## Reigle Congressional Campaign Gears Up

Over 100 friends and supporters of Ron Reigle, potential Democratic candidate for the 9th District Congressional seat, turned out for a campaign organizational meeting at the Labor Hall in Kewaskum Monday evening, Nov. 19. The crowd included representatives from every county in the district.

After the preliminary introductions and orientation by members of the ad hoc campaign committee, Reigle addressed his supporters. He hit hard on the failure of the present administration's capability to handle crises situations, such as the present energy crisis. According to Reigle, "We need a government in Washington that anticipates problems, not one that reacts to crises."

Similarly, Reigle called on his supporters to work to bring government back to the people. He cited several examples where the government was insensitive to the will of the people—the recent military alert, the Cambodian bombing, and the veto of the Minimum Wage Bill.

Reigle concluded by promising his audience that he, as Congressman, would tell his constituency the situation as it really is, not what they might want to hear. "Government reform must begin with the people and I can think of no better place than Wisconsin's neglected 9th Congressional District," concluded Reigle.

After his remarks, Reigle answered questions from the group.

The 9th Congressional District includes Washington, Ozaukee, Waukesha Counties; Jefferson county except the City of Whitewater. It also includes the towns of Emmet, Lebanon, Ashippun and Rubicon in Dodge County and the North Shore suburbs of Milwaukee County.

Reigle also spoke to the Northshore Democratic Party in a meeting held at the Eastbrook Restaurant in Milwaukee Nov. 13.

## Early Graduation 40 KHS Spanish Students to Spend In January for Easter Vacation on Trip to Spain

Approximately 30 Kewaskum High School students have indicated intentions to graduate in January. Applications must be filed to the office by Dec. 7. The anticipated number of early graduates may exceed 40, according to high school officials.

Applicants must submit a form including a parental request, and a statement from the student, with exact reasons, evidence of having met the requirements, and the signatures of both parent and student to verify the statement.

Reasons for considering early graduation are 1) to permit students to begin advanced formal education; 2) to permit students to enter into apprenticeships, on-the-job training programs, and training programs in the armed services of the United States; 3) to permit students to aid themselves or family during true personal financial needs. This would include financing an education if true financial need exists.

The Board of Education states that these completed requests will be acted upon by a school committee, made up of the high school principal, one guidance counselor, and three high school faculty members who are acquainted with the student, through class participation.

There are no commencement exercises held in January, but all early graduates are invited to the exercises held in June.

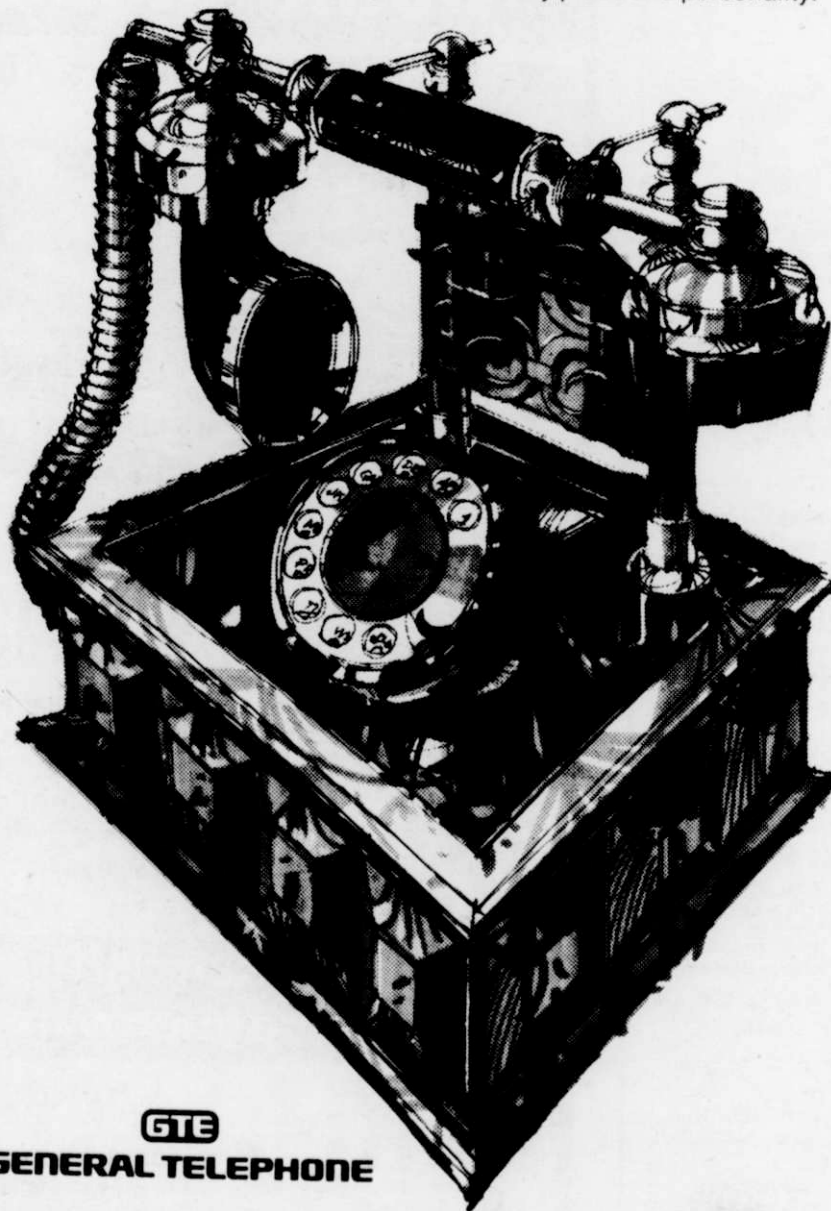

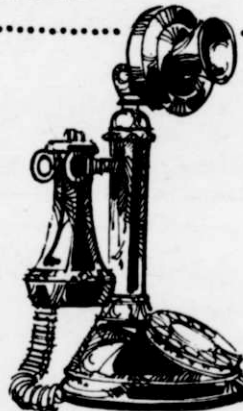

### Sengpiel, Zuehlke Are Conservation Award Winners

Ned Sengpiel of R. 2, Kewaskum, and Elmer Zuehlke, of R. 1, Kewaskum, have been chosen as the 1973 Wildlife Conservation Award winners in Washington County. They were honored at the West Bend Kiwanis Club Dinner, on Nov. 13, when Reuben Schmah, Kiwanian, in charge of the program, presented the awards.

Each year the West Bend Kiwanis Club recognizes two landowners in the county who are doing a good job conserving and developing their land for wildlife. Their projects have been entered into area competition among nine other counties in Southeastern Wisconsin. The winners are cooperators with the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District and have conservation plans for their land.

Ned Sengpiel's hobby is providing a home for wildlife on his land and to allow the retarded and handicapped children and senior citizens to use the facilities. Ned and son Bill have built 15 brush piles for rabbits; built and set out twenty nesting boxes for song birds;

provided five feeding stations and plants five acres annually in food plots; planted 11,000 feet of hedgerows consisting of multiflora rose, white pine, white spruce, Russian olive, wild grape and buffalo berry; created three wildlife ponds (potholes) by blasting; constructed two wildlife ponds which are stocked with game fish; constructed 450 ft. of level ditch for ducks; raises and releases 100 pheasants a year and planted over 25,000 trees since 1967.

Elmer Zuehlke, who owns 157 acres of land north of Kewaskum, has converted a 26 acre cropfield to tree planting. In the spring of 1972 and 1973, 20,000 trees

were planted in this area. He also planted pine and spruce trees on the edge of a 3 acre wildlife area of natural cover, which is protected from fire and grazing. Wildlife animals feed in nearby crop fields and these areas provide shelter and cover for them. Since 1970 Zuehlke has constructed two wildlife ponds which are stocked with game fish and constructed another shallow pond for ducks which is adjacent to a four acre wetland area. Seven acres of trees and shrubs are protected and managed for wildlife habitat in an upland area.

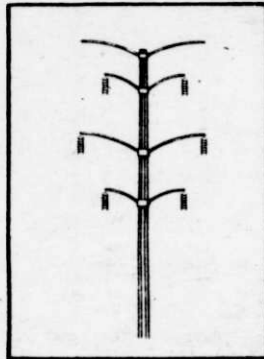


Some thought-provoking answers to the question...

## Why doesn't Wisconsin Electric put transmission lines underground?

About 90% of the subdivisions now being developed in the territory we serve are receiving electric service from underground wires. But the primary distribution wires to a subdivision carry comparatively low voltage... up to 13,200 volts.

When we talk about transmission lines, we mean high-voltage and extra high-voltage lines carrying up to 345,000 volts from power plants to distribution centers. Putting these lines underground adds up to a much greater problem in terms of technology, money and possible effect on the environment.



### THE COST IN DOLLARS... AND EFFECT ON RATES

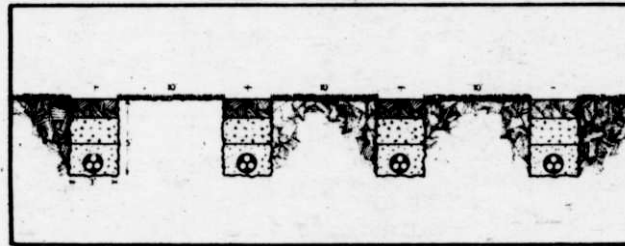
At present, it would cost from twelve to twenty times as much to put a length of high-voltage cable underground as it does to place it overhead. A double-circuit, 138,000 volt overhead line costs about \$70,000 a mile. A similar underground line would cost \$900,000 per mile... about twelve times as much.

As voltages go higher, problems and costs mount. To put a double-circuit, 345,000 volt line overhead costs \$128,000 per mile. An equal capacity underground installation would cost \$2,666,000 per mile... or more than twenty times as much!

There are many reasons for this extra expense. One is electric insulation. Overhead transmission lines utilize air as insulation. The same function is served by two inches of special materials when a 345,000 volt circuit is installed underground. The cables are pulled into a steel pipe that is then filled with oil and operated at a pressure of 200 pounds per square inch. A double-circuit, 345,000 volt cable would require 40,000 gallons of insulating oil per mile. In the highly urbanized portions of Milwaukee County, Wisconsin Electric does have approximately 40 miles of 138,000 volt transmission line underground. However, to put the balance of our present 885 miles of 138,000 volt, 127 miles of 230,000 volt and 465 miles of 345,000 volt circuits underground would cost in excess of 1 billion dollars... plus the cost of taking down existing overhead facilities. This is about as much money as we presently have invested for power plants, lines, substations, service centers... everything. A utility plant investment of this magnitude would make it necessary for bills to be at least double what they are now. But suppose all of our customers said, "Hang the expense; go ahead." What then?

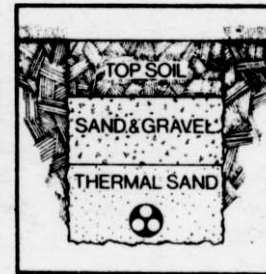
### TRENCH REQUIREMENTS - UNDERGROUND

Few people understand the potential effect of underground transmission wires on the environment, so let's consider that for a moment. Below we have illustrated a cross section view of the trench requirements for a double-circuit, 345,000 volt underground installation.




Since two underground cables are required to match the capacity of one overhead circuit, four trenches, each five feet deep and three feet wide, are needed. Because the transmission of electricity generates heat, the cables must be spaced 10 feet apart so that the heat generated in one cable does not affect an adjacent cable. To put our more than 1,450 miles of transmission lines underground, just digging the trenches would call for moving over 7,000,000 cubic yards of earth. For thermal reasons, most of this dirt can't be put back in the trench it came from. The high-voltage buried cables must be surrounded by a special thermal sand which lets the heat dissipate quickly. A layer of sand and gravel is placed on top of the thermal sand. This means millions of cubic yards of gravel and thermal sand must be dug from somewhere, poured into the trenches and covered with a layer of topsoil.

Still, everything would not be underground. Every ten miles or so the lines would have to come up and go through a compensator station, which would look something like a substation and require about two or three acres of land.



### SUMMING UP

With the technology now available, putting transmission lines underground is so costly a procedure that bills would have to be two or more times what they are now. In short, we are neither in favor of undergrounding transmission lines nor against it. We try to maintain a balanced perspective, keeping in mind that our job is to give you good service at a reasonable price while protecting the environment as much as possible.

In their contest here last week with Hartford, co-champions of the Little Ten Conference last year and one of the favorites to repeat this season, the Indians ran out of steam and were downed by the Orioles, 81-60.

Hartford was paced by its 2 ace, mainstay Jim Gaedtke and Henry Klink, who combined for a total of 47 points. Gaedtke wound up with 25 points and Klink with 22. Kewaskum countered with top scoring from Scott Koth, who had 16 points, and 3 other starters who scored in double figures.

The Indians were in the game for 3 quarters. It was 19-13 at the quarter, 35-28 at halftime and 55-47 at the end of the 3rd quarter. In fact Kewaskum pulled to within 4 points in the 3rd quarter. Then the Orioles put on a 26 point barrage in the last period to Kewaskum's 13 to pull away.

The Indians made only 8 of 17 free throws, while Hartford sank 19. The Orioles shot 44 per cent and Kewaskum was 41 per cent from the floor.

In their first win over Campbellsport Tuesday the Indians were taller for the first time than their opponents, who made up for it with quickness. After taking an early lead, the Indians fell behind at the quarter, 19-12, but then sharp shooting Scott Koth went to work and hit 3 successive baskets. Reserves Paul Petri and Tom Timblin got key baskets. Timblin tied it at 26-all and John Kellinman sank a 40 footer to give the Indians a 34-30 half-time advantage. With both teams in foul trouble, Kewaskum increased its lead to 6 points in the 3rd period, 47-41.

Koth, who has been in double figures in all 3 games, led the scorers with 21 points and Mike Koepke was next with 15. A big help was the 15 points that Petri and Timblin combined for. Miller with 16 points and Pelischek with 12 paced Campbellsport.

Kewaskum hit 27 of 54 for 50 per cent and the Cougars were only 38 per cent from the field. Both teams made good on 14 free throws.
