

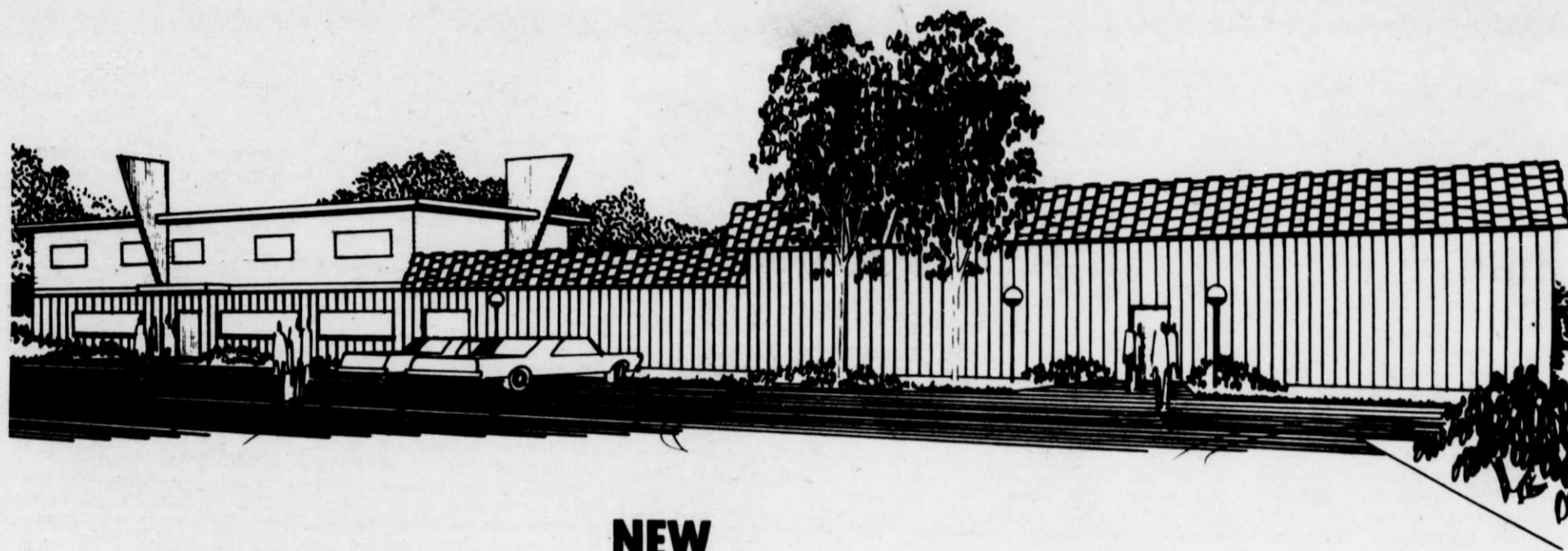

NEW AMERAHN DANCE HALL KEWASKUM, WISCONSIN

The beautiful, new Amerahn Dance Hall, located ½ mile north of Kewaskum on Hwy. 45, is now completed except for some minor inside trim and finishing work. Owners of Amerahn are Steve and Mary Rahn and their son-in-law and daughter, Allen and Jeanne Amerling.

Amerahn sponsors dances with live music every Friday night and several other parties, dances and a wedding have already been held in the hall. Most Saturdays in 1974 have already been booked for the hall and there are bookings for many other nights. However, some Saturdays are still open. The hall is available for public use.

Work began last June when trees in the wooded area surrounding the existing building were removed. Construction work started early in July and the all steel structure was erected in October.

The new construction is 120 by 70 feet in size and the spacious hall measures 70 by 80 feet. This was added to the 60 by 60 foot existing building. Capacity of the hall, which is completely air conditioned, is 600 people. Approximately 400 persons can be seated to eat at one time.

The dancing area of the hall covers 4,900 square feet and the floor is constructed of plastic impregnated oak. The hall has an acoustical suspended ceiling and includes a large 12 by 24 foot all-carpeted stage. It also contains two bars — a 40 foot U shaped bar off a hallway near the west entrance and a 20 foot straight bar set off to the side of the stage. Another oval bar in the adjoining existing building gives another 65 feet of bar space for large gatherings.

There will be a 70 foot folding door across the length of the hall to divide it in half

for either one or two smaller gatherings or it can be kept open for a larger affair.

There is a small kitchen for catering use and large, modern ladies' and men's rest rooms constructed of block. The ladies' room is in a green shade and the men's in bitter-sweet and both have ceramic tile floors. The cloak room measures 14 by 20 feet and has four rows of hangers.

Colored chairs in six different shades surround the dancing area and there are also tables and chairs in the hall for service at smaller dances and parties. The interior of the building has fluorescent and spot lighting throughout.

There are five entrances to the new hall, two in front and three in back, including a large double 8 foot door. All food will be catered at the present time.

The parking lot has also been enlarged. Parking space has been added in the rear and the front parking lot has also been enlarged.

Three Enter Race For School Board

Perschbacher Sells to Miller's

After many years the Perschbacher name will no longer be connected with the old stand at 1317 - 1325 Fond du Lac Ave.

In a business transaction agreed to this week, the complete real estate, north of Miller's Furniture Store, which belonged to Myron and Lazeda Perschbacher, was sold to E. E. "Pat" Miller of Miller's Inc.

This property, which consisted of the homestead, parking lot and the implement shop, was in the Perschbacher name since 1897. Arey A. Perschbacher, father of Myron, had a blacksmith shop, wagon, carriage and bob sled factory in this building for many years. When the Model "T" Ford started to take over for the horse and buggy, he changed to selling and servicing automobiles and the name to Rex Garage. The tractor took over on the farm, so he changed from the horse drawn machinery to tractors and tractor equipment.

At the time of his death in 1942 his son, Myron, bought the shop from the Perschbacher family, consisting of two other brothers and his three sisters. Myron added lawn and garden equipment to the lines already being sold and serviced at this time. In the last ten years the lawn and garden equipment was the major part of the business.

Myron would like to thank everyone for the dealings he had with them in the past 45 years. He will still be at the shop until May 1, when Miller's will take possession. An auction is being planned for the very near future for the complete sell out of all per-

sonal property.

Now the name will be changed to Miller's and Myron Perschbacher is sure it will be a great change, with the ambitious Miller organization as the new owner. They have great plans for the future.

Miller's of Kewaskum have been well known in both the furniture business and funeral service for many years. In 1910 Mr. and Mrs. Edward F. Miller purchased the business from Frank Zwasehka, which at that time was a rather small store with living quarters upstairs. In 1928 E. E. "Pat" Miller joined his parents in the business. Shortly after his marriage in 1929 "Pat" and his wife Mave formed a business corporation with his parents, and soon after they added an addition to the rear of the old store.

In 1933 "Pat" purchased the Joseph Schmidt home on Forest Ave. and converted part of it into a funeral home. After several additions and improvements it today is a spacious, homelike funeral home. On Jan. 2, 1942 Miller's Furniture Store was destroyed by fire. Due to wartime restrictions they could not rebuild immediately so Miller's Furniture was temporarily located in the building now occupied by Burckhardt's until April, 1946 when their present new furniture store was ready for occupancy.

Miller's of Kewaskum has long been a family business, as at an early age Pat's brothers Joe and Fred also became active in the business, and then through the years so did his children, Mary Ellen, Donna, Joan, Ed, Isabelle, Ted and Clare, daughter-in-law Sharron, and wife

Virginia.

E. E. "Pat" Miller said that the Perschbacher property was purchased for future expansion. As the old saying goes, "You can't stand still—you must look into the future."

High School Has Early Morning Fire Wednesday

Kewaskum High School escaped serious damage in an early morning fire Wednesday that started in a storage room, adjacent to the stage area.

According to school officials, the fire was discovered at 6:45 Wednesday morning by Eugene Muench, school custodian. Muench noticed heavy smoke in the gym area, and then summoned Fire Chief Armin Oppermann. In the meantime, the smoldering fire was located in a storage closet, used to store flats and equipment for play productions.

The fire was apparently caused by stage curtains lying next to a hot incinerator pipe. According to fire officials, the fire was retarded because the stage curtains were flame resistant.

No estimate of damage was available, since many of the flats used in an upcoming school production had been removed earlier by school personnel.

No alarm was sounded for the fire, and all classes were held.

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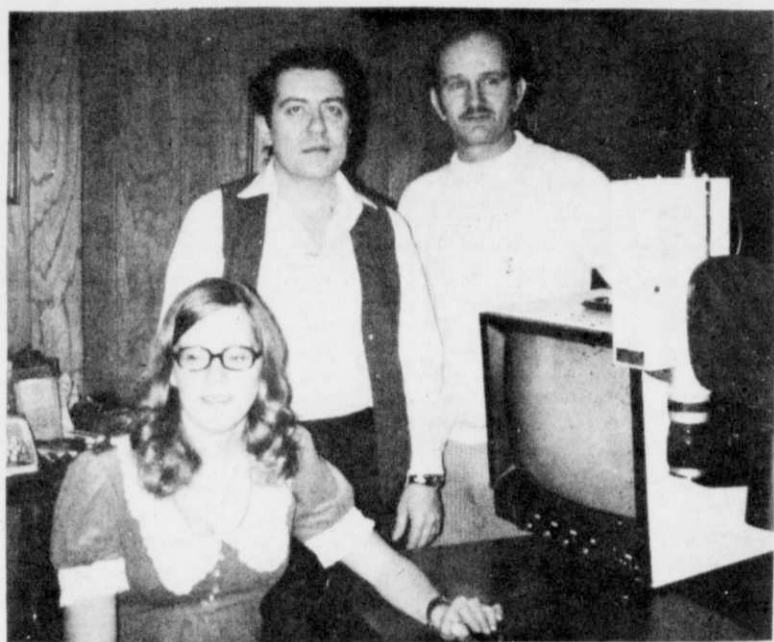

Haug was born June 13, 1923 at Kewaskum, where he grew up. He attended Holy Trinity School and after graduation he attended St. Francis Seminary, where he received a bachelor of arts degree. Haug served in World War II from April 1945 until his discharge in October of 1946. He then became associated with his father in the roofing business, and in 1951 acquired ownership and formed the C. W. Haug and Sons Roofing Contracting business. He operated this at Kewaskum until 1962, and then moved the operation to West Bend and was active in the business up to the time of his death.

He was married to Rosemary Comfort at St. Gabriel, Calif. on Feb. 19, 1949.

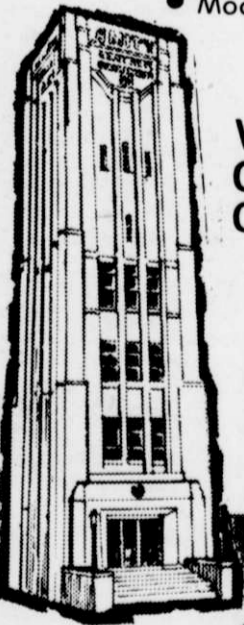

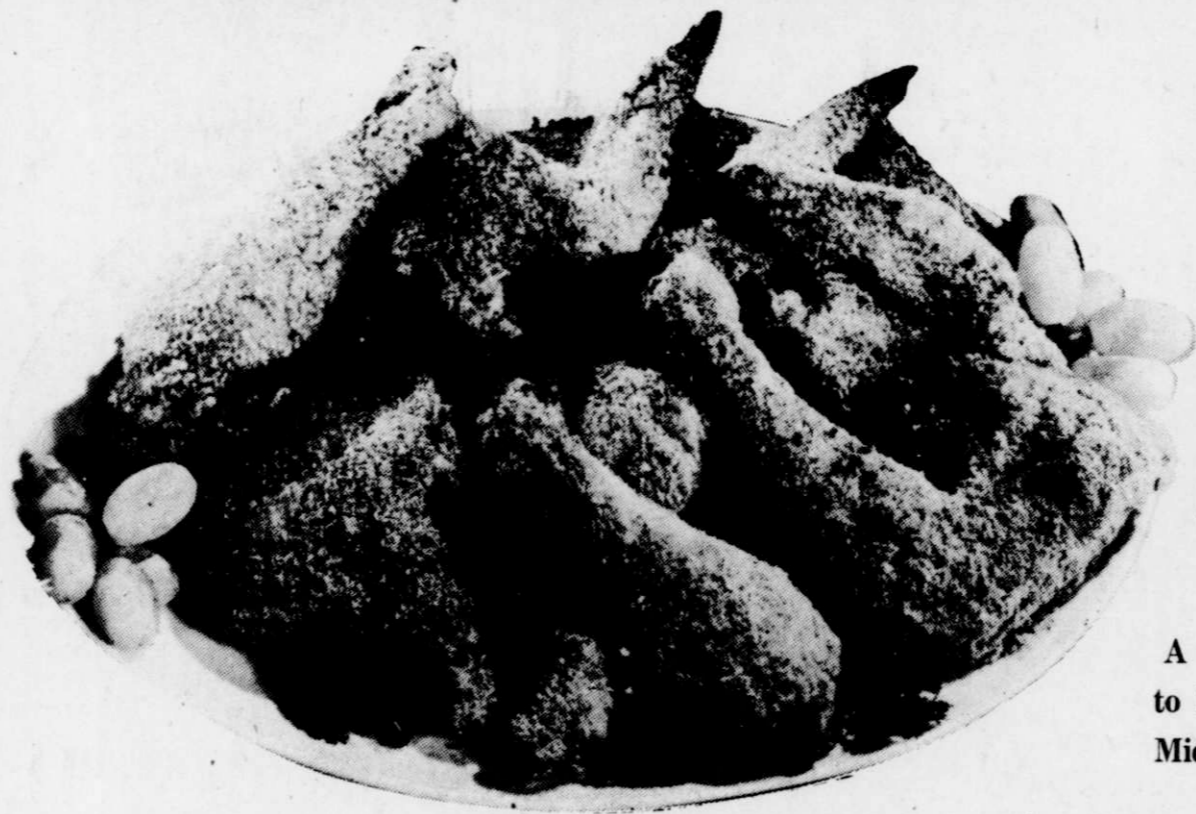

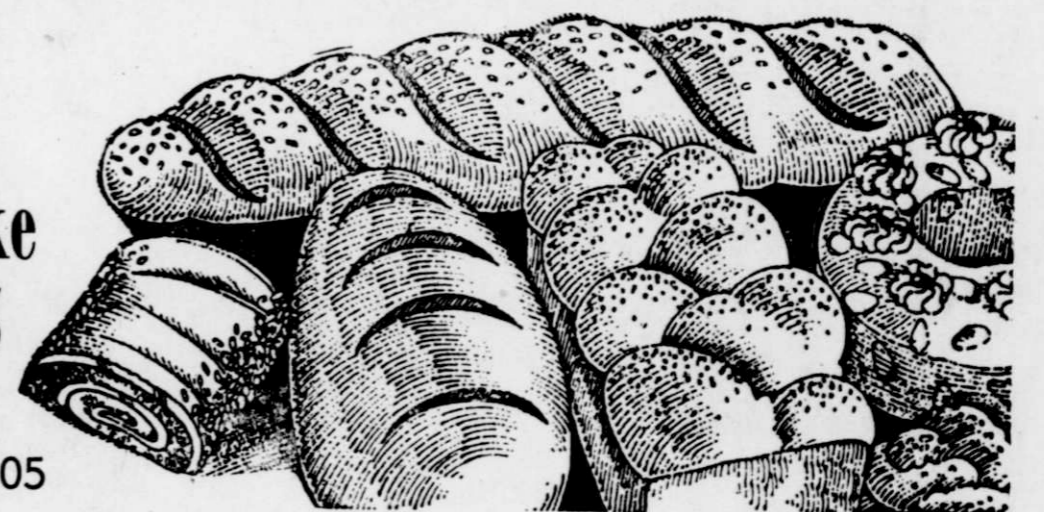

Approval for High School Addition Given

Approval for the basic high school addition was given at the Board of Education meeting held Jan. 14. The new building will include over 13,000 feet of shop area plus mezzanine storage, and a new gymnasium to seat 1,500 with expansion possible in the future. Construction on this phase of the building program will begin as soon as weather permits. It is hoped the shops can be occupied by school starting in the fall, with the gym ready by November. The present shop areas will be used for graphic arts, locker rooms, and a wrestling-gymnastics area. The addition will be located to the west of the present shops.

Basic plans to return to hiring custodians rather than contracting for these services was approved, and a change in parochial bussing boundaries was tentatively approved.

It was agreed that approximate times next year would be 7:45 to 2:45 for grades 7-12 and 9:00 to 3:30 or 3:35 for elementary students. These times will keep to a minimum elementary students boarding busses in the dark during the winter. It will also allow for running separate busses for 7-12 and K-7. This eliminates disci-

pline problems caused by wide age differences of bus riders and holds a potential savings of \$20,000 to \$30,000 for the district compared to bringing all students in on the same busses.

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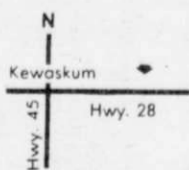

Schlaefter Will Again Head Archbishop's Fund Appeal



Leo F. Schlaefter, partner in the West Bend law firm of Schloemer, Schlaefter, Gordon & Alderson, will serve as Washington County chairman for the 1974 Archbishop's Fund Appeal. The announcement was made by John F. Cota, general chairman of the annual Catholic fund campaign which will be conducted in spring in the ten counties of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee.

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Fuel Crisis Discussed by Snowmobilers

At our December monthly meeting the New Fane Kettle Riders Snowmobile Club discussed the impact of the gasoline shortage on recreation and specifically snowmobiling. It was decided by the group that there should be strict compliance with the national policy to reduce gasoline consumption by ten to fifteen percent by all users including snowmobilers.

With this in mind, the following steps will be taken by the club. First, eliminate most of the trail rides planned for the season. Second, each individual snowmobiler should voluntarily cut his or her own driving by about fifteen. Third, reduce the total number of machines by riding together. Fourth, members were reminded to mix their fuel properly and keep their machines in good mechanical condition to get more mileage from each gallon of fuel. The group hopes through its example that many other snowmobilers will join us in our effort to conserve.

Mr. and Mrs. Glen Mueller, our safety instructors, announced to the membership present that 22 children, between the ages of 11 and 14, graduated from the fall training session held Dec. 1 and Dec. 8. This program was held in co-operation with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. The purpose of the classes was to educate the children in the safe operation of a snowmobile and the respect of other people's rights and property. We sincerely congratulate the children of the surrounding area who graduated from our class.

In keeping with the club policy of community service, the membership brought groceries and canned goods to the monthly meeting, which were packed in decorative boxes, to be given to several area residents as Christmas gifts. A Christmas gift of a large fruit basket was also given to the Beechwood Nursing Home for the residents.

One of the highlights of the evening was the showing of three films by Robert Staehler, president of the Kewaskum Sno-Chiefs Snowmobile Club. The first two films were safety films presented

by the Scorpion and Ski Doo Corporations. The third was a slide presentation by the Marshfield Clinic from their survey of snowmobile accident cases.

At this time the New Fane Kettle Riders Snowmobile Club would like to urge each snowmobiler to stay on marked trails and off roadways for their own safety and to eliminate accidents. We also urge all responsible snowmobilers, who enjoy their sport, and do not belong to an organized snowmobile club, to join a club in their community. It is our sincere belief that through the clubs our sport will be safer and our image better, and you will receive more personal enjoyment of the sport.

Again, our sincere thanks to all the landowners for the use of their land for club trails this season.

We remind all snowmobilers again, SNOWMOBILING IS A PRIVILEGE, NOT A RIGHT.

As a snowmobile group we were shocked by the shooting incident of a rural Allenton snowmobiler. We regret that incidents like this happen. We offer our deepest sympathy to both families involved.
