Apartment Owner, Board Dispute Carrying Out of Requirements

One of the owners of a 16-unit apartment building here appeared before the village board Monday night, at board request, to answer why some village requirements had not been complied with.

Richard L. Edwards, part owner of the building at the corner of Railroad and First Streets, was advised of the charges last month by letter from Village Commissioner William Martin. That letter and Edwards' reply were read at the meeting.

According to Edward Brandt, village building inspector, water from the roof is draining across the sidewalk, causing icy sidewalks on the west side; a sump pump was being drained into the sanitary sewer; a fence had not been erected as promised and Edwards had not complied with a request that a small shed be roofed and sided to match the apartment building after being given permission to move the shed on that condition.

Edwards said that part of the sump pump drainage problem has been corrected.

Brandt said Edwards was told to install underground electric coil on the sidewalk in question. Edwards said he had ordered coil but did not install it after conferring with a village employe who suggested he wait to see if it would really be a problem. "If there is water on the sidewalk, we'll correct it," said Edwards.

He added that the real problem is on the southwest corner where water drains from the parking lot over the sidewalk and freezes. Edwards stated that he did not know he was committed to having to change the roof and siding to match the apartment building. "Don't you think this is unreasonable," he said.

He said the shed has been respectably repaired and blends in with surrounding buildings. "I think you're over-stepping your authority to tell people what they can put on a building, he told the board. "Why must it be the same as the apartment building?" he wanted to know.

Edwards was told that the board was concerned over the shed's previous shabby appearance and permission to move it was granted on the condition that it would be made to look like the apartment. Trustee Daniel Schmidt then read the order from the May 22 board minutes which stated that Richard Zarling, zoning administrator, had asked in behalf of Edwards for permission to move the shed.

Edwards contended that he did not ask Zarling to appear in his behalf, that he only asked him if it could be moved and where in regard to the lot line. The controversy was tabled and Edwards and Zarling will be asked to jointly attend a future meeting, inas-

much as Edwards said he was unaware of the order. As Village President Charles Miller put it, "there seems to be a lack of communication."

Edwards observed that motion was made "under an individual's personal feelings." A board member commented that "the shed looks O.K. now but when the motion was made, it did look shabby."

H. B. and L. L. Rosenheimer appeared to discuss the possible sale of a strip of land totalling about two acres to the village. It lies west of Hillside Drive adjacent to what will be Roseland Hills addition No. 2 and consists of a strip of about 66 feet by about 460 feet. Part of the 66 feet would be used for a road when Forest Avenue is extended to the west.

When asked what the asking price would be, L. L. Rosenheimer replied, "the same price you are paying Spoerl." (The land runs to the Spoerl property on which the village recently took an option at \$2,200 an acre). Rosenheimer said the strip is of no value to them. The village approached Rosenheimers some time ago on the idea of possibly donating the strip to the village. The board voted to table Rosenheimer's proposal to sell.

A bid from Central Engineering Co. of Milwaukee to furnish a snow plow for \$2,850 plus \$190 for reinforcement and frame extension was accepted. It was the low bid of two when opened Dec. 19 but it was not let until it was determined that the price included installation.

Bartender's licenses were approved for Mrs. Althea Keller and Kenneth Neldner.

It was reported Woolman will accept employment at Regal Ware, Inc. and a replacement for him on the force is expected to be hired by the time his resignation becomes effective.

Village President Plans Meeting on Recycling Project

Village President Charles Miller has announced that he is interested in a recycling project for the Village of Kewaskum.

Seeking a local organization or civic group to take charge of collections, he said he plans to call a meeting in the near future. At the moment, Miller said he is thinking mainly of paper in view of the acute paper shortage and the price being paid for it.

The village would not do the actual recycling but would sell the paper to a salvage company. Not only would it help the paper shortage but it would save money for the village considering that it pays \$9.60 to deposit a load of refuse to a sanitary landfill site near Lomira. Many residents dispose of old newspapers with garbage.

Miller hopes organizations and civic groups will consider the idea and come to the meeting with suggestions. The date will be announced later.

FIREMEN ANSWER FIRST CALL IN FIVE MONTHS

The Kewaskum firemen were almost taken by surprise last Friday afternoon, Jan. 4, when they received their first fire call in exactly five months. The last call was last Aug. 4.

Firemen were summoned at 4:25 p. m. to the Homer Schaub residence at 1512 Riverview Dr. where a ballast in the kitchen ceiling burned out, causing minor damage. Some wires leading to the ballast burned and the ceiling was charred.

11 Fire, 102 Ambulance Calls Answered in '73

At the regular monthly meeting of the Kewaskum Fire Department last Thursday night, Chief Armin Oppermann announced that the department answered 11 fire and 102 ambulance calls during 1973.

Of the 11 fires, five of them were in the village and the other six were rural fires. The firemen also received one mutual aid call from the West Bend Department. The fire calls were down from 1972 when 16 were answered, seven in the village and nine rural.

The department also had fewer ambulance calls. The 102 figure was down 26 from the year before, when 128 were answered.

The only serious fire in 1973 was the Vic Arnold house trailer blaze on April 7.

At Thursday's meeting firemen were reminded that the annual stag party will be held Saturday, Jan. 19, at the fire house and the annual banquet for wives and lady friends will take place Saturday, Feb. 16, at the Wigwam.

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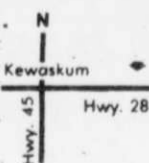

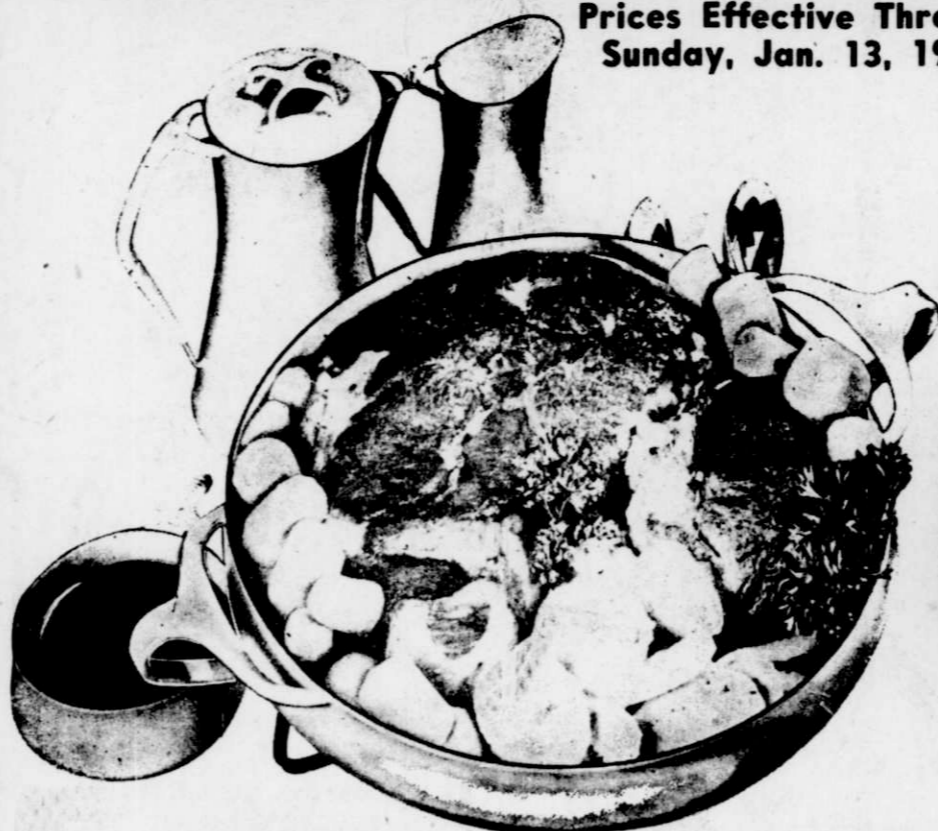

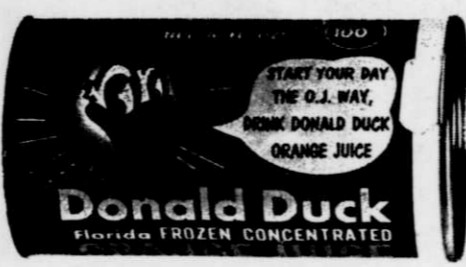
