Area Woman 98 Years Old

A Kewaskum area native, Mrs. Caroline Kirchner, observed her 98th birthlay on Monday at The Samaritan, West Bend, where she has resided for about two years.

The former Caroline Metzger was born in the Town of Addison, on Dec. 10, 1875. She was married to August Kirchner of the Town of Wayne on April 24, 1897 and lived all of her life in the Town of Kewaskum. The couple was married in the Town of Wayne, and engaged in farming.

Mr. Kirchner was killed in an accident on Dec. 28, 1923, when an auto crashed into the horse and buggy he was driving just south of Kewaskum on Highway 45.

Three sons were born to the Kirchners-Oscar of the Town of Kewaskum, who is deceased; Erwin of the Town of Kewaskum, and Andrew of Sun City, Calif. Mrs. Kirchner has 14 grandchildren, 27 great-grandchildren, two great-great-grandchildren.

Though she is confined to a wheelchair at The Samaritan, "Grandma" Kirchner, as she is affectionately known, is bright and alert. Her memory is still keen and she is interested in what goes on about her. She enjoys having visitors.

Santa Coming

Work began on the Richfield Interchange during the week of Dec. 9. This project is designed to provide for the divided four-lane U.S. Highway 45 bypass of West Bend and the existing divided four-lane U.S.H. 41. During the course of work, S.T.H. 145 will be extended to U.S.H. 41 with interchanges at U.S.H. 45 and U.S.H. 41. Southbound traffic on U.S.H. 45 will merge with the driving lane of U.S.H. 41 when the work is complete.

Jos. D. Bonness, Inc. Wauwatosa will do the grading and paving and L. G. Arnold, Inc., of Eau Claire will construct the bridges at a total estimated cost of \$4.041,-114. The Federal Highway Administration will contribute 70% and the Wisconsin Division of Highways the remaining 30% of the necessary funds provided by highway user taxes. Walter E. Parsons, Jr., of Fond du Lac and Roger Doescher of Waukesha will be the respective project engineers.

Trucks will be hauling fill across U.S.H. 41 near Townline Road approximately one mile north of the existing U.S.H. 41 - U.S.H. 45 Interchange. Motorists are urged to use caution in this area



DEER KILL WAS 81.117 IN STATE GUN SEASON

Registrations during the 1973 deer gun season show that at least 81,117 deer were harvested, according to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

This compares to 74,827 deer taken last year, or an increase of 8 percent.

Frank Haberland, DNR's big game supervisor, said that this year's harvest was comprised of 65,383 deer taon the regular license and 15,734 quota permit deer. The DNR predicted that about 80,000 deer would be taken this year.

A total of 383 deer were registered in Washington County.



Vernon Goeden Killed in Crash

Vernon Goeden, 42, of R. 3, West Bend, brother of Willard "Billy" Goeden of St. Michaels, was fatally injured last Wednesday night when his car left the road and struck a large tree during the area's first snowstorm.

Goeden lost control while heading east on County I, .35 miles west of County M and struck a tree on the south side of the road. The mishap took place at approximately 8:15 p. m. and road conditions were snowy and icy. He died of crushing chest wounds and was pinned in his car for almost an hour before being freed and taken to St. Jo-seph's Community Hospital, West Bend, where he was pronounced dead.

Goeden was production manager of the Marban Company, Inc. He was born Feb. 28, 1931 in West Bend and married Dolores Strupp at St. Lawrence Catholic Church July 25, 1951. He was a West Bend area resident all his



Will there be enough electricity this winter in southeastern Wisconsin?

You should understand the difference in the electric supply situation between southeastern Wisconsin and some other parts of the nation. On the East Coast, for example, electricity is made mostly from oil, which is in short supply. On the Gulf Coast, electricity is made mostly from natural gas or with oil when gas is not available. Both of these are in short supply. In the Pacific Northwest electricity is made by hydro-electric plants and that area has suffered an unusual shortage of rainfall.

About fifty-eight percent of the electricity Wisconsin Electric will make this winter will come from coal. Although coal is not in critical supply at this time, its availability may become limited in the future because of unduly restrictive mining legislation, unrealistic air quality criteria, and increased requirements as industries and other utilities convert from oil and gas to coal. Most of the coal we will need this winter is already on our docks.

More than thirty-five percent of the electricity for this winter will come from our Point Beach Nuclear Plant. More than a winter's supply of nuclear fuel is already in the reactors. Wisconsin Electric's thirty-five percent nuclear generation is well ahead of the national average ... only four percent of the electricity made nationally is from nuclear energy.

Less than two percent of the electricity we will make this winter will come from oil. Much of this small percentage of oil we do use is to assure safe burning of coal in our boilers. Our boilers must be kept hot at night to pick up the morning electrical load. At night, we reduce the flow of powdered coal into our boilers. Burning could become erratic and delayed firing could result in an explosion. So we inject oil to keep the coal burning uniformly at the reduced flow. If necessary uses of electricity could be transferred from day time to late at night, we could keep the fires going with coal and further reduce our oil burn. We will also use oil this winter in emergency turbines, if necessary.

A small percentage of natural gas is also used in


peaking plants and for the downtown Milwaukee steam heating system. About three percent of the electricity we will supply this winter will come from hydro-electric plants in northern Wisconsin and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. Ground water levels in these watersheds are normal.

The purpose of this message is to provide you with facts concerning our present situation. Many very sincere people have expressed their worry to us. Many people are confused. Wisconsin Electric anticipates no blackouts or brownouts this winter. We do not expect that workers will be sent home from their jobs because of a shortage of electricity to run machines in their plants.

It is not our purpose, however, to detract from the energy conservation program. We believe that it is wrong to waste energy. And, we intend to assist other utilities whose fuels are in poorer supply to the best of our ability. Every kilowatt-hour of energy that our customers save this winter will save some basic fuel which will increase our ability to assist our neighboring utilities who are in a more unfortunate position and to increase the availability of these fuels for our system in the months to come.

Of course, ice storms this winter, or automobiles crashing into poles, and even a breakdown of one of our generators is possible. But other than for unfore-seeable accidents such as these, or governmental action such as national rationing, we expect to be able to meet this area's electric needs.

If Wisconsin Electric is in better position than utilities in other parts of the nation, it did not come about by accident. Planning and commitments made in the 1960's placed us in this favorable position. The long court fights in obtaining license approval for Point Beach Nuclear Plant will really be won by our customers this winter. Planning and commitments now must be made to meet your necessary electrical needs in the late 1970's and 1980's.
