



Kewaskum Defeats Barton in Lakes, 5-4

In a Land o' Lakes home game Sunday, Kewaskum overcame a 4-0 deficit to defeat Barton, 5-4. The winners scored 3 runs in the 5th inning to make it 4-3 and pushed over 2 more in the 7th for the winning margin.

Dave Roell of Barton was coasting along with a one-hit shutout in the 5th inning when one of his pitches got away and struck Kewaskum's first baseman, Dan Marx, in the face. Marx was taken to the hospital, where 12 stitches were taken to close the wound, and then released. This upset Roell and he gave up 3 runs in the inning. He then gave up the 2 winning runs in the 7th.

Tom Theusch went the route for Kewaskum and hurled a good game. He allowed but 5 hits, struck out 11 and walked 4. Kewaskum collected 7 hits off Roell and Pruett, each of whom struck out 2. Tom Bartelt got 2 hits for Kewaskum and Hetebreug collected a double for Barton.

Kewaskum now is 2-3 in the Lakes League and 0-2 in the Tri-County Nite loop.



Indians Lose 2, Lead Mayville When Rain Hits

After winning their first 4 games, the Kewaskum Indians extended their losing streak to 4 in a row the past week, but were leading Mayville by 4 runs Tuesday night when rain halted the game after 4 innings.

In their first of 3 games away last Thursday night at Slinger, Kewaskum was shaded 1-0 in a tight pitcher's battle between Scott Koth of the Indians and the Owls' Lee Wagner. It was the 2nd straight loss by 1 run for the slumping Indians. The Owls, lone run came in the 5th inning on 3 singles. They also threatened in the 4th with 2 on with 0 outs but Koth got the next 3 batters. Jim Gaffke was the only Kewaskum runner to reach 3rd base on a single and an error. There was only 1 out but he was stranded there. In 2 other innings the Indians had runners on 1st and 2nd but couldn't score them. Koth struck out 9 and walked 1, while Wagner fanned 7 and passed 1. Both teams had 7 hits. Gaffke and Gary Marx each had 2 hits for the losers.

Monday night at Kettle Moraine the contest was far from close as the Indians were set down 10-1 on a no-hitter by Pat Houck. In losing their last 4 games, Kewaskum scored only 4 runs as their bats were very quiet. Houck faced only 22 batters in the 7 innings but missed out on a shutout in the 5th when Steve Spoerl reached 1st on an error and moved around the bases on a passed ball and 2 wild pitches. Except for Spoerl, Houck set the Indians down in order in every other inning. Gary Marx started for the losers, struck out the side in the 1st inning and got them out in order in the 2nd. Then the roof fell in as the Lasers scored 5 runs in the 3rd on a single, 2 safe bunts, another single and a 3-run triple by John Smart. who had 5 RBI's in the game. Kettle Moraine added 5 more runs in the 4th.

The Indians finally regained their batting eyes at Mayville Tuesday night and were leading 8-4 when rain halted the game after 4 innings. The contest will have to be made up later. It was the 2nd time that rain halted a Kewaskum-Mayville tilt. In the first contest here the Indians were ahead 13-0 when the rains came after 5 innings, enough for a complete game. Kewaskum has really feasted on Mayville pitching, scoring 21 runs in 9 innings in the 2 games. The Indians again were held scoreless in the first 3 innings but really broke loose with 8 runs in the 4th, in which they lashed out 7 hits, to overcome a 4-0 Cardinal lead. Dennis Toellner hit a homer for the Cards.
