Debra Strigenz Family Leader Of Tomorrow



Debra A. Strigenz has been named Kewaskum Community High School's 1974 Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow. Miss Strigenz won the honor by scoring high in a written knowledge and attitude examination administered to high school seniors here and throughout the country Dec. 4. She will receive a specially designed award from General Mills, sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for Leadership in Family Living and also remains eligible for state and national honors.

From the ranks of all school winners in the state, a State

Family Leader of Tomorrow is selected through judging centered on test performance and receives a \$1,500 college scholarship. The second-ranking student in the state will receive a \$500 scholarship. Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corporation will present "The Annals of America," a 20-volume reference work, to the state winner's school.

Representing every state and the District of Columbia, the 51 Betty Crocker Family Leaders of Tomorrow, together with a faculty advisor, will gather in Washington, D.C. in April, for an expense-paid educational tour of the capital city and Minneapolis, Minn. During the tour, personal observations and interviews are added to state level judging which results in the selection of the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, who receives a \$5,000 college scholarship. Second, third and fourth place national winners receive scholarships increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

The test, personal observations and interviews are all prepared and conducted by Science Research Associates of Chicago.

This year 703,074 students from 14,463 schools were enrolled in the program.

Approximately nine million students have taken part in the program since its inception in the 1954-55 school year and, with this year's grants, total scholarship awards will exceed \$2 million.

Kindergarten Pupils to Be Registered

This year's annual "round-up" for the parents of prospective kindergarten pupils in the Kewaskum school district will be held during the day on Tuesday, Feb. 12, and Wednesday, Feb. 13, from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon, and 1:00 to 3:00 p. m. in the Beechwood, Farmington, Kewaskum, and Wayne school offices. Please register your child at the school in your area. It is not necessary to bring the child while registering.

To be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten, children must have attained their fifth birthday prior to Dec. 1, 1974. Evidence of date of birth, either a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate, must be brought to the office at the time of enrolling.

Parents of bus pupils will need their section number and fire number as well and also fill out bussing forms.

Parents will register their children for next year's term and get the necessary health forms. If you know of any new families in this district, please pass this information on to them.

Richard E. Zarling, Director of Elementary Education, would like to impress upon you the importance of registering your child on either of these two days so that plans may be made for them.

This is the third year Kewaskum High School has had an early graduation policy, for which the student must make a formal application, which includes a letter from the student telling what his plans are after graduation and the parents.

Each student is then evaluated by three high school faculty members, a guidance counselor and the high school principal. The application can be approved, denied or given with certain stipulations. The students must have fulfilled the basic graduation requirements as far as credits are concerned.

20 Inches of Snow in Worst Storm in Years

This area was clobbered with approximately 20 inches of snow Tuesday and Wednesday in the heaviest snowfall in years. At this writing late Wednesday afternoon the snow was still coming down heavily with more of blowing and drifting snow predicted.

Schools in the Kewaskum district and county were closed Tuesday and Wednesday. Classes for elementary school students were cancelled before the buses went out Tuesday morning. Students in junior high and the high school were sent home at 8:30 a. m.

Regal Ware plant closed down at noon Tuesday and no shifts reported to work Wednesday.

Members of the Village Board Monday night authorized advertising for bids for phosphate removal and related equipment and set March 4 as the bid opening date.

On orders of the Department of Natural Resources, the village must remove phosphate from its sewage effluent. Robinson and Welch, consulting engineers, will advertise for bids for phosphate removal equipment, lab equipment, a small truck and a portable generator.

The village trustees also agreed to having Robinson and Welch prepare plans and specifications for utilities in the proposed James Schulz subdivision at the west village limits, the cost of which is borne by the subdivider. The engineering firm wanted the village board aware that Schulz had asked the firm to prepare plans; and village "blessing" was asked for so it would not appear as a conflict of interest.

Approval was given to survey maps concerning lot division on parcels of land owned individually by Myron Belger and Schulz. In both instances, a single lot was divided into two. In Belger's case, his recent request to build an 8-unit apartment building was turned down. The lot on which the apartment was planned will now be used for two single-family dwellings. The survey maps previously had Plan Commission approval.

Village Attorney Roger McKenna was instructed to draft a resolution re-naming The Kewaskum Statesman as official publication for the Village, and at the same time to rescind a previous resolution that had named the West Bend News as official

Almost all meetings and events were cancelled. Highway crews were battling to keep main roads open. Snow plowers and shovellers were everywhere digging out. Ten foot drifts were common in the rural areas and huge piles of snow 10 and 12 feet high were deposited by plows on village streets and parking lots. The snow was accompanied by 20 mile an hour winds with gusts up to 30. With schools and factories shut down, snowmobilers were out by the hundreds enjoying themselves.

Village crews did a fast job of clearing the streets. They started plowing at 3 a. m. on Wednesday and before noon had most of the snow hauled away from the main streets but were kept busy all day plowing and hauling snow. Towing servicemen had a booming business. Rural mail deliveries were halted.

Snow has fallen every day so far in February.

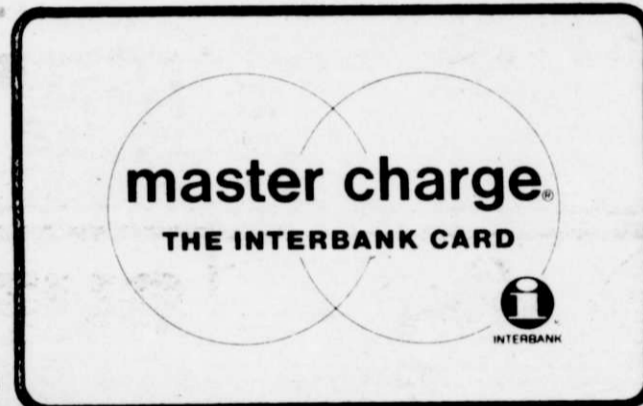

SAINT VALENTINE

'Tis said that on Saint Valentine's Day the Patron Saint will smile on maidens the world over. In medieval times the first youth who saw a maiden in the morning, or the youth whose name she drew from a box, was her "valentine," or chivalrous knight. He gave her a gift, often flowers, and attended her gallantly.

The origin of the day concerns a priest named Saint Valentine, who lived in the third century. He was supposed to have the power of healing lovers' quarrels, and often was beseeched to bring back straying lovers. His gentle sweetness of character made him so beloved

generally that the Emperor, Marcus Aurelius Claudius, feared for his throne, and had Saint Valentine beheaded. After his death, it became the practice to celebrate his birthday with giving sweets and flowers.

Thus the custom of gift-making started and grew. Red, the color symbolizing cheer, for many years was most popular, but it has been largely replaced by blue, the true lovers' color, and pink, which symbolizes thought. Valentine letters full of love were the old-time custom. Nowadays, if one does not wish to bestow a more substantial gift, pretty cards are sent.

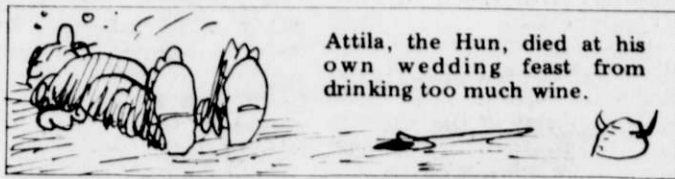

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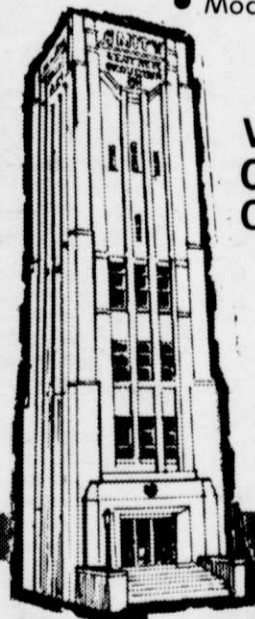

Meilahn Honored At UW Midyear Commencement

Daniel Charles Meilahn, R. 2, Kewaskum, was among more than 500 students of the University of Wisconsin at Madison who were honored for their outstanding work in their studies at the university's mid-year commencement held recently on the Madison campus.

A total of about 2,200 students received their bachelor's or higher degrees at the Madison campus commencement.

The honor students graduated with Honors in Scholarship, which means that they gained a grade-point average of 3.25 in their studies for at least three semesters work at the university beyond the sophomore year, or participated in the Honors Program. A grade-point average of 4.0 would mean perfect grades in studies.

Daniel won honors in the School of Education.

ADA District 5 Annual Meeting At Fond du Lac

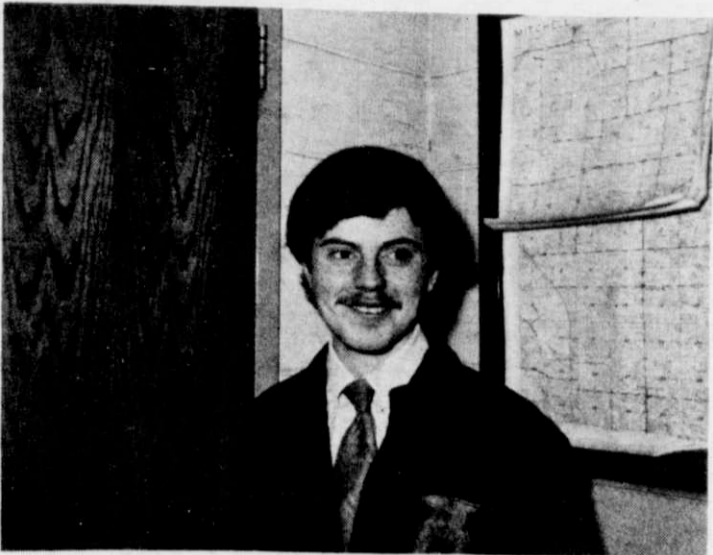

These landowners have requested assistance in developing resource conservation plans for their land with aid of soil survey maps which are the basis of all landuse planning.

The meeting continued with discussion on the importance of reviewing preliminary

subdivision plans by the Soil Conservation Service in regard to drainage and water easements. Mayors and planning agencies at all levels of government would benefit from the services available to avoid future water run-off and erosion problems.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) project committee discussed the proposed pilot project in Washington County. The project will consist of measuring the water quality of run-off from an area with rapid urbanization and an area primarily agricultural. The Menomonee River watershed in Germantown was selected for the urbanizing area subject to approval at all levels of government. The EPA committee and the Washington County SWCD Supervisors have presented the project information to the Germantown Village Board.

Soil and Water Conservation practices would be applied in the project watershed and the water quality monitored to determine the effectiveness of such practi-

The ultimate goal is to assist EPA develop a practical ordinance applicable to both rural and urban areas which would control soil erosion and sedimentation of the nation's streams and rivers.

On Jan. 16, the SWCD Supervisors attended the area workshop in Waukesha where Elmer Zuehlke, West Bend Kiwanis wildlife award recipient, received the southeast Wisconsin Area award for the many practices he applied on his farm, north of Kewaskum, to attract and preserve wildlife.

Germantown Wins Mat Tourney Here But Hartland Is Conference Champ

Kewaskum hosted the Scenic Moraine wrestling championships Saturday for the first time with eight conference teams participating. The meet got underway at 9:30 a. m. with quarter-finals, followed by the semi-finals at 1 p. m., consolation bouts at 2:30, and important championships at 3:30. A gymnasium full of enthusiastic cheer leaders, students and fans from the various schools saw some very good wrestling.

In a surprise Germantown won the meet over Hartland Arrowhead, the conference champs, 75½ points to 72½. Each team had three individual champions. Slinger copped third with 57½ points, followed by Grafton 56, Kewaskum 48½, Kettle Moraine 26, Pewaukee 25, and Mayville 10.

Hartland won the conference title however, as a result of their undefeated 7-0 dual meet record. Results of the conference meet and duals combined left the final standings as follows: 1. Hartland, 2. Germantown, 3. Grafton, 4. Slinger, 5. Kewaskum, 6. Kettle Moraine, 7. Pewaukee, 8. Mayville. If Germantown had won one more conference match they would have taken the title.

The three individual Germantown champs were Larry Sabel at 126, who defended his crown, Mark Walker at 132, and Jim Schmitt at 155. Sabel is rated as one of the top two wrestlers in his weight class in the state. He scored the only pin in the finals, defeating Kewaskum's Doug Wilson. The Warhawks also picked up a second from Pat Clavette at 167 and third place points from Dan Kruepke at unlimited, Mark Hoelz at 145, Tom Sabel at 138 and Gordy Sabel at 112.

Slinger went from 5th place to 3rd on the basis of their high showing Saturday. The Owls had 2 champs, Mike Gehring at 185 (who went to the state meet last year) and Al Schweitzer at 138. Gehring thumped Jay Solwold or Arrowhead, 12-0, in the finals. Schweitzer shaded Kewaskum's Dave Schneider in the finals, 5-3. Slinger got a 2nd from Greg Unertl at 119 and 3rds from Pepp at 105, Tom Schwai at 155 and 4ths from Mark Freiss, unlimited, Mark Wilhelmi at 167, Mark Nothem at 145 and Paul Moser at 112.

If Kewaskum would have won all the 1 point decisions they lost and had better luck in the draw, they could have taken 3rd. The Indians did have one champ, Dale Secor (20-1-1) at 105. A junior, Secor won 17-0, pinned Pepp of Slinger and took the title beating Pewaukee's Cal Wade, 7-4. Besides Secor Coach Fran Charland will have 7 other regulars back next year.

Three other Kewaskum wrestlers reached the finals and finished 2nd. They were Wilson, Schneider and Al Schmidt, defending champ at 185, now in unlimited class. Schmidt has an 18-2 record, both of his losses coming to Ron Bizeau of Hartland. Schmidt led 1-0 when Bizeau scored on a 5 point move in

the 2nd period. In the 3rd period Schmidt rode Bizeau out but could not turn him over. Their final match of the meet had a cheering crowd on its feet. The Indians also had 4ths from Mike Strigenz at 119 (losing for 3rd in overtime) and Gary Schmidt at 155 (losing by 1 point).

This week Scenic teams are competing in sub-regional action with the finals at various sites Saturday.

Indians Lose Close One at Grafton, 66-62

After upsetting Grafton (tied for first place at that time) by 4 points in their first meeting here, the Kewaskum Indians lost by the same margin in their return game in another close one at Grafton Friday, 66-62.

Although losing, the Indians played one of their best games against the Blackhaws. The lead was tied 5 times in the first quarter before Grafton took a 16-12 first quarter advantage on several baskets by Scott Murray. Troubled by Grafton's press, which caused many turnovers all night, Kewaskum trailed by 6 to 8 points through most of the second period. Just before the half, however, Randy Koepke scored some points to cut the margin to 34-32 at the intermission.

The Indians came out cold in the third quarter and scored only 2 points in 3½ minutes at one point. Coach Mike Williams shifted his lineup in an attempt to halt the numerous turnovers but Grafton outscored Kewaskum 16-11 to increase its lead to 50-43. The Indians rallied back to within 3 points twice in the final quarter. Grafton again went up by 7 but Kewaskum fought back once more, sparked by Don Gruber, who got 2 baskets and 6 free throws in the period. The Blackhaws' lead was cut to 1 point with 1:52 to play but, after a bunch of fouls and missed shots by both teams,

Grafton hung on and 2 free throws in the closing seconds gave them the game. The Indians outpointed Grafton in the last period, 19-16, but fell short by 4.

Kewaskum out-shot Grafton, 24 out of 54 attempts, to 29 out of 74. The Blackhaws are now 7-4 and in fourth place, while the Indians are tied for sixth with 3-8.

Murray and Sudbrink were the big noises for Grafton with 26 and 20 points respectively, while Shepard chipped in 16. Three players carried the brunt of the scoring for the Indians, namely Gruber with 18 Mike Koepke with 16 and Randy Koepke with 14.

In other games Friday Mayville, Germantown and Hartland all won and remained tied for the Scenic lead. Mayville rolled over Pewaukee, 51-35, Hartland came from behind to defeat Slinger, 54-48, and Germantown dumped Kettle Moraine 58-52. Hartland was without their leading scorer, injured Keith Chapman, against Slinger.

The Indians have 3 games left, all of them at home. The first of these will be a toughie with Hartland here Friday. Kewaskum could be a giant killer again by knocking Arrowhead out of a first place tie. Mayville also draws a rough one in Grafton. This could leave Germantown alone in first, playing last place Pewaukee. The other contest is Kettle Moraine at Slinger.

The JV's won their 10th game against 1 loss, blasting Grafton, 63-49. Tom Edwards was high with 15 points, Tom Rohlinger hit 14 and Jim Bilgo 12.



