Report Cards, Math Program Main Mrs. Mary Items at School Board Meeting

Report cards and math programs were the major items of discussion at the School Board meeting held Monday evening. Many of the Junior High School teachers, along with district principals attended the meeting to discuss the topics with the Board members.

Mr. Erickson, Mr. Uhlman and Mr. Heckel discussed the math program. Math scores have, over the years, dropped at the Junior High level in our district. This has been reviewed over the past year or two. This year, additional emphasis is being placed on strengthening basic math skills in 7th grade, since students obviously must have a firm grasp of these basic computation skills before moving to more complex math programs. It is the hope that this new emphasis will improve the math achievement levels of our students.

discussed was change in the Junior High system of reporting to parents. The Junior High has left the A, B, C method of grading in favor of a checklist report to parents. A different card is used for each subject area, and parents are informed how their child is progressing in the various skill and attitude areas which are important and appropriate to that class. Two philosophies of grading discussed at some length. There are parents who believe that the A,B,C method is best because it gives parents a better idea of where their child ranks in a subject in relation to other students. The contention is that giving A, B, C, grades gives students and parents a more realistic outlook on the capabilities and achievements of the student, and that this is something everyone eventually must face.

On the other hand, it is felt that the checklist type of report really gives parents a more complete picture of what a student has mastered, and how well he is doing for his abilities in that While it's true students must realistically face their strengths and weaknesses, they should be told this in ways which do not destroy their belief in themselves. The idea is to encourage students where they are strong, and to help them minimize their weaknesses. Schools, particularly thru eighth grade, are geared to students who are capable of doing well in certain, very definite kinds of work. most of which is a written, book approach. Some students cannot excel at this. Yet they may be capable of fine work in some other area. The goal, then, is to avoid branding the student a failure in his own eyes when he might be very competent in a different area of work. It is hoped that he can be brought to understand himself, his strengths and

weaknesses, without destroying his belief in himself.

In other business, the Board reviewed progress on the buildings, but no action was required. Completion of the Wayne building is being delayed because of late delivery of wall and carpet materials. When they arrive, a week or two will see the building finished.

List Honor Roll Village Board At High School OK's Salary Rate For Employes

At its meeting Monday night the village board approved the salary and benefit schedule for village employes.

At a meeting recently the board officially recognized the Kewaskum Police Association and entered into an agreement as proposed by the three-man force (plus the chief of police) last October. The board approved the police association's salary and benefit schedule Monday

Details of the salary and benefit schedule for village employes will be released in the near future.

The board also approved a resolution authorizing training of police recruits under the Wisconsin Law Enforcement Act. The act requires policemen to pass a training course within two years from the date they start as law enforcement officers.

The board postponed action on the bid for a new police car in the village. According to Village Commissioner William Martin the village has received only one bid. He said the bid has been turned over to the committee for further study.

A report by Fire Chief Armin Oppermann on specifications for a new fire truck was also postponed. The chief is still studying the matter.

Al Schmidt Reaches Mat Sectional

Representing Kewaskum High School at the Grafton wrestling Sectional Feb. 15 and 16 will be senior Al Schmidt in the unlimited weight class. Schmidt finished second in the Scenic Moraine Conference, which qualified him for the Regional. Approximately 40-50 schools were represented in the Regional meet. Al finished second there, which enables him to attend the State Sectional. If Schmidt succeeds in copping first or second place, he will be eligible for the State meet Feb. 22-23 at Madison.

This is Schmidt's second consecutive year traveling to the Sectional. Last year he accompanied Cal Tackes. Coach Fran Charland has seen only one grappler, Kim Rodenkirch, take the route to the State meet in his four years of coaching here, but Schmidt would be a welcome addition.

In the Sub-Regional at Random Lake last Thursday night, dominated by Campbellsport, Schmidt won over Tom Hagel of Random Lake in a quick 1:05 pin, bringing his record to 21-2. At 105 the Indians' other ace, Dale Secor, who was 20-1-1, lost to Campbellsport's Dave Del Ponte in overtime, 5-2. Schmidt was the only Kewaskum Sub-Regional survivor.

In the Regional finals at Sheboygan Saturday, which Campbellsport quali-fied 9 individuals for the Grafton Sectional, Schmidt beat the Cougars' Ken Gellings in the semis, 9-0, but lost to Kohler's Jim Miller in the finals. But he advances to the Sectional by virtue of a second place. Miller, who went to the state last year, has a 24-0 record this year. All 24 wins have been by the pin. Schmidt was the victim of a headlock move in a first period pin at 1:42. In Miller, Schmidt may have run into one of the top unlimiteds in the state.

Schmidt was on prom court and served as homecoming king. He was an FFA member for 3 years, letterman for 3 years, and participated in sports all 4 years of high school. He was named Kiwanis student and an outstanding teen. Al was elected most valuable player in football and all-conference defensive tackle for 2 years. Al's wrestling record this year was 15-1 with 14 pins. He was elected most valuable wrestler at North Fond du Lac, and the Kiel Invitational champ 2 years, the Horicon champ this year, and the 185 pound conference champ.

Hartland Raps Indians, 67-50

The desire didn't seem to be there and a sparkplug was missing Friday night as the Kewaskum Indians absorbed their only one-sided conference loss at home this season when Hartland's co-leaders gave them a 67-50 lacing.

The Indians were never in the game after the first quarter and trailed by 10 or 11 points most of the way as Hartland outscored them in every period. Sharpshooting Arrowhead hit a blazing 62 per cent of their shots. They led at halftime, 33-22 Kew-

askum snot only 40 per cent.

It was parents' night and parents of the players and cheerleaders were introduced before the game. After the contest coffee and snacks were served to them.

Three juniors did most of the damage for Hartland, now probably the hottest team in the conference. They combined for 49 points. Keith Chapman scored 21, Larry Heier had 16 and Mike Ferris 12. All will be back next year. Steil also scored 14 for the visitors. Randy Koepke with 14, Scott Koth with 13. and Don Gruber with 12 paced Kewaskum. Gruber also led his team in rebounds with 7. Heier snared 17 rebounds for Arrowhead.

Hartland also beat the Indians badly in rebounding with a 30-16 advantage, and they're not a big team.

Besides Hartland, the other co-leaders, Mayville and Germantown, (all 9-3), also won. Mayville downed Grafton, 56-47, and Germantown pulled away in the 4th quarter to defeat Pewaukee, 63-46. In the other contest, Slinger won over Kettle Moraine, 59-46.

One of the 3 top teams will be eliminated Friday when Mayville plays at Hartland. Germantown also has a tough one, hosting Grafton. Other games are Slinger at Kewaskum and Pewaukee at Kettle Moraine.
