J. O. Reigle, Founder and Chairman Of the Board of Regal Ware, Dies

James O. Reigle, 75, founder and Chairman of the Board of Regal Ware, Inc., passed away at 6:50 a. m. on Tuesday, Dec. 18, at his home located at 944 West Decorah Road, West Bend.

Reigle was widely known and respected in the housewares industry. Through his merchandising genius, Regal Ware, Inc., founded in 1945, grew from a tiny, virtually unknown company to a leader in the cookware industry. In addition to the factory and home office in Kewaskum, the company has manufacturing subsidiaries in Wooster, Ohio; Peoria, Illinois; Flora, Mississippi; and Orangeville, Ontario, Canada.

Reigle was born in Leesville, Ohio, one of a family of nine children. The family lived on a 160 acre farm and was self-sufficient even to the extent of mining coal for a while right on the property. After graduating from Carrollton High School in 1918, he enrolled at Mount Union College in Alliance, Ohio, with the intention of becoming a Methodist minister. He financed his education by working and it was through his experiences in selling brushes door-to-door during the summer vacations that Reigle knew it was his destiny to make a career of selling. On Sept. 9, 1923, he married Ruth Keeler of Barberton, Ohio.

Following his graduation from Mount Union College, he and his brother, the late Charles Reigle, set up the Reigle Sales Agency and, for five years, sold a pioneer waterless cooker with outstanding success. His dynamic sales ability did not go unnoticed and in 1927 he was offered a position with the Enterprise Aluminum Company, Massillon, Ohio. He was with Enterprise for 18 years, most of

them as vice president in charge of sales.

In 1945 he learned that a small plant, the Kewaskum Aluminum Company, located in Kewaskum, was for sale and completed its purchase on Aug. 6, 1945. The original management team included his brother, Charles; L. N. Peterson; Edna Oster and the late Al Hron. To Reigle it was the realization of his longstanding dream to manufacture the finest quality and design cooking utensils incorporating his ideas of features he believed were most important to homemakers.

The rest is history... because from a very humble beginning, the growth of Regal Ware was phenomenal and today the firm's products are sold throughout the United States and in Canada, South America, Australia and many other foreign countries. Through the years, awards from the sales profession for excellence of products and merchandising methods, special honors from U. S. Government agencies, citations from foreign dignitaries and recognition from the cookware manufacturing industry were awarded to the company and attest to the achievement of Reigle's goals.

He was devoted to his business associates and particularly proud of being cited by the AIW-AFL-CIO for the history of the excellent union-management relationship that existed at Regal Ware, Inc. through the years.

A rugged individualist, staunch Democrat, master salesman and innovator, Reigle was above all a humanitarian and, forty years before the subject was popular, he strongly supported social legislation. Early in his career he provided the impetus for

Statesman Goes Offset

If you noticed a change in the appearance of the Statesman the past few weeks it is because we have changed over to the more up-to-date and labor saving offset printing instead of the old letterpress method. Offset printing is done by cold type setting rather than hot type. In other words the type is set up, proofs taken, stripped down, laid out and pasted up on sheets, photographed and printed from aluminum plates on an offset press.

With offset printing we no longer require advertising mats. We need only the slicks or proofs of the ads to reproduce them. Of course the type matter must still be set up. The same holds true with pictures. We no longer have to have cuts or engravings made of them. All we need is the photo but all pictures submitted should be in black and white.

The papers are now also being printed earlier, on Thursday morning instead of in the evening. This way they are at the post office and outlet stands Thursday afternoon. Subscribers in most outlying areas should also receive their paper a day earlier.

In order to accomplish this all ads must be received at our office on Monday and the deadline for news copy is Tuesday afternoon.

a fund-raising campaign to get a home for the Urban League in Massillon, Ohio. He exerted his influence most recently in soliciting financial support to St. Joseph's Hospital of West Bend. As a result, the pledges of Regal employees made an important contribution to the success of the hospital's fund-raising campaign. Although too busy to actively participate, he supported various lodges, clubs, charitable, civic and religious organizations.

Reigle also held strong convictions regarding education and building the character of young people. He fostered Boy Scout and Girl Scout activities, supported programs for improving schools and established the J. O. Reigle Scholarship Program at Kewaskum High School.

A man of simple tastes, his hobbies were confined mostly to gardening and small game hunting. He believed in the importance of family solidarity and throughout his lifetime maintained close personal relationships with all of his relatives, regardless of their geographical location.

Reigle was a member of the Masonic Lodge and Nazir Grotto in Canton, Ohio; Peace United Church of Christ in Kewaskum; Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity; the West Bend Country Club; Mt. Union Alumni Association; and Metal Cookware Manu-

facturers Association.

Survivors include his wife, Ruth (nee Keeler); three sons, James and Ronald of Kewaskum, and Richard of West Bend; a sister, Mrs. O. C. Johnson of Massillon, Ohio; three daughters-in-law; 11 grandchildren; one great-grandson; and many other relatives and friends. He was pre-deceased by his brothers, Albert, Charles, Forrest, Grover, Jess, John and Wilbur.

Funeral services took place at Peace United Church of Christ on Thursday at 2:00 p. m. Interment was in Peace Church Memorial Park in Kewaskum. Indians Upset Grafton, 73-69; Rout Horicon

In the upset of the young season, the Kewaskum Indians jarred previously undefeated Grafton here Friday, 73-69. It was the first conference win for the Indians, who were 0-3, just the opposite of Grafton's 3-0. The Blackhawks were co-champs last year and were favorites to repeat.

Grafton, which kept a full court press, paid dearly in the end. They ran into serious foul trouble early and wound up losing 3 starters with 5 fouls. Pete Schmitz surprised by taking high scoring honors for the visitors with 27 points. Don Gruber led Kewaskum with 18, while Randy Koepke added 15. Kewaskum out-rebounded Grafton, 28-27, with Gruber hauling down 10. It was the 2nd time the Indians put it all together, as they did against Germantown the week before.

Kewaskum's upset of Grafton gave Mayville undisputed 1st place. They beat Pewaukee barely, 54-51. In other games Hartland won over Slinger, 62-45, and Germantown took Kettle Moraine, 63-55.
