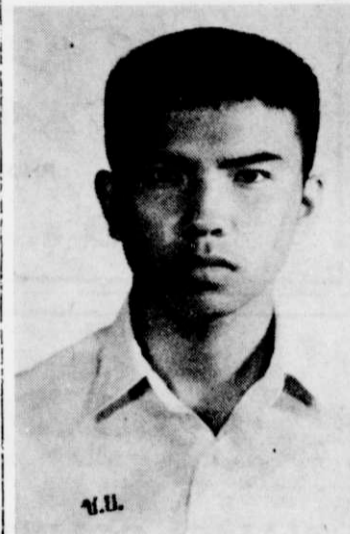

All Building Proposals Rejected At School Board Meeting Monday

Boy, 14, Honored For Saving Girls From Barn Fire

At Monday night's Kewaskum Kiwanis Club meeting, the Washington County Sheriff's Department and the Kiwanians honored Gerard Hutchins, 14, for his part in saving two seven-year-old girls from a barn fire May 31. Gerard is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Guy Hutchins, 3236 Valley View Drive, R. 1, Kewaskum.

At about 4:30 p. m. May 31, the sheriff's department received an emergency call requesting the Boltonville Fire Department at the James Feiten farm on Paradise Drive, north of Hwy. 28 between Boltonville and St. Michaels. The barn and its contents were lost in the blaze. A Sheriff's Dept. squad was also sent to investigate and assist.

But before the fire department rescue squad and others arrived, Hutchins had saved his sister Theresa and Mary Feiten from the fire. The two girls and John Feiten, 4, and Peter Hutchins, 5, were playing in a tunnel or fort which they had fashioned by restacking bales of hay in the barn.

Hutchins was in the house when John Feiten came in and told him of the fire. Hutchins ran to the barn realizing that there had been four children playing there, where flames were starting to lick through the roof and smoke was becoming dense as heat built rapidly.

His brother, Peter, was already out of the barn but he could hear the two girls screaming in the barn. He ran into the flaming and smoke-filled barn and found the girls near a corn crib fashioned from snow fences and his sister Theresa was entangled in it.

The young girls were screaming hysterically but making no attempt to free Theresa or flee from the barn. Hutchins quickly tore Theresa's clothes loose from the snow fence. The flames were spreading rapidly towards them and the escape route to the barn door was cut off. Because there was no inside stairway leading to the ground floor, Hutchins moved toward the flames to a grain and hay chute and quickly threw some loose hay down it to ease the fall of the two girls. He told Mary to jump first and then his sister.

Heat was building and flames were very close and Hutchins also jumped down to escape the flames, landing on top of his sister Theresa. He then helped

bowling, golfing and hunting. Roger and his wife Thelma, who also works at Regal Ware, have three children — Thomas, an accountant for the City of Neenah; and Mary Beth and Gary Allen, who attend Lomira High School.

All building proposals were rejected at the School Board meeting held Monday evening. The board will now negotiate with Thern Associates of Oshkosh. While no final decision has been made on the question of taking bids once drawings and specifications are completed, the board has indicated previously they would probably go to a turnkey approach. There were a number of local trade and construction men at the meeting. They urged the board to go to competitive bidding rather than negotiating a turnkey project. One factor being investigated by the board is that if a project is bid, state-set prevailing wage rates must be paid. On a turnkey project this is not true.

In other business, the board approved making application for membership of the Kewaskum High School in the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. This action was taken as a result of a recommendation from the long-range planning committee.

The policy on non-certified staff members was approved after a second reading. The board organizational meeting will be held following the annual meeting on July 23.

Approval was given for hiring John Stephan for the additional fourth grade position at the Kewaskum Elementary School. He is a graduate of Superior. This will be his first year of teaching.

John Sutton of the Kewaskum district was hired as school services manager. He has a bachelor's degree in business administration from UWM, and has 15 credits toward a Master's Degree. He has worked at Milway and at Gehl's, but has recently been self-employed as a personnel consultant.

the girls out of the lower portion of the barn to where they were safe. He then helped tear open a box stall to release some pigs. Mary was unhurt and Theresa suffered some scraped and bruised ribs from the snow fence and a few aches from her brother falling on her. Hutchins suffered slight burns to his right forearm.

Monday night Sheriff Clarence Schwartz told the group gathered at Hon-E-Kor Country Club to honor Hutchins, the story of the rescue, as told above. He also praised the boy, stating "The fire is still of undetermined origin. The cause of the fire is not why we are here tonight. We are here to call the community's attention to Gerald J. Hutchins who unselfishly endangered his own life to save the lives of his sister and her

girl friend. Gerard, your family, your friends, your 4-H Club and your entire community certainly have a right to be proud of you. We of the Washington County Sheriff's Dept. certainly are proud of you. We would like for the people of the community to recognize you as an individual but also as a representative of the many, many fine young people of our county . . . we think you're a pretty great guy . . . a fine member of our community. Gerhard may this award, which is only a small token of gratitude, serve as a reminder to you and the community of your unselfish actions on May 31, 1973."

Sheriff Schwartz noted when the boy was asked about the risk he said "I guess I really took a chance . . . I never gave my personal danger a thought. I just knew I had to do what I had to do. They were in trouble and we had to get them out of there. After while I wasn't too sure I would do it again though."

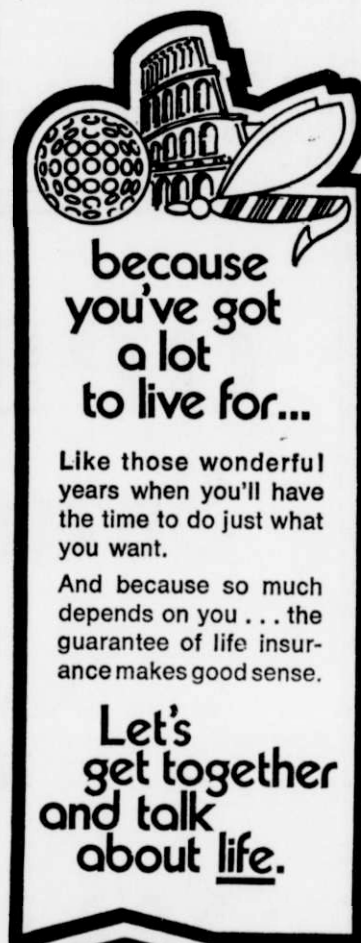

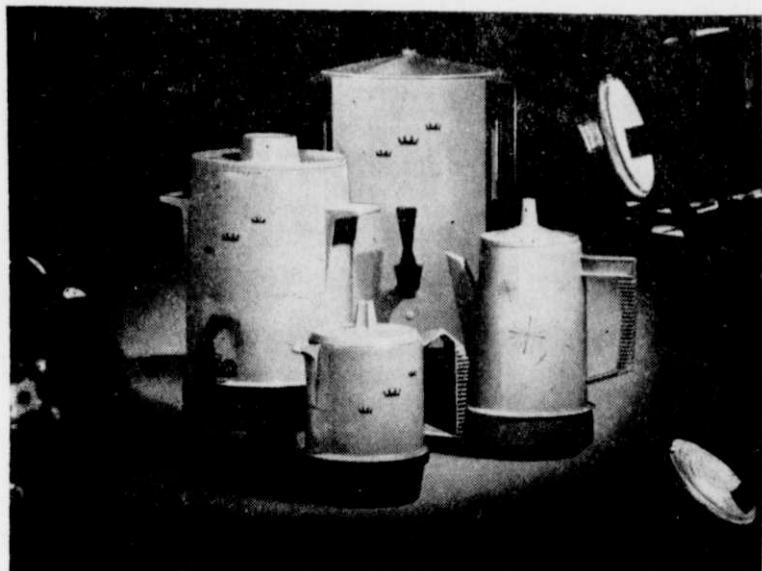

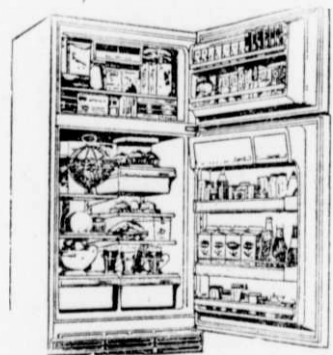
