School Milk Prices Reduced

With the reinstatement of the federal special milk subsidy, special milk prices for students will be reduced to last year's level of 2¢ per ½ pint beginning Monday, Nov. 19, it was announced at Monday night's meeting of the Board of Education. This applies to extra milk at meals, and milk for milk breaks. Those parents who have paid ahead will have the extra money paid applied to the second half of the year rather than receiving refunds.

A change was approved in the middle school plan which would extend the mechanical mezzanine to create an additional 1400 square feet of storage space. The added cost was calculated at a maximum of \$4,400.00 to add this space.

A resignation was accepted from Mrs. Wilting, teacher in the home economics department. The resignation will be effective at the end of the first semester.

The board agreed that the Junior High can run a student contest to name the new 7th and 8th grade Middle School. The board will review the contest entries and select the name.

Because of the fuel shortage, temperatures in the schools will be reduced to approximately 68°. Parents are urged to see that their children dress accordingly.

Barton Dairy Sold by Nighs

The sale of Barton Dairy, R. 2, Kewaskum, to Regal and Waala III was announced by Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Nigh. Waala, former manager of the Snack Shack Lounge, West Bend, took over the dairy business from the Nighs Nov. 1.

Barton Dairy has the distributorship for Morning Glory products in the Kewaskum and West Bend areas. Waala plans to move the business to West Bend.

The Nighs, who had operated the Barton Dairy for the past 24 years, plan to farm for the time being. They became distributors for Morning Glory products in 1961.

Winter Parking Ordinance in Effect

A reminder that on Nov. 1 our winter parking ordinance went into effect.

Section 9.30 (1) of the Village Code restricts Winter Parking. No person shall park a vehicle on a public street or highway in the Village of Kewaskum from Nov. 1 to April 1 between the hours of midnight and 6:00 a. m., unless such person parks the vehicle in accordance with the following:

(a) On the even numbered side of the street or highway on those dates which bear an even calendar date at 12 o'clock midnight.

(b) On the odd numbered side of the street or highway on those dates which bear an odd calendar date at 12 o'clock p. m.

Reigle Organizes For Campaign; Meeting Monday

Ron Reigle of Kewaskum, who announced his potential candidacy for the 9th U. S. Congressional District Seat on the Democratic ticket some weeks ago, is getting down to serious organizational efforts.

Reigle, a top executive at Regal Ware, Inc., will hold an organizational meeting Monday, Nov. 19, at 7:30 p. m. at the Kewaskum Labor Center Hall basement at 1230 Fond du Lac Ave.

At the suggestion of many leading Democrats throughout the country, Reigle has announced his intention of hiring a professional campaign organizer to assure an effective and hard-hitting campaign. MINUTES OF VILLAGE BOARD MEETING

Regular Meeting
July 2, 1973
7:30 P. M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

Pres. Miller presided and all Board Members responded to roll call.

The minutes of the meetings of June 4, June 11 and June 14 were approved as printed upon motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Yooost and unanimously carried.

Sealed bids for the 1973 Street Paving program were opened and publicly read by Engineering Consultant Forrest Robinson. The bids were tabulated as follows:

Payne and Dolan, Waukesha, \$1.75 per sq. yd. for a total of \$29,750.00.
Scott Construction, Lake Delton, 2.47 per sq. yd. for a total of \$41,990.00.

Because the Payne and Dolan bid did not include the cost of shaping the street base, motion was made by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Yooost and unanimously carried that all bids be rejected.

Sealed bids for furnishing 10,000 cu. yds. of road gravel were opened and publicly read by Engineering Consultant Forrest Robinson. The bids were tabulated as follows:

R. M. Hinze, Inc., Richfield, 78c per cu. yd. for a total bid of \$7,800.00.
Harry Batzler, Campbellsport, 85c per cu. yd. for a total bid of \$8,500.00.

Upon the recommendation of the engineering consultant, motion was made by Trustee Yooost and seconded by Trustee Herriges that the bid of R. M. Hinze, Inc. shall be accepted.

Roll Call Vote — 7 "aye" 0 "naye."

The annexation of the Viola Spoerl property was tabled upon motion by Trustee Kral, seconded by Trustee Schmidt and unanimously carried.

Upon motion by Trustee Yooost, seconded by Trustee Strack and unanimously carried, the engineering consultant was authorized to re-advertise for bids on the 1973 street paving program, said bids to be opened at 7:30 P. M. on July 9, 1973.

Trustee Herriges proposed and Trustee Strack seconded that twice a week combined refuse collection shall be provided within the village on Mondays and Fridays. Roll Call Vote was unanimous.

The resolution with reference to recreation land aid was tabled pending conference with a representative of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Herriges and unanimously carried.

The Certified Survey Map, a division of Lot 1 Block 1 of Bel-Ric Acres Subdivision, William and Rosemary Paschke, Jr. owners, was approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Nigh and unanimously carried.

The Certified Survey Map dated June 1, 1973, presented by Ada Meilahn, owner, was approved upon motion by Trustee Yooost, seconded by Trustee Kral and unanimously carried.

Engineering Consultant Forrest Robinson presented a plan for the installation of

a blacktop walk along the West side of Highway "45" leading to Highway "H" West and the Bel-Ric Subdivision. The plan was referred to committee.

The Engineering Consultant was authorized to proceed with the preparation of a topographical map of the region to the west of the village. Motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Kral.

Roll Call Vote — 7 "aye" 0 "naye."

The application of Frank K. Krueger, 1232 Roseland Drive for the addition of an enclosed rear entrance to his existing home was approved upon motion by Trustee Nigh, seconded by Trustee Yooost and unanimously carried.

The General Telephone Company was authorized to install underground cable at the intersection of First and School Streets, along the west side of School Street and at the intersection of Second Street and Reigle Drive. Motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Kral and unanimously carried.

The motion approved at the June 14 meeting, appointing Elmer Yooost as a member of the Board of Review was rescinded because the appointment was made before the effective date of the new Board of Review Ordinance. Motion by Trustee Kral, seconded by Trustee Nigh and unanimously carried.

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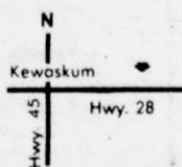

Does Wisconsin Electric ever reduce rates?

Yes... we have had over 100 rate reductions in our 77-year history whenever it was evident—as a result of certain factors—our earnings were higher than authorized. And, just as the Public Service Commission has to approve a rate increase, so does it have to approve a rate reduction. Conversely, when it appeared we were earning considerably less than the Commission authorized, we have applied for rate increases.

Why haven't there been any rate reductions recently?

Many rate reductions were the result of improvements in technology. For example: the use of pulverized coal, pioneered by Wisconsin Electric, made it possible to get twice as much energy per pound of coal. But no dramatic breakthrough like that is on the horizon.

Other rate reductions were the result of "economies of scale"... larger facilities to serve more customers with resulting lowered unit costs. But we're just about at optimum size on power plants. And if inflation continues, along with increasing fuel prices, taxes and labor costs, plus environmental related expenditures, we'll probably have to ask for rate relief periodically.

Does the Public Service Commission really watch over utilities closely?

You bet it does. Most people don't realize how diligently the Commission works fulfilling its obligation to utility customers. Our records and books are available to Commission members on a daily basis. If we ask for rate relief, the Commission conducts a complete audit of our books, which takes several months. Every major expenditure we plan must be approved by the Commission. Moreover, when we ask for a rate increase, the Commission conducts public hearings, so those who have an interest can appear and be heard.

While we may sometimes disagree with the Commission's rulings, we certainly do respect its integrity and dedication to the task of keeping both rates and profits reasonable.

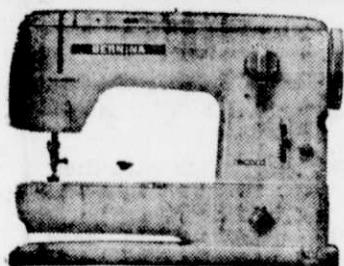
