AFS Student Writes Again From Australia

Another interesting letter was received from Debbie Strigenz, 17, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Anthony Strigenz, R. 1, Kewaskum, who is spending the summer in Australia under the American Field Service program. Her letter follows:

Hi Everyone:

Thought it was about time I wrote again to let all of you in on my doings here in Australia. First of all, I just love it here and am having a wonderful time meeting people, doing many different things and learning the ways of this country. I will never be able to thank everyone who has made this possible for me.

I spent a week the beginning of July on a farm in Daylesford (about 2½ hours north of Blackburn) with the Vallance family consisting of Debra, 18, who is in South Dakota for the year AFS program, Paul, 15, Claire, 17, who boards at an art college, Miriam, 14, who has become my good friend and Mr. and Mrs. Vallance. They also have an AFS student Bob from the state of Washington, though I didn't meet him as he was on a week's trip. They live in a typical Australian farm house, small and heated with a wood burning stove. My menu has been very different consisting of mutton, turnips, cabbage and pumpkin. We've been out to the mineral springs, where I tasted the water — ugh — we've gone bushwalking to see wild kangaroos. The area around here is mountainous and beautiful, but very cold. Daylesford School is much smaller than my school in Blackburn, only about 500 students in the 1st through 6th Form (7th through 12th grades). There are only 23 6th Formers (Seniors) as most of the kids leave school to go to work in the big cities. Two weeks later I went back to Daylesford for a school ball (dance) where we had the best time. Mum (Mrs. Wilson) made me a long skirt for the dance as that is all the rage here.

I went to a real live footy game (like our soccer) with Dad, Lisa, and Scott and it is a very fast, exciting game. We've also been to the Victorian ice-skating championships which were beautiful. Ice skating is a very big thing here and Lisa is a wonderful skater. We've been to many parties here and one of the best was a going-away party for the six Australian kids who are coming over to the United States for the year AFS Program. It was held at a ritzy nightclub, where we had a long beautiful dinner consisting of lambchops and all the trimmings. We danced all evening and had such a good time. One of the boys, Paul, is coming to Waukesha and definitely wants to visit Kewaskum while he is in the states. Before I left, Mrs. Peterson had told me a girl from Australia was going to Lomira High School this year, and guess what? She was at the party too, very nice, and I'm going to see

Oldest Subscriber, Mrs. Hillenberg, Dies in Canada

Hulda Louise Hillenberg, 95, died June 18 at her home in Calgary, Alberta, Canada. She was born in the Town of Kewaskum on Jan. 11, 1878 on the farm now owned by Ned W. Sengpiel.

Mrs. Hillenberg had been a subscriber to the Kewaskum Statesman while living in Kewaskum and continued her subscription all the years while living in Canada, making her a subscriber for at least 75 years.

Mrs. Hillenberg was the daughter of the late John and Wilhelmina Seefeldt Siegel. She attended school at Kewaskum and West Bend and taught school in the Towns of Barton and Kewaskum. She married William Hillenberg on Feb. 2, 1913 and then moved to Irvine, Alberta, Canada where Mr. Hillenberg had staked a homestead claim. In 1929 after Mr. Hillenberg had been killed by a train, the family moved to Medicine Hat. In 1945 the family moved to Calgary, Canada, where she continued to reside until the time of her death.

Mrs. Hillenberg is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Florence Perkins and Esther, with whom she resided, of Calgary and Wilma Cooper of London, Ontario. She is further survived by relatives in Kewaskum and West Bend.

Funeral services were conducted at Leyden's Chapel of Remembrance on June 20, Rev. Dr. Harold L. Mitten officiating. Interment took place at Hillside Cemetery, Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada.

"SPEAKING ONE-TO-ONE"

Many customers have asked me some of the things that can cause telephone service to occasionally be out of order. There can be many causes — such as storm damage, equipment malfunctions, vandalism, etc.

One of the most common causes confronting General Telephone today is the inadvertent cutting of our buried cable by plumbing and housing contractors, well diggers, road construction and utility company crews, and occasionally farmers.

Most are careful, concerned enough with not disrupting telephone service TO CALL THE LOCAL TELEPHONE REPAIR SERVICE to learn the location of the cables. Last year, however, some 350 cable cuts did occur, cuts which on the average affected 150 customers' service for approximately five hours, cuts which cost those responsible for disrupting service.

These cuts and repair charges could have been avoided if the digger had just taken the time to call. When we receive a cable location request at a local repair service center, we will have our men available to locate the cable. We appreciate three days' notice prior to the start of a project; however, we know construction schedules do change and we are flexible to meet the diggers' needs.

With 78% of our cable now underground, those digging in close proximity to roadways, intersections, city streets, or property boundaries risk the chance of striking a cable. The location of cable is not always obvious; nevertheless persons or firms severing cable must be charged for repairs.

And, aside from the inconvenience you—the customer—suffers, the possibility exists that one number out of order could be an emergency number you need.

If you anticipate a digging project in the near future, or know of someone who is, please remember this—One call will help us all. CALL US BEFORE YOU DIG.

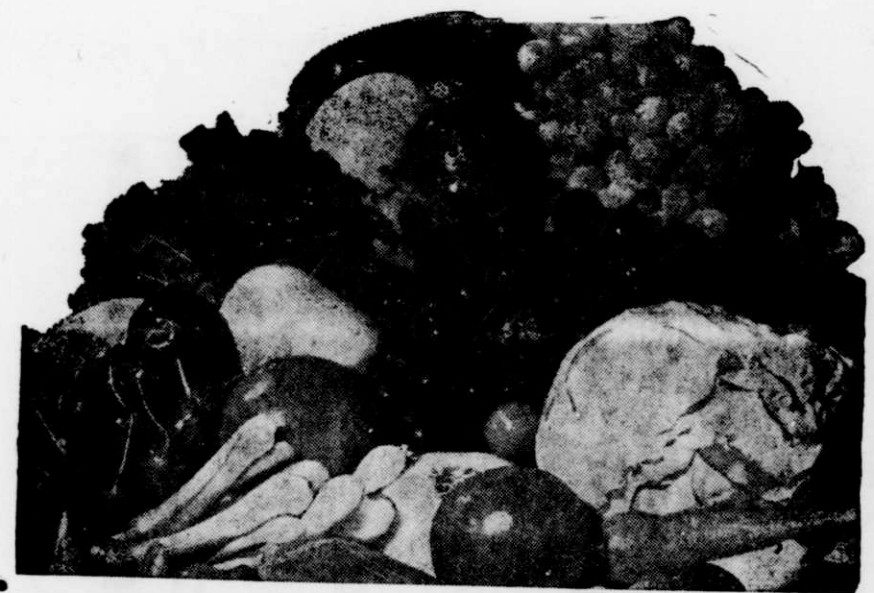

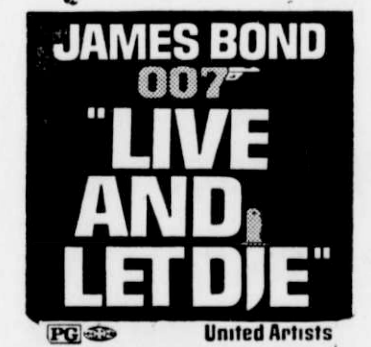
