School Board Meeting Again Includes Lengthy Discussion of Building Program

The Monday Board of Education meeting included, once again, a lengthy discussion of the building program. Present at the meeting was Walter F. Kelly of the law firm of Goldberg, Previant & Uelmen. Kelly indicated that he represented the Milwaukee Building & Construction Trades Council and a number of concerned Kewaskum citizens. The only citizen he named was Gene Akin, a Kewaskum area resident and a union business agent.

Primary question involved was whether the original proposals submitted to the board were bids. The contention, made by Kelly, was that the proposals did constitute bids and that the board should accept one of them or that the board should have detailed plans and specifications drawn up and then place them out on bids if the board now feels they have a particular kind of building in mind.

It is the board's contention that time and money would be involved in bidding. The board feels that rebidding would create further loss of time. Secondly, it is the board's feeling that continuing with what is a modified turnkey approach will result in cost savings.

One of the major points of contention revolves around the fact that if bids are taken, then prevailing wages must, by law, be paid. These apparently basically amount to union wage scales. If the board uses a turnkey approach, it appears that these wage rates are not required by law.

At the annual meeting, a motion was made by Gene Akin to direct the board to put the buildings out on bids and to accept the lowest qualified bidder. After discussion of the possible consequences, this motion was defeated 65-9. The board feels this indicated the people were telling them to use their best judgment to get the most building possible for the dollar spent and did not feel the board should be tied to the bidding process if they felt this was not in the best interests of the district.

Richard Thern of Thern Associates and Dewey Westra of Westra Construction also attended the meeting. They presented some plans and contract proposals to the board on the building. The board requested that Mr. McKenna, Mr. Thompson and Mr. Brenholt go through the contracts and then set a special meeting for Aug. 20 to hear reports on them, and to again talk with Thern and Westra.

In other business, the board heard a discussion and proposal on Wisconsin Physicians Service health and accident insurance from Orv Behnke. The board will hear a presentation from Blue Cross, the present carrier, on Aug. 27.

Motions were passed to approve additional insurance including a board and employee liability policy, an umbrella liability policy and to approve naming six teachers who do a

great deal of traveling in their own cars on school business as insured under school district policies.

Approval also was given to purchasing two school vehicles, one a 9-passenger station wagon and one a 12-passenger van. The bids from Honeck Chevrolet were selected over two other higher bids.

The lunch price policy was adopted, which will call for daily tickets of 60c for students or adult daily tickets, weekly tickets of \$2.15 per week for students and \$3.00 for adults. Extra milk at meals, for sack lunches and for milk breaks will be 5c for students and 7c for adults.

Approval of extending Mrs. Becker's retirement one year was given. Mrs. Becker works with the school lunch program.

Dedicate Ice Age National Scientific Reserve at Dundee

Dedication ceremonies for the Ice Age National Scientific Reserve in Wisconsin were held Monday, Aug. 6 at 11 a. m. at a site on County Trunk "F," a short distance east of Dundee.

Wisconsin Governor Patrick J. Lucey headed a list of distinguished speakers who appeared on the program. Rev. Daniel Schowalter of Peace Church, Kewaskum, led the dedication ceremonies.

Secretary of the United States Department of the Interior, Rogers C. B. Morton, and U. S. Congressman Henry S. Reuss of Milwaukee were featured speakers at the dedication. Presiding were Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Secretary, L. P. Voigt. The Kiel High School band and members of the Potawatomi Boy Scout council were also on the program. Parking for the public was available at the Long Lake recreation area in the Northern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest, and visitors were taken the short distance to the dedication site by bus.

The Ice Age National Scientific Reserve was authorized by the U. S. Congress in 1964 to preserve the geological features resulting from the last advance of the continental ice sheet, the Wisconsin Stage, that ended 10,000 years ago. The Reserve, composed of nine units located across Wisconsin from Manitowoc county in the east to Polk county in the west, contains a total of 32,500 acres.

A joint venture of the federal and state and local governments, the Reserve is the first such project in which the federal government is sharing the cost of development and operating expenses with a state.

Following the dedication ceremony, bus tours were available to the public with naturalists explaining the geological features of the area.

Board Appropriates Additional Sum for Topographical Maps

An additional \$1,400 was appropriated by the Village Board Monday night, Aug. 6, so that a project that will yield topographical maps of the village may proceed.

The sum of \$4,000 was set aside for this first segment that will provide maps that will cover the west one-third of the village. But the board was told by Forrest Robinson, its consulting engineer, that the \$4,000 is insufficient. The project was approved in April and aerial photography was made shortly after.

The topographic maps will yield important information such as drainage in any given area and will be helpful in laying sewers and installing lift stations in the proper places.

A tavern license was approved for Thomas J. Piwoni of Cedarburg for the Opera House Tavern. It was held previously by Lawrence Galabinske. Permits to construct four one-family homes in Bel-Ric Acres were approved for Murray Construction, Milwaukee.

Approval was given to Peter Albers, sewage plant superintendent, to attend the annual three-day seminar in La Crosse.

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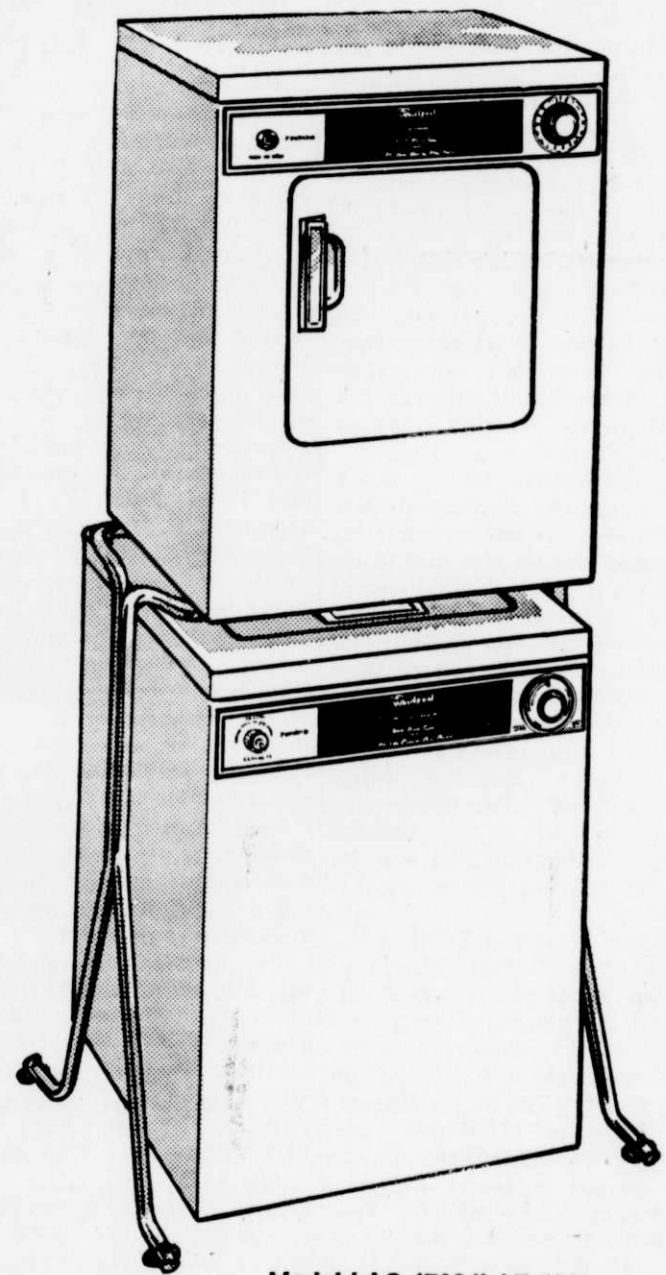

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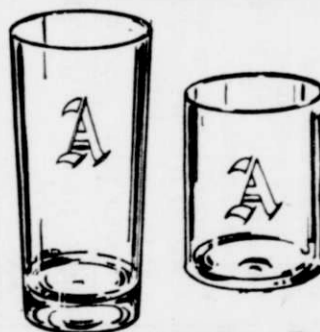

MINUTES OF VILLAGE BOARD MEETING

Called Meeting
May 22, 1973
8:00 P. M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in official session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Miller presided and all Board Members responded to roll call.

The approval of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with upon motion by Trustee Nigh, seconded by Trustee Schmidt and duly carried.

Discussion was held on the application of Mrs. Adelia Klukas for permission to divide Lot 11, Block 31, of the Assessor's Plat into two (2) 60 foot lots as they existed before the Plat Map was prepared in 1957. Zoning Administrator Richard Zarling reported that the Plan Commission had recommended that the Village Board grant the requested permission and that he concurred in their decision. Motion was made by Trustee Yost and seconded by Trustee Herriges that the applicant, Mrs. Adelia Klukas, be and hereby is granted the requested permission to divide said Lot 11 provided an easement is incorporated in the Certified Survey Map on the western portion of the eastern 60 foot lot so that access will be provided to do maintenance work on the existing home located on the western 60 foot lot.

Dear Bill:
Currently the Village has the following liability coverage limits, exclusive of the Ambulance Professional Liability exposure:

Automobile Liability: \$500,000 Per Person and \$1,000,000 Aggregate for Bodily Injury.
\$200,000 Property Damage Liability.
General Liability: \$500,000

Per person and \$1,000,000 Aggregate for Bodily Injury. \$500,000 Property Damage Liability. Personal Injury Liability: \$250,000 Per Person \$500,000 Aggregate. This is coverage for liability claims arising from False Arrest, Libel, Slander, Malicious Prosecution, Wrongful Eviction, etc.

The above liability limits are generally adequate; but it is conceivable that they could be inadequate if a claim arose which was of a catastrophic nature.

I recommend that the Village Board give consideration at this time to the purchase of an "Umbrella" Liability Policy. This policy, with a limit of \$1,000,000 would cost \$225.00 per year and with a \$2,000,000 limit the annual premium would be \$425.00 The Company would be West Bend Mutual Insurance Company.

This Umbrella Policy would cover those claims which exceed your basic coverage, and in some cases where a claim is not covered under a basic policy this policy would cover after a pre-determined amount of claim is met.

Please advise me if the Board would like to have me explain the above coverage to them in greater detail. Thank you very much.
