

Indians Win 3 From Top Teams, Cop Third Place

The Kewaskum Indians wound up their season the past week with 3 victories over the top teams (besides themselves) in the conference to finish in 3rd place with a 9-5 record. The wins were over champion Hartland, 2nd place Grafton and 4th place Slinger. Two of the wins were shutouts, one on a 1-hitter by Jim Gaffke.

Kewaskum defeated 2nd spot Grafton 3-0 last Tuesday, even though the Indians got only 2 hits, compared to the losers, 5. The winners scored in the 1st and 3rd without a hit on walks, steals and bad throws. The Indians got their 1st hit in the 6th, a single by Scott Koth, a fielder's choice, and another hit by Gaffke to score their 3rd run. Gaffke was the winning pitcher but he did work his way out of a few jams. Schmitz got 2 of Grafton's 5 hits. Prevoiusly the Indians lost 3 one-run deci-

Koth pitched and batted Kewaskum to a 7-4 win over first place Hartland Thursday night. The soph scattered 7 hits, got 3 hits himself and scored 2 runs. The victory avenged a 1 run loss to Hartland earlier in the season when the tying run was called out at the plate. Kewaskum started off with a long home run by Randy Koepke in the 1st inning and Pete Gutchenritter hit one for Hartland in their half of the same frame. The Indians also got 7 hits. Kewaskum sewed up the victory with 3 runs in the 5th and 2 in

The Indians won their 5th game in the last 6 starts when they blanked Slinger here Monday night, 5-0, on a 1-hitter by Gaffke. The win gave Kewaskum 3rd place. Had Grafton lost their game the same night the Indians would have tied for 2nd. A bunt single by Scott Risse prevented Gaffke from a nohitter. Gaffke finished with a perfect 4-0 record. When he isn't pitching he catches and is probably the best in the conference at that position. Gaffke was never in trouble as he struck out 12 and walked only 2. The Indians scored 2 in the 1st inning when R. Koepke singled and Gary Marx tripled, tried to stretch it into a homer and was safe on the catcher's error. Loser Dan Karius then checked Kewaskum until the 6th when they scored 3 more on a walk, single, error, single and error.

The Indians' Gary Marx may have ended as the leading hitter in the Scenic Moraine but final statistics will not be released until Monday after the all-conference voting.

Thursday evening Kewaskum was scheduled to face Campbellsport in the WIAA Regional tournament at Campbellsport at 6 p. m. The Cougars beat Lomira, 5-0, Tuesday evening in the opening game while Kewaskum had a bye. The Cougars overall record for the season was 14-7 and Kewaskum's 9-6.


