunday afternoon the water was extremely muddy and cold from the heavy rains; however, a lifeguard was on duty to watch the few swimmers.

New facilities and freshly painted equipment add much to the beach and park area.

Tree Limb Falls Over Car in Storm

Annual Firemen's Picnic on Sunday, July 8, in Park

The annual Kewaskum Firemen's Picnic will be held in the village park on Sunday, July 8, and plans have been completed to make this year's event another outstanding one.

An excellent parade at 12:30 p. m. sharp will highlight and get the picnic underway. Musical units featured in the parade will include the Marquis Drum and Bugle Corps of Fond du Lac, Majestics of Marquette, Mich., award winning Windjammers of Port Washington, Racine Scouts Drum and Bugle Corps, Kewaskum High School Band, plus other bands, drum and bugle corps and musical organizations. Other units will include drill teams, beautiful floats, baton twirlers, children's specialties, visiting firemen and equipment, Legionnaires, comic entries, ancient cars, riding horses, clubs, organizations, and many more.

Hundreds of persons will participate in the parade, which will last for approximately one hour. The parade will form at the high school athletic field and parking lot, and adjacent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All participants should be present to line up at noon. People wishing to enter the parade should contact Bob Staehler, parade chairman, or call 626-2329. Theme of the parade this year will be "Cartoon Capers." The fire department invites all area businessmen and others to enter a float in the parade. It is recommended that the maximum height of any float entered be kept under 15 feet.

Prizes will be awarded for floats as follows: 1st place, \$100; 2nd, \$60; 3rd, \$40; 4th, \$20. There will be the children's specialties section for children 12 and under with prizes awarded as follows: 1st, \$12; 2nd, \$8; 3rd, \$6; 4th, \$4; 5th, \$2.

Immediately following the parade there will be exhibitions by drum and bugle corps in the park. From then on there will be continuous music and entertainment throughout the afternoon and evening. Live music will be supplied on the stage and in the popular beer garden by Two Hits and a Miss and The Countrymen. Admission will be free to the newly blacktopped beer garden at the south end of the park.

Adding to the festivities there will be kiddie rides, concessions, games and refreshments, including tasty brats and hamburgers. Tickets are available for ninety-one valuable merchandise prizes which will be awarded in conjunction with the picnic, winners of which will be announced at a later date.

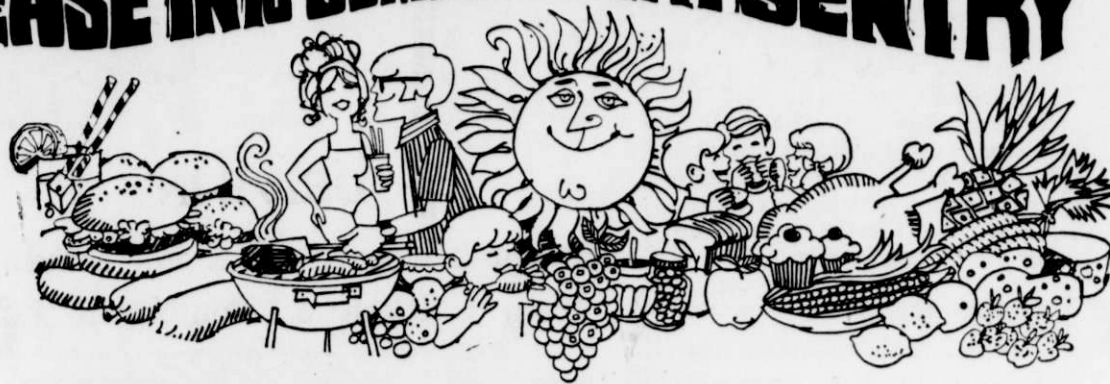

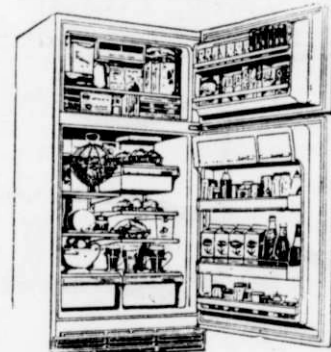
