Reigle Announces Candidacy for Ninth District Congressional Seat on Dem Ticket



Ron Reigle, Kewaskum, has announced that he is a potential candidate for the Ninth District Congressional seat in 1974 on the Democratic ticket. The Ninth District includes Washington, Ozaukee, Waukesha, Jefferson and parts of Milwaukee and Dodge counties.

Reigle, 46, is the Vice President of Marketing and Management at Regal Ware, Inc. in Kewaskum, one of the fastest growing housewares manufacturers in the country. A graduate of the University of Arizona, Reigle has an impressive 22-year successful track record in the business world. After running his own sales company for two years, Reigle joined Regal Ware and rose through the ranks of the company from factory to Sales Department and finally to his present corporate management position.

Reigle feels compelled to run for Congress because something has to be done to right the wayward course of our federal government. According to Reigle, our federal government is facing a severe image crisis, "More than any other time in our history we need fresh faces with fresh solutions to our many problems in Washington. The unbalanced concentration of battle-scarred politicians and ambitious attorneys needs to be tempered by concerned citizens who know what the problems are."

Adult Recreation Program Planned

The Kewaskum Community Schools will again sponsor an adult recreation program beginning Nov. 14 for all residents of the Kewaskum school district which includes Beechwood, Farmington and Wayne, at the Kewaskum Elementary School gymnasium. Since it is a "fun" program, adults should not hesitate to take part.

The program will be free of charge and will be open to any and only adult residents of the Kewaskum school district, 18 years of age or older, who are no longer attending high school. High school students and/or other children will not be allowed. This is an "adult" program for the district. Adults will have an opportunity to get some recreational physical exercise through basketball, volleyball, etc. The program depends on those who participate.

Beginning on Nov. 14 and 15, Wednesdays from 8:00 - 10:00 p. m. will be for men and 8:00 - 10:00 p. m. on Thursdays for women. There will be no program operating during vacation periods or on days when the school is closed due to custodial work schedule conflicts. Locker room and shower-room facilities will be available. Participants will be responsible for their own towel, soap, etc.

It is hoped that the adults of the district will avail themselves of the program during the winter months ahead when other recreational activities are curtailed.

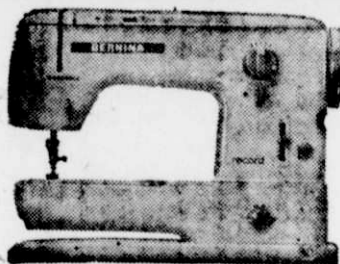

Kewaskum's third place Indians (5-2) had five players selected on the Scenic Moraine All-Conference Team selected by coaches last week.

Champion Germantown, which finished the season unbeaten and untied with a 7-0 record, dominated the team with 10 first place selections. Kewaskum was next with five, beating out second place Hartland (6-1) which had four.

In the final Associated Press poll of state high school football teams, Kewaskum was rated 18th among the Class B schools (enrollment of 400-800). Champion Germantown, which competes in the same conference, but is rated among the Class A schools because of a much larger enrollment, was also rated 18th among the big schools. Antigo was voted No. 1 in Class A, Mosinee in B, and Marathon in C.

interior lineman Ned Romaine, son of Curtis Romaine, who did some cavorting for the Indians on the gridiron some years back.

Leading the group of top players selected were two repeaters from last year, offensive

tackle Dave Pfeiffer of Hartland and defensive lineman Al Schmidt of Kewaskum. Schmidt, a 6-0, 206 lb. senior, was the Indians' leading tackler at middle guard and took care of most attempts to run the middle on the Indians. Most teams had to double team Al and still couldn't stop him.

Along with Schmidt, other Kewaskum players named were Mike Donath as a tackle on offense, Mike Koepke as an offensive end, Doug Bilgo at quarterback, and Scott Koth as a defensive back. Koepke and Koth are only juniors and were the only underclassmen picked except for Chris Canter of Germantown. Donath had been a starter at offensive tackler for 3 years. Koepke led the conference in number of receptions with 22 and in yardage for an end with 304. Koth intercepted 3 passes, recovered 2 fumbles, knocked down about 8 passes and also had 200 and 100 yard performances on offense.

Greg Ogi and Dale Prost re-

ceived an honorable mention on the all-conference team. Only disappointment for the Indians was that Prost was not named all-league. He was the 2nd leading rusher in the league with 642 yards in 116 carries for a 5-8 average and 3rd in scoring, although he played only 3½ games due to an injury.
