Sewage Charge Changes to Benefit Households, Schools, Hit Industry

There will be some changes
in the sewage service charges
in Kewaskum. It will mean
a reduced rate for many
households' but industry can
expect a big jump. Schools
can expect a drop in rate,
also.

The village board met Wednesday night to review a revised ordinance which sets forth the service charges that must be established to comply with new requirements of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in order for the village to qualify for a federal grant on additions made to the village treatment plant last year.

The expansion cost, including engineering and related fees, came to \$49,000. A 25 per cent grant has already been received from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Résources. When the village meets the EPA requirements, it can expect a federal grant to cover 50 to 55 per cent of the expansion costs.

Meeting with the board was Dr. Raymond Kipp, professor of civil engineering at Marquette University who at board request prepared the ordinance revision and who is working with the EPA to meet its requirements. One of them is that all users must "pay their way" equitably.

The sewage rates now in force are not equitable by EPA standards. Presently, the single family household pays a flat quarterly charge of \$14, regardless of how much water is used. Under the revised ordinance, the sewage charge will be based on water usage.

Based on Dr. Kipp's preliminary and unofficial figures, the rate is expected to be about 80 cents per 1,000 gallons of water used quarterly. He noted that figure could change as much as 10 cents after he refines his figures.

In arriving at his figures, Dr. Kipp delved into records at the village commissioner's office and found that 77 per cent of the households use less than 25,000 gallons of water per quarter. The families that use the least water will benefit the most from the new rate.

Likewise, he said, industry must pay its equitable share. Firms listed in that category are Regal Ware Inc., Fairmont Foods, Kewaskum Frozen Foods and the L. Rosenheimer Malt and Grain Co. For them the new rates will be a jolt, he indicated. Some commercial firms are likely to get a boosted rate from the flat fee being paid now.

Presently, industry pays a sewage charge based on metering of the discharges that go into the treatment plant. Once each quarter 24-hour samples are taken, every hour on the hour and

they are sent to Marquette University where they are analyzed for quantity of biochemical demand (b.o.d.); phosphate and s u s p e n d e d solids. Their rates vary, based on the computation of the results. Industry will continue to be metered but the rates will be upped.

A public hearing will be held on the revised ordinance when it is complete. The ordinance will then go before the village board for adoption.

Present rates have been in effect since Jan. 1, 1972, when they were raised to generate more income to meet the projected operating costs of the expanded sewage treatment facility. Dr. Kipp made a similar study at that time and came up with the new rates.

The original plant was built in 1955 at a cost of \$250,000 and operated at a loss through the years.

Lab Equipment Layouts for New School Approved

Approval of equipment layouts for science and home economics labs in the new Middle School was among business transacted at the school board meeting held last Tuesday evening. These layouts were necessary in order to proceed with plumbing details for the new school.

Jan. 2 instead of Jan. 3 will be the first day of school following Christmas vacation. This was a date agreed to by a Board and Teacher Committee some time ago as a make-up day for possible snow vacations. If it is not needed, schools will be dismissed one day early at the end of the school year.

end of the school year. Clark Pearson, high school principal, discussed curricu-lum changes and scheduling plans for next year. Included in the curriculum changes will be additions of courses in technical math, successful selling, and auto mechanics. Physical education will be an elective for seniors next year rather than a required course. The schedule for next year will be on a six-day rotation as it is this year, but the day for high school students will be lengthened as it will for junior high. With the elimination of the split shift, the schools will return to normal

starting and ending times.

Ken Erickson, junior high principal, discussed the snowmobile safety course run last year. The board approved running the program again this year.

Adrianne Dolata was approved as home economics teacher to begin second semester. She will replace Mrs. Wilting, who resigned.

The resignation of a village
patrolman was accepted and
a replacement was agreed
upon during a meeting of the
village board Wednesday

A letter of resignation from
James A. Wichtowski was
read. He has been on the
force since February of this
year. The man who will
replace him as of Dec. 26
will be Thomas Bauer, 22, of
West Bend, presently employed at the West Bend Co.,
but not in police work.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty said Bauer took the local written examination the last time applications for vacan-

cies were taken.

Wichtowski's resignation is effective Dec. 31. As of Jan.

1, he will join the Washington County Sheriff's Department.

His letter stated that he will

be receiving more pay in his new job and added that he feels "it is too bad" Kewaskum does not offer a better pay scale.

Chief H I a v a t y expressed regret over again losing a patrolman because of the village pay scale. Wichtowski is not the first to leave because of it. The three-man Kewaskum force (excluding the chief) in October asked the village board to accept both a constitution recognizing them as the Kewaskum Police Association as well as an a c c o m p a n y i n g salary proposal.

Members of the village board will meet in early January on the subject of readjusting salaries for its employes.


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



Hot Hartland Team Defeats Indians, 68-49

The Indians played away from home again Friday and took one on the chin again when they were downed by red hot Hartland Arrowhead, 68-49. It was Kewaskum's 3rd straight conference setback on the road and left. them with a 1-4 record and a 3-way tie for last with Slinger and Kettle Moraine.

Hartland hit a sizzling 68 per cent of its shots (30 of 44), including 80 per cent in the 2nd half (16 of 20). Their shooting was fantastic as they demolished the Indians by a 19 point margin.

Arrowhead made good on 9 of 15 field goals in the 1st quarter and jumped off to a 22-8 lead, paced by Keith Chapman with 8 points. He was high scorer of the game with 20 points. Kewaskum gave Hartland a run in the 2nd quarter, cutting their advantage to 8 points but fell behind at halftime by ten, 36-26. Mike Koepke made 14 points for the Indians and was their top scorer with 17.

Kewaskum never threatened after that as the winners built up their lead, outpointing the Indians in the 3rd stanza, 16-13, and in the final quarter, 16-10. Arrowhead's defensive play contin-uel to stop the Indians' fast break

While Arrowhead hit on 30 of 45 shots, Kewaskum hit a poor 21 of 53. Hartland also out-rebounded the losers, 25-22. Mueller had 9 rebounds for Arrowhead while Don Gruber grabbed 7 for Kewas-

In the JV game Kewaskum won by a big margin.

In other Scenic contests a torrid Mayville team remained undefeated at the top of the standings by handing Grafton its 2nd loss, 54-51, Germantown held onto 2nd place with a 78-48 romp over Pewaukee, and Kettle Moraine won its first victory ov-
