Students, Chamber of Commerce Conduct Local Business Survey

Students of the Kewaskum Community High School in cooperation with the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce conducted a recent survey of Kewaskum business. Preliminary results of approximately one hundred shoppers interviewed by the students indicate that over 35% of the people polled like shopping in Kewaskum but that 63% do half or less of their shopping here.

Most of the shopping is done in West Bend and Fond du Lac, respectively. The primary reasons for shopping elsewhere are larger selection and lower prices. Most people were, however, quite pleased with the service and products received from Kewaskum businessmen.

When asked most people stated they would like to see more businesses in Kewaskum. Most frequently mentioned were grocery, discount, hobby and hardware stores, quick-service restaurants and more entertainment for all ages.

Most people stated that they did not find parking a problem in Kewaskum, as they usually walk.

The survey will be continued and the public is invited to participate. A survey of Kewaskum business by businessmen is also planned. The results of both surveys will be used by the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce to help meet the needs of the buying public and Kewaskum businessmen.

ENERGY TO BE TOPIC OF ENVIRONMENTAL MEET

Energy will again be the main topic of discussion at the Jan. 30 meeting of the Washington County Environmental Council. The 8 p. m. meeting will be held at the West Bend Public Library. Maurice Hovland, Washington County Agent, will review the energy situation and plans will be made for getting the information into the hands of the people.

Chairman Albert Schroeder, R. 2, West Bend, said there will be a proposal to elect a board of directors for the council and other amendments to the constitution. Planning of the year's programs will also be done.

The council is open to any resident of Washington County. Dues are a dollar a year.

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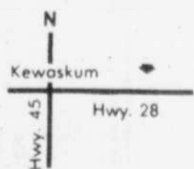

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Natural radiation is all around us. Compute your own exposure, then see what Point Beach Nuclear Plant adds... if anything.

Radiation is measured in "rems" — established amounts of biological effect from radiation exposure. A millirem is one thousandth of that amount.

The amount of natural radiation you receive depends on several factors including the elevation at which you live. Persons living at sea level get 40 millirems of cosmic radiation per year. For every 100 feet above sea level you get one more millirem per year. Thus, residents of Albuquerque (elevation 4,943 feet) receive an average of 89 millirems of cosmic radiation per year. Wisconsinites, living at an average of 600 feet elevation, receive only about 46 millirems of cosmic radiation per year.

On the average, Wisconsin residents receive a total of 215 millirems a year from *all* sources, including cosmic radiation; radiation from food, water, buildings, soil and rocks; and medical sources such as x-rays. Residents of Albuquerque receive an average of 258 millirems from all sources.

Indians Upset Mayville, Lose To Germantown

Those unpredictable Indians did it again Friday night here when they jolted leading Mayville in a big upset, 55-50. It was the second straight loss for the Cardinals, who were sailing along with an overall 9-0 record, 6-0 in the conference, and were ranked third in the state among the middle 10 schools before also being upset by Slinger the week before by one point.

Kewaskum kills the giants but can't seem to beat the weaker teams. Their only other victory came earlier over Grafton, which also knocked them out of first place at the time. And they almost upset third place Germantown in a 76-74 squeaker in their first meeting. All of these games were at home. Away from home the Indians haven't shown anything and have yet to win a conference game. But they have been poison to contenders in their own "snake-pit."

This held true again Saturday night at Germantown where they were routed by 19 points by the same team they held to a 2 point victory at home. The final score was 74-55. The Indians feeble performance was just the opposite of the one against Mayville.

Kewaskum beat Mayville without Scott Koth, its top scorer, who pulled an achilles tendon in practice. Tom Timblin filled in for him and

scored 9 points, all of them in the second half, and made 7 out of 8 free throws, 7 of them in a row, when it counted down the stretch.

Kewaskum's win over Mayville was more convincing than the score indicates. The Indians jumped off to a 6-0 lead over the cold shooting Cardinals and never trailed. They held a surprising 17-9 advantage in the first quarter and 25-19 at halftime. At one time in the third period Kewaskum was ahead by 12 points, 39-27. Mayville ran into serious foul trouble late in the game and lost its top two scorers, Tom Fischer and Lud Wurtz on fouls. Persha also fouled out.

Fischer fouled out with only seconds left in the third quarter, while Wurtz went out with 2:05 left in the game. The 6-3 Wurtz kept Mayville in the game in the second half when he scored 14 of his 23 points and left with Kewaskum ahead by 6 points, 51-45. The Indians led by 10 points, 55-45, with 49 seconds left before Mayville scored the final 5 points.

Don Gruber was a stand-out for the Indians with 18 points and 13 rebounds. Doug Bilgo and Randy Koepke played well and each scored 12 points. Kewaskum's starters included 4 juniors and Koth is also a junior. All 5 will be back next year.

Saturday night Kewaskum was able to stay with Germantown's "Giants" for only the first quarter, which ended 13-13. Then their height advantage and the absence of Koth began taking its toll. The Warhawks jumped off to

an early 10-2 lead, with 6-8 Fred Neumann getting some easy shots. At the start of the second quarter the Indians, led by Randy Koepke's shooting, took a brief 21-17 lead, but then Germantown took over, outscoring Kewaskum 21-10 in the 2nd period and 21-13 in the 3rd. Both teams tallied 19 in the last stanza.

With Terry Mattson and Scott Goodwill in foul trouble, sub Brian Krueger came in and sparked the Warhawks in the 2nd quarter with 6 quick points to lead them to a 34-23 halftime lead. In this time Germantown scored 15 straight points.

Gruber was the bright spot for the losers in the 2nd half. He scored 14 points, adding to his 2 in the first half, to pace Kewaskum. R. Koepke had 13 and M. Koepke 10. Koth attempted to play but his injury hampered him too much. Krueger and Marv Hantke led the Warhawks with 16 points each. With their height Germantown was able to snare 35 rebounds to Kewaskum's 20.

After losing their first game of the season to Kettle Moraine in overtime, 49-44, the week before, the JV's bounced back to make their record 7-1 with victories over Mayville and Germantown. Friday it was Indians 69, Mayville 40, and Saturday Kewaskum beat Germantown 65-51. Tom Edwards was top point getter against Mayville with 17 and Dennis Bremser was tops in the Germantown contest with 21.

This Friday the Indians

host Pewaukee and Tuesday they play a make-up game at Slinger, postponed from Jan. 4.
