Indians Lose Opening Game Coupon Week At Plymouth

The Kewaskum Indians opened the 1973-74 ball season at Plymouth Friday night in a non-conference game and were defeated by the tall Panthers, 75-57. The Indians trailed by on-

ly 7 points at halftime, 30-23, but ran into foul trouble in the second half to lose by a 19 point margin. Both Scott Koth and Mike Koepke, two juniors who were starters in their soph year last season, each had 3 fouls at halftime.

Koth led the Indians with 20 points, followed by Koepke with 16. High man for the night was Plymouth's 6' 5" center, veteran Scott Wilke, with 22 points. Wilke was the Panthers' ace last year. Sech added 18 and Wifler 13.

Not only did the team experience foul trouble but the play was ragged in this opener for both teams. The Indians showed they need more work to get them together.

The lead changed hands several times in the first quarter, which ended with Plymouth on top by a point, 12-11. Koepke, who had 8 re-bounds and 7 points in the first half, went to the bench midway in the 2nd period with 3 personals. Thus he was forced to play a less aggressive game in the second half.

Thirteen candidates have been working out with the varsity, including 4 lettermen, juniors Koepke and Koth and seniors Doug Bilgo and Gary Fickler. There are only 4 seniors on the squad, the others all being juniors. Koepke and Koth were both among the top scorers in the Scenic Moraine last year.

Besides the lettermen, most other candidates were on the JV squad last year. Lost are the graduates, plus 3 letter-men who did not report this year.

Besides Bilgo and Fickler, other seniors are Mike Faber and Mark Steinhardt, a transfer student from Sheboygan, who is the tallest member of the team at 6' 4". Other juniors, along with Koepke and Koth, include John Kleinman Paul Stoffel, Tim Ramthun, Paul Petri, Randy Koepke,





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


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
