Annual Firemen's Picnic and Parade Here Sunday, July 8

All is in readiness for the annual Kewaskum Firemen's Picnic and Parade to be held this Sunday, July 8. The event will be held in the village park and should be another outstanding one.

An excellent parade at 12:30 p.m. sharp will highlight and the picnic underway. Musical units featured in the parade include the Marquis Drum and Bugle Corps of Fond du Lac, Majestics of Marquette, the award winning Windchime Scouts Drum and Bugle Corps, Kewaskum High School Band, plus other bands, drum and bugle corps and musical organizations. Other units will include drill teams, beautiful baton twirlers, children's societies, visiting firemen and Legionnaires, comic clubs, organizations, and more.

Hundreds of persons will participate in the parade, which will last for approximately one hour. The parade will form at the high school athletic field parking lot, and adjacent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All participants should be present to line up at 11:00 a.m. People wishing to participate in the parade should contact Staeher, parade chairman, at 626-2329. Theme of the parade this year will be "Car-Capers." The fire department invites all area business and others to enter a float in the parade. It is recommended that the maximum height of a float entered be kept under 12 feet.

Prizes will be awarded for floats as follows: 1st place, \$100; 2nd, \$60; 3rd, \$40; 4th, \$20. There will be the children's special section for children 12 and under with prizes awarded as follows: 1st, \$12; 2nd, \$8; 3rd, \$4; 4th, \$2.

Immediately following the parade there will be exhibitions of drum and bugle corps in the Village of Kewaskum. From then on there will be continuous music and entertainment throughout the afternoon and evening. Live music will be supplied on the stage in the popular beer garden. Two Hits and a Miss and The Firemen. Admission will be \$1.00 to the newly blacktopped garden at the south end of the park.

In addition to the festivities there will be kiddie rides, concessions, and refreshments, including hot brats and hamburgers. Prizes are available for ninety valuable merchandise prizes which will be awarded in conjunction with the picnic, winners of which will be announced at a later date.

Mark Kujawski Dies of Injuries In Cycle Crash

Mark Kujawski, 19, a lifelong resident of R. 2, Campbellsport, who was an employe of the A. O. Smith Corp., Milwaukee, died Monday, July 2, at Theda Clark Memorial Hospital, Neenah, of injuries he suffered in an automobile motorcycle crash Sunday evening.

Kujawski sustained a skull fracture and possible internal injuries when the motorcycle he was riding collided with a car driven by Kimberly A. Casey, Westchester, Ill., at 7:05 p. m. Sunday one-half mile south of Hwy. 67 on County Trunk G south of Dundee. He was taken to the Neenah hospital by Moore Ambulance Service.

Casey said that Kujawski was proceeding north of CTH G when he made a sudden stop and crossed into the southbound lane, apparently to talk to two girls who were walking along the road. Casey, also proceeding north, said he was unable to stop in time to avoid hitting Kujawski. Casey was cited for improper distance between vehicles related to the accident.

Kujawski was born Aug. 9, 1953 at West Bend, a son of Elroy Kujawski, Jr. and the late Marie Krahn Kujawski. He is survived by his father, R. 2, Campbellsport; two brothers, Charles of R. 2, Adell, and Steven, R. 2, Campbellsport; three sisters, Ann, Madison, Vivian, Athens, Ohio, and Carla; his paternal grandfather, Elroy Kujawski, Sr., Los Angeles, Calif.; his maternal grandfather, Charles Krahn, West Bend; one brother-in-law, one sister-in-law, uncles, aunts, other relatives and friends.

Visitation at Miller's Funeral Home, Kewaskum, will be from 1 p. m. until the time of services at 2 p. m. Friday. Rev. Dan Schowalter will officiate and burial will take place in Union Cemetery, Campbellsport.

AFS Student Sends Letter From Australia

The following letter, written June 17, was received by Dr. and Mrs. Anthony Strigenz, R. 1, Kewaskum, from their daughter, Debbie, 17, who left June 11 to spend the summer in Australia under the American Field Service program:

Well, here I am! I really can't believe it. To sort of recap it all:

We landed in Sydney Airport at 6:45 a. m. (Thursday) after a five hour flight from San Francisco to Hawaii and then 11 hours from Hawaii to Sydney. All of us were extremely tired. We loaded the buses and then drove to the Youth Camp, an hour and half out of Sydney. The ride was fantastic and we got our first glimpse of Australia. The camp was like a Youth Hostel, with no hot water, but we did get to bed at 7:30 p.m.

The next morning (Friday) we flew out of Sydney to Melbourne at 11:30 a. m. Waiting at the airport were the six families around here who were going to have A.F.S. students, plus many more people and lots of newspaper and TV reporters. There were all sorts of signs, including one saying "Welcome Debbie." We drove through Melbourne and I got a really good tour of the city and the suburb, Blackburn. We then had a delicious dinner of porterhouse steak (only \$1.00 a lb.).

Saturday, I went to a gym with Lisa, my best friend, Joanne, and her summer A.F.S. student, Lynn from California. We had a good time using all the equipment and next Saturday I'm going to be able to use the pool, whirlpool and sauna. But today I'm really sore! Dinner (or tea as it is called) was great. We had lamb chops and they were fantastic. Lunch was the best home made pizza I ever had. We then went to a friend of Mr. and Mrs. Wilson where Lynn and I showed our slides.

Today, Sunday, was fantastic fun. The whole family and I went to a wildlife sanctuary where I petted kangaroos and saw Koloa bears, platopusses, lizards, emus (a large bird), dingos, wombats, wallabys, cock-a-toos, cookaburoos and lots more. We lunched on a picnic of huge hero sandwiches of ham and chicken. It was great fun. We then brought home fish and chips (SHARK and french fries) and ate dinner in front of the "Telly."

The family I'm with are extremely nice, very similar to ours. Mr. and Mrs. Wilson (Mom and Dad to me) are really great. Lisa, my sister, is 14. We share a room where I have my own chest and closet. Scott, who is 12, is very dear. He teaches me all about "footy" (Australian football) and is always bringing me little presents. Tim, who is 7, is always playing my flute and Bradley, 4, is very cute, but so far quite shy with me. Their house is just beautiful, inside and out, but it gets very cold with no central heating; but, I

ORDINANCE NO. 73-2

AN ORDINANCE TO REPEAL AND RECREATE SECTION 1.30 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF KEWASKUM, WISCONSIN, RELATING TO BOARD OF REVIEW

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. 1.30 of the Municipal Code of Kewaskum, Wisconsin is repealed and recreated to read as follows:

1.30 BOARD OF REVIEW

(1) COMPOSITION. The Board of Review shall consist of the President, Clerk and such other officer or officers, other than the Assessor, as the Village Board may determine.

(2) MEMBERS, POWERS, FUNCTIONS, ETC. The Board of Review's powers, functions, jurisdiction, procedure, etc. shall be as prescribed by sections 70.46 and 70.47, Wisconsin Statutes.

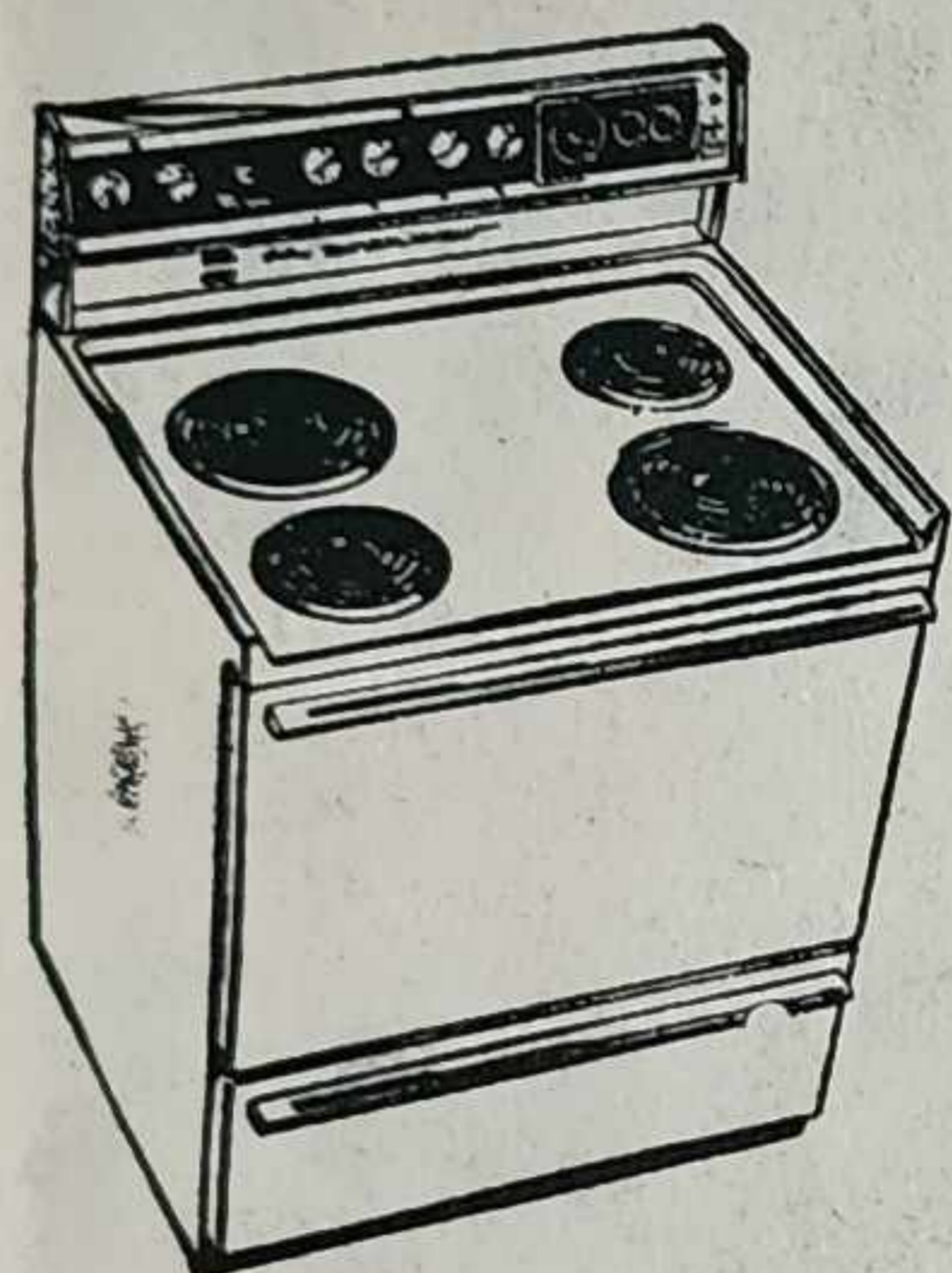
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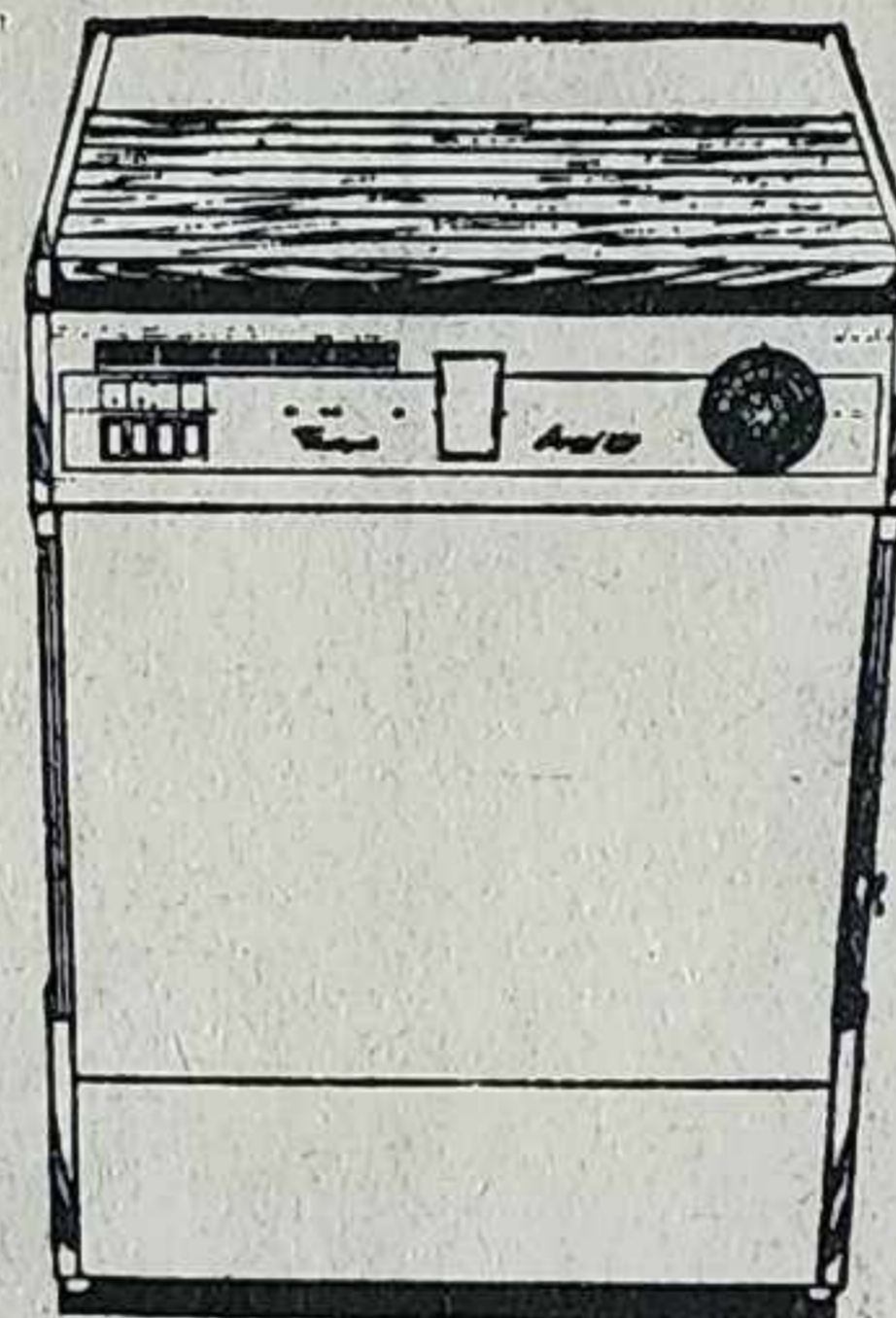
