News Review

Following is a review or chronology of some of the more important news events which occurred in the Kewaskum area since our last issue was published on Aug. 17 before the publisher was hospitalized with a heart attack, which forced us to suspend publication for the past 2½ months. This review is published mainly for the benefit of subscribers outside of the area and those in the area who did not hear or read in neighboring media of the news, which occurred and was received during this period.

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Too often, because someone has their receiver off the hook, you fail to place or receive an important call.

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In recent months, a growing concern of General Telephone Company of Wisconsin has been the customer inconvenience - or worse - brought on by such telephone misuse. Through this past August, records show 13,357 cases of uncradled receivers. Through September, the total for reported nuisance calls statewide stood at 376.

You can't be satisfied, and we won't be satisfied, until a strong customer - Company effort sharply drops incidents in both categories. We have some suggestions listed below, but their success depends on your help.

First, to cut "phone off the hook" occurrences, we ask customers to periodically check their receivers - just a glance in passing can spot the "malfunction" isolating you and any party-line neighbors. Also, teaching your children proper telephone usage, keeping the phone from the reach of playful pets, and not lifting the receiver to seal yourself away from unwanted calls are practices proving most helpful.

Unwanted calls of the nuisance (anonymous or obscene) variety can generally best be discouraged by quickly and unemotionally replacing the receiver on the hook after one unacknowledged "hello." A lack of response should convey your lack of interest, fail to excite him, and disappoint him to the point of not wanting to call back.

Of course, persistent nuisance calls should be reported to local law enforcement authorities.

Certainly, when nuisance calls can reach you, and desired calls for reasons of the dislodged receiver cannot, your phone has passed the stage of topsy-turvy. We think you'd prefer having your telephone service "straight up" and with these tips and your help, we're trying to provide it to you.

Regular Meeting
June 4, 1973
8:00 P. M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Miller presided and all Board Members responded to roll call.
