### Capt. Fickler Presumed Dead, Name Removed From MIA List

A village serviceman who has been listed as missing in action (MIA) since Jan. 17, 1969 is now presumed dead.

Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Fickler, 524 Habeck St., have said that the name of their son, Marine Capt. E. James Fickler has been removed from MIA status on the basis that no information about him came to light after a debriefing of prisoners of war and after a careful review of his file

The pilot of a fighter plane, Capt. Fickler did not return to his base from a night direct ground support mission over Ashau Valley, South Vietnam. According to his mother, the area ranged from dense jungle to mountainous terrain, accessible only by helicopter.

"Chances are," she observed,, "he was hit by enemy anti-aircraft fire as no radio signal was received from his craft. He probably never had a chance to bail out," Mrs. Fickler added.

The Ficklers were recently visited by a Marine Corps representative who informed them their son's name had been placed under "presumptive finding of death." That information was confirmed in a telegram from the Comv will rece ive their son's complete file later, Mrs. Fickler said, along with a written confirmation of his death.

She has asked those persons who wore Jim's MIA bracelet to not return them to the family, as is custom. inasmuch as they would number several thousand.

And so, more than five years of waiting, brimming over with an assortment of emotions ranging from hope to fear, come to a cruel end.

When did his parents really lose hope? "Almost from the beginnig we feared there was no chance he had survived. But we had some hope until the POW's were debriefed." she replied. "We really expected the change in status would be issued right after that."

The Ficklers were over-

joyed one year ago in January at the announcement of a ceasefire in Southeast Asia. They waited beside their telephone, hoping to learn that Jim's name would be among the list of POW's

Born in West Bend in 1943. Capt. Fickler graduated from Kewaskum High School in 1961 and from the UW - Stevens Point in 1965. He enlisted in the Marines in February, 1965 on an inactive status. He went to Vietnam in April, 1968.

A memorial service will be held sometime in the future at Peace United Church of Christ, here, where Jim was a member.

Edwin and Sylvia Fickler worked diligently as members of the National League of Families of American Prisoners and Missing in Southeast Asia, working toward the goal that the United States not accept any final ending of the war that would not include a complete ac-counting of American ser-

Department heads in the Village of Kewaskum have been granted a \$125 per month salary increase through formal action of the village board.

The \$125 increase includes an additional \$1 per month raise for each year of service to the village. Monthly salaries for department heads are: wastewater treatment operator, \$934; chief of police, \$970; clerk-treasurer, \$939; and superintendent of public works, \$1,001.

Members of the village crew and the treatment plant assistant will receive 55 cents per hour salary increases, for a new salary of \$4.35 per hour.

The village will also pay the full share of each employe's contribution to the Wisconsin Rteirement Fund and pay 100 per cent of each employe's insurance premium, both hospitalization and medical.

The board also approved a paid vacation schedule for village employes. They are entitled to one week of vacation after one year of employment, two weeks after two years, three weeks after seven years and four weeks after 15 years.



Should you reach a wrong number on a direct-dialed call, notify the operator immediately, giving her your name, phone number, and the number you are trying to reach. She will give you credit on your bill.



Dear Sir:

Enclosed is a copy of a letter I received. It is one of many received in the past with similar problems and concerns expressed.

Since many of the letters received are unsigned, I thought it would benefit not only the authors, if they are subscribers to your paper, but to many people who are concerned about the snowmobile laws, problems, and enforcement within our county.

Snowmobilers are warned about the dangerous practices referred to in this letter. I refer every snowmobiler to refer to the snowmobile law pamphlet they received with their registration, to-wit:

Crossing a roadway and right of way:

Paragraph 350.02 (2) (a) Snowmobiles shall not be operated on the other highways except in the following manner or as otherwise authorized by law:

1. Directly across and roadway having fewer than 5 lanes, but only after stopping and yielding the right-of-way to all vehicles approaching on the roadway. Crossings un-der this subdivision may be made only at a place where no obstruction prevents a quick and safe crossing. For purposes of this subdivision, "obstruction" includes but is not limited to impairment of view and dangerous roadway conditions.

Fine \$10.00 to \$250.00 In regard to lights while in the right-of-way as limited

in the statute 350.02 (2) (b). Section 350.09 (1) requires that when traveling within the right-of-way, as limited by statute the lights must be

on DAY or NIGHT. This provision is many times overlooked. Fine \$10.00 to \$250.-

Night travel within rightof-way, where and when permitted by statute: Lights must be on and must conform with flow of traffic. Some people have made trails within a right-of-way, where permitted, without proper reregard for flow of traffic, as required by Sec. 350.02 (2)

The statutes are designed for the safety and well-being of the motorist as well as the snowmobiler. I strongly suggest that each snowmobiler read and obey the snowmobile statute.

Willful violations can mean injury. death or an embarrassing appearance in court.

There are many fine, wellmarked trails, provided by safety minded snowmobile clubs, for your enjoyment Use them, stay on them, respect the rights and privileges of others. Fortunately, this snowmobiler was not injured thru his faulty operation. It has happened to others, make sure it won't happen to you.

To Whom It May Concern:

On Jan. 14 of this month, I had to make a quick decision which could have endangered not only my life but perhaps the lives in the car I had to almost hit. No one is worthy of being injured or perhaps having to lose their lives over such an incident as this was.

I was traveling west on Highway 33 and about to make a right turn on County B, when a snowmobile cut directly in front of me. He was coming directly across Highway B to cross over to the west side of the highway.

By trying to avoid hitting the snowmobile I had to almost not only run into the island but a few more feet and I would have hit a car about to make a left hand turn on Highway B. The snowmobile? He went merrily on his way without so much as a backward glance to see if there might have been any injuries. There is a marked trail for snowmobiles directly across the street and has been used with great care by the snow-

The trail they have made on their own on the north side of highway 33 is very dangerous, not only at the crossing on Highway B, but when they travel east on 33, it has to be along side of the highway as these is no place to go because of a deep ditch below. When traveling south the lights of the snowmobile shine directly at the oncoming cars. As you know this can and has been the cause of many accidents.

The snowmobiles in our county have been just fine about staying on the trails this year, so why should a few make it bad for the rest of us, by eventually causing a serious accident. I own and drive two snowmobiles and saw one bad accident, bad enough to make me want to follow the rules. This accident involved a snowmobile and a car also, and it was not

FFA stimulates its members to grasp leader experiences, to set measurable goals, to prepare themselves to take the lead and to appreciate their citizenship.



### Schmidt Wins In Sectional, Goes to State

Kewaskum will have one representative competing in this year's state wrestling meet at Mtdison this weekend (Feb. 22-23). He is Al Schmidt, who won the title in the heavyweight or unlimited class at the Sectional meet at Grafton last weekend.

Schmidt was Kewaskum's only man in the Regional at Sheboygan the week before, where he lost to Kohler's Jim Miller in the finals, but reached the Sectional as a runner up. The championship bout in the Grafton Sectional featured the same two grapplers. But this time Schmidt was the winner, 4-1, to end Miller's string of consecutive wins at 24 (all of them by pins). Miller had gone to state last year. He was forced into a wrestleback to gain second in the Sectional.

Schmidt wrestled extremely well at Grafton, getting a first period takedown and a quick reversal in the second period. He rode Miller for over four minutes of the match. Al is now 25-3 for the year.

### GALS TIP PEWAUKEE, LOSE TO GERMANTOWN


