## Kewaskum Bank to Change Name, Adopt Common Symbol

Effective July 1, 1973, the Bank of Kewaskum with an office in Allenton officially changed its name to "VALLEY BANK." The change will be accompanied by the adoption of a new bank symbol, designed as a unifying logo for banks affiliated with Valley Bancorporation, a registered bank holding company.

A spokesman for the bank, said the change has been initiated because of the desire to identify member banks of Valley Bancorporation. He added, the \$209 million-asset Valley Bancorporation gives the local bank the strength and capacity it needs in order to provide the people in this area with the best banking service available anywhere.

At the present time, Valley Bancorporation consists of 12 banks with 18 offices, a leasing company and a trust company all serving Wisconsin. In the near future other Valley Bancorporation banks will change their existing names to "VALLEY BANK," and each will adopt a common symbol.

Gus A. Zuehlke, president of Valley Bancorporation, cited three principal advantages of the change:

"First," he said, "Wisconsin's population is extremely mobile today. Approximately 20% of the people move every year. When moving occurs within our own marketing area, people will find a 'VALLEY BANK' just like the one with which they were familiar at their previous location.

"Second, we anticipate the implementation of common identity of our banks will result in a greater awareness of the over-all strength and capacity of Valley Bancorporation banks.

"Third, there are certain economies by taking advantage of overlapping marketing areas. By promoting more bank services jointly, rather than individually, we plan to achieve substantial cost savings in advertising. With a common name and symbol, we plan to purchase supplies and various forms on a group-wide basis to achieve some of the benefits of our group-buying strength."

The new name and symbol will soon be appearing on bank forms, signage and advertising. The symbol is based on a stylized "V" — Valley Bank — and can also be seen as two hills coming together to form a valley. The top section of the symbol represents the sun rising and radiating over the valley, symbolizing the growing and expanding horizons for the Valley Banks.

Wayland Tessar, president of Valley Bank, Kewaskum, had this to say about the change:

"While we are proud of our old name, Bank of Kewaskum, and the area it serves, our recent merger with Allenton State Bank has expanded the geographic area we now serve. We feel it is a name that is adaptable to both areas and also gives day-

us common identity with the Valley Bancorporation and as a result will assist us in our marketing efforts. However, only the bank name has been changed... the same officers and employee staff will continue to serve the financial needs of the people in this area."

## Tennis Tournament Regulations Listed

## Picnic Another Great Success; Winners Named

Very hot, sunny weather with the temperature soaring into the 90's, helped make the annual Firemen's Picnic Sunday one of the most successful held with the gross receipts equaling or surpassing those of past years. Final figures will not be known until all of the ticket sales and expenses are turned in.

Thousands of persons witnessed an outstanding parade and attended the picnic in the park throughout the afternoon and evening. The crowd was especially large in the evening when it cooled off some and people came who had stayed away in the daytime heat.

It was so hot that 13 persons, all members of participating drum and bugle corps, collapsed from heat exhaustion after their performance in the park following the parade. Members of the firemen's rescue squad and police gave them first aid but six of those who did not respond well were taken by ambulance to St. Joseph's Hospital, West Bend, for further treatment. All were later released. Twelve of the 13 were members of the Majestics Corps of Marquette, Mich.

The parade was another excellent one which lasted just over an hour. There were a total of 71 units in the parade, highlighted by 10 bands and drum and bugle corps, 2 drill teams, and 15 floats. Other features included other musical organizations, twirlers, comic entries, children's specialties, visiting firemen, ancient cars, dozens of horses, and numerous other units.

The theme for floats in the parade this year was "Cartoon Capers," and there were some dandies. Prize winners were: 1. Kewaskum Sno-Chiefs, \$100; 2. F-S Services, \$60; 3. Regal Ware, \$40; 4. New Fane Kettle Riders, \$20. Junior or children's float winners were: 1. Kid Power, \$12; 2. Swiss Miss, \$8; 3. Jaeger Construction, \$6; 4. The Odd Family, \$4; 5. Snoopy Doghouse, \$2.

Music by Two Hits and a Miss and Artie Minz and His Countrymen was enjoyed from the bandstand and in the beer garden. ### Indians Win 3 From Top Teams, Cop Third Place

The Kewaskum Indians wound up their season the past week with 3 victories over the top teams (besides themselves) in the conference to finish in 3rd place with a 9-5 record. The wins were over champion Hartland, 2nd place Grafton and 4th place Slinger. Two of the wins were shutouts, one on a 1-hitter by Jim Gaffke.

Kewaskum defeated 2nd spot Grafton 3-0 last Tuesday, even though the Indians got only 2 hits, compared to the losers, 5. The winners scored in the 1st and 3rd without a hit on walks, steals and bad throws. The Indians got their 1st hit in the 6th, a single by Scott Koth, a fielder's choice, and another hit by Gaffke to score their 3rd run. Had Grafton lost their game the same night the Indians would have tied for 2nd. A bunt single by Scott Risse prevented Gaffke from a no-hitter. Gaffke finished with a perfect 4-0 record. When he isn't pitching he catches and is probably the best in the conference at that position. Gaffke was never in trouble as he struck out 12 and walked only 2. The Indians scored 2 in the 1st inning when R. Koepke singled and Gary Marx tripled, tried to stretch it into a homer and was safe on the catcher's error. 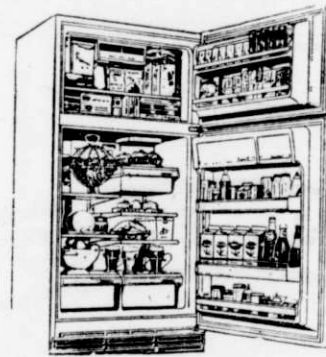

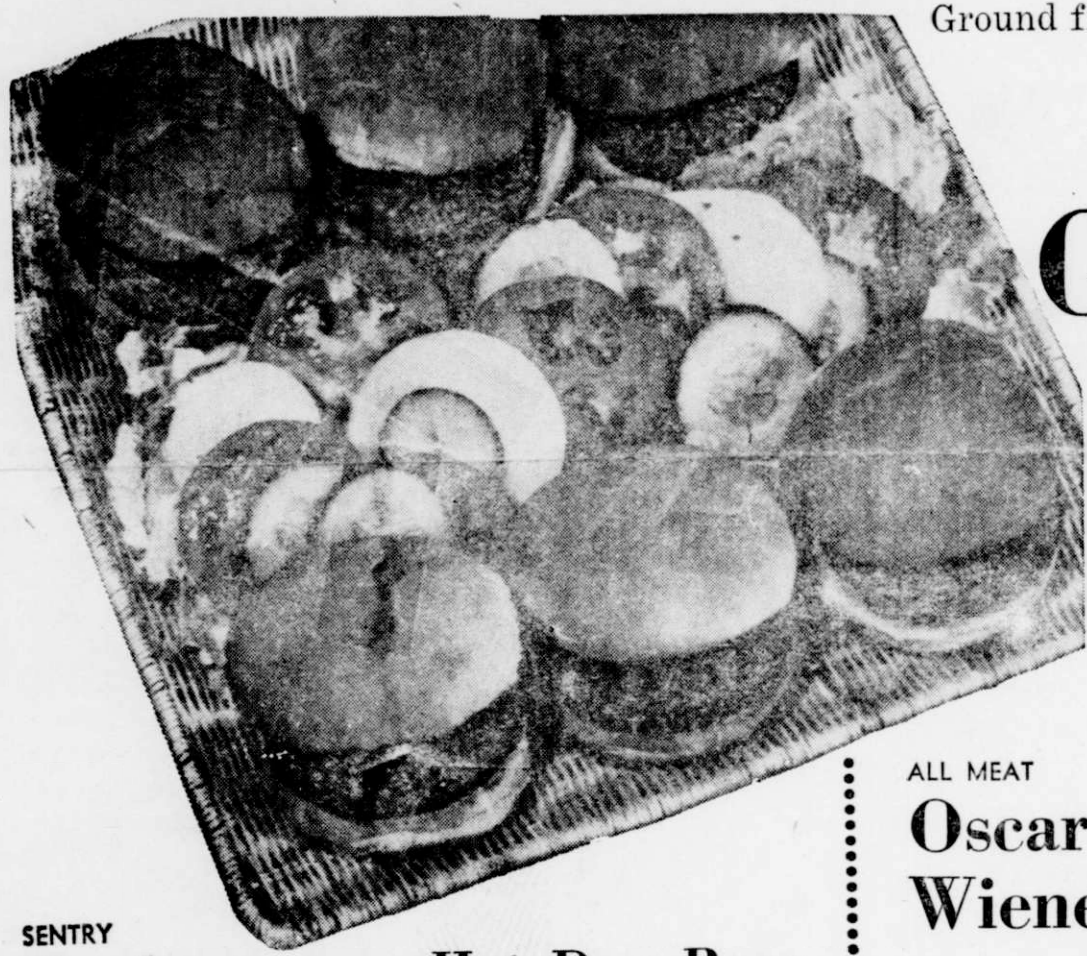
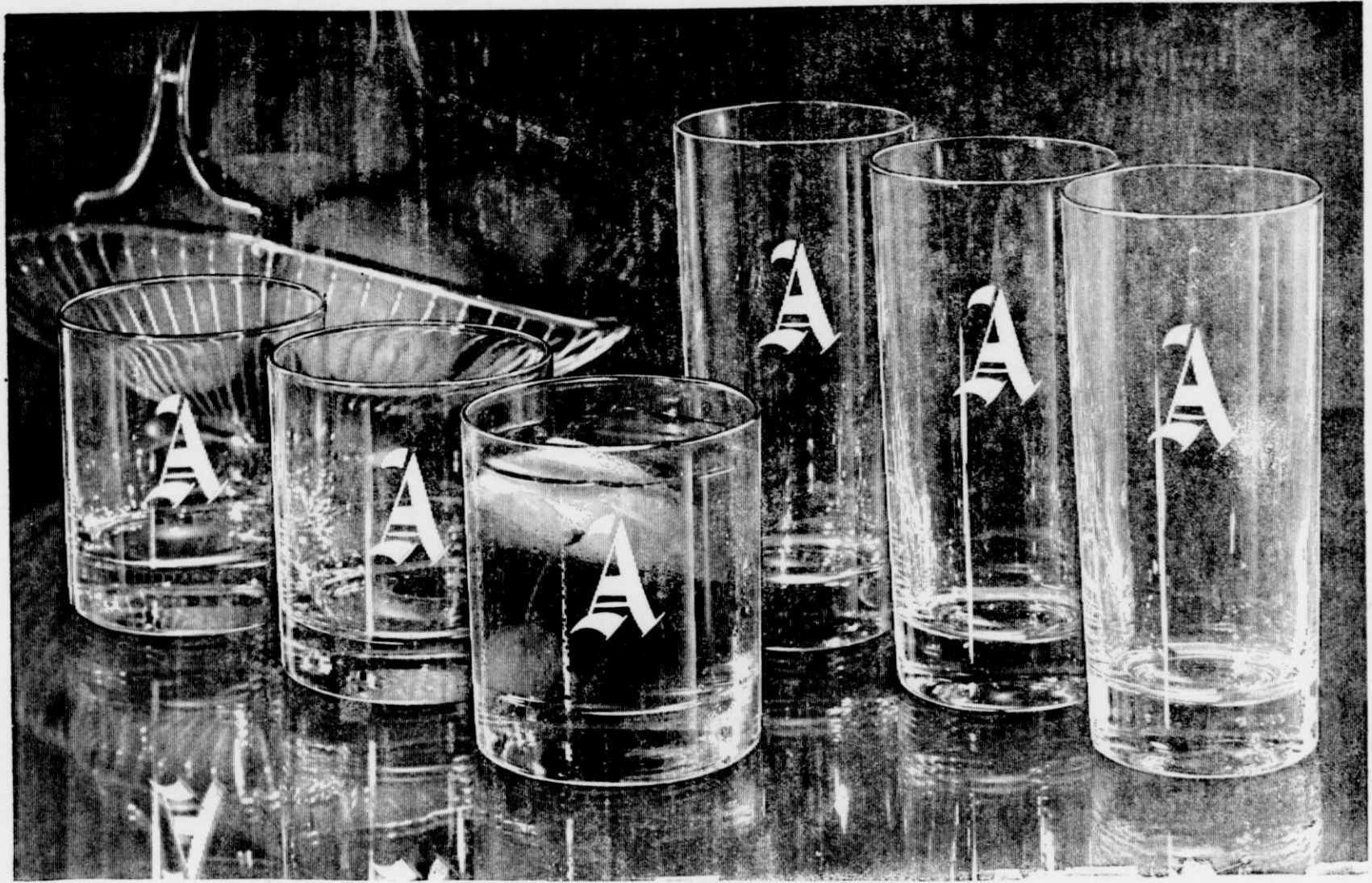
