# Primary for School Board Posts Tuesday

With a six-way race for two positions on the board of education for the Kewaskum Community School District, a primary election was necessitated to eliminate two.

The primary will be held next Tuesday, March 5, in each village or town lying wholly or partially within the school district. The polls will be open from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m. An election notice appears on another page of this issue listing the place and hours of voting for each village and township.

The six candidates are: Incumbents Richard L. Edwards of the Village of Kewaskum and Thomas Gunddum of the Town of Farmington; Paul Berg, Town of Kewaskum: David Wenzel and Richard Theusch, Town of Wayne and Mrs. Clara Trapp, Town of Scott.

Theusch was a member of the board from 1970 to 1973 but did not seek re-election last year. Berg and Wenzel were unsuccessful candidates last year. Mrs. Trapp is a first-time candidate.

The Kewaskum Police Department has a new police car. And it did it the hard way.

Its about-to-be-traded 1973 squad was demolished in a chase over snow-packed roads early Saturday that began near the south limits of Kewaskum and ended about eight miles later when a fleeing van rolled over and the Kewaskum police car careened off it and struck two cars illegally parked along the roadway.

John E. Kocher, 21, of R. 2, West Bend, driver of the van had a bruised hand and Kewaskum Patrolman Thomas Bauer, 21, suffered a bruised knee. Both were treated at St. Joseph's Hospital, and released, Kocher to the Washington County jail.

Charged with reckless driving, fleeing an officer and disorderly conduct, Kocher appeared Monday in Washington County Court. He was released on bond & the matter was adjourned to March

count of the chase:

About 2 a. m. Saturday, Kewaskum police were alerted by the sheriff's department to be on the lookout and to pursue a light blue van, headed north on Highway 45. Kocher allegedly left the scene of a disturbance in West Bend and a West Bend police car was dropping out of the chase because its tire chains had come loose and were winding around the wheels.

Patrolman Bauer joined in the chase near the Bonne Belle Motel. The van continued north, then turned left on County Trunk H and in doing so forced a sheriff's car coming on to H off the road.

With Bauer in pursuit, the van sped west through the hamlet of Wayne, and still farther west, across Hwy. 41, ignoring all stop signs along the way. About 500 feet west of 41, the van rolled over on Skyline Drive. a town road.

In rolling over, it kicked up snow, blocking out the pursuing officer's vision and the Kewaskum squad careened off the wheels of the van,

which lay on its side, and struck two illegally parked cars. Chief Hlavaty supposed the cars were parked on the roadway because of snowblocked driveways.

Hlavaty said he commends Bauer for his fine work in the chase, adding "he did what he was supposed to do." This was Bauer's first major police work. He is a recruit on the local police force, with only two months of service behind him.

Bids for a new police car were being sought and it was expected the bid would be let at the March 4 village board meeting. However, the sudden demise of the present one forced the board to meet impromptu on Saturday afternoon when it was agreed to buy a new Chevrolet from the lot of Honeck Chevrolet for \$3,450. Any allowance from the demolished car will go to the village.

The new car was, fitted with all its police paraphernalia and was in use Tuesday morning. The Washington County Sheriff's Department lent a car for Monday's use.







# Kewaskum's Al Schmidt Cops Third in State Wrestling Meet

Kewaskum heavyweight Al Schmidt fared the best of any area wrestler in the WIAA State Wrestling Tournament concluded at Madison Saturday night by winning third place and attaining a goal set for himself.

Schmidt and Campbellsport's Dennis Kelley, who took a fourth place at 132 pounds, were the only area wrestlers to place. It was a disappointing end to a successful season for Campellsport, which had dominated the Regionals and Sectionals, and had qualified six individulas for the state meet, only two of whom made it through the first round. Due to the snowstorm, the Cougars found it difficult to get to Madison. Some had to be brought in by snowmobile, while others shoveled for hours to get their cars going.

Schmidt, second smallest in his class, did his best wrestling in the state meet. After a near four hour delay because of the storm before the unlimiteds wrestled, Al downed Mosinee s Bob Wenzel 2-0 in the first round. Wenzel is 6-4 and 230 lbs. Schmidt dominated the match, riding for almost an entire four minutes.

His next opponent was 267 1b. Dale Michiels of Luxemberg-Casco and Schmidt won 3-1 to gain a semi-final berth. Schmidt then faced the eventual champ, Don Meyer of Reedsburg. a heavy favorite. Meyer finished second last year at state as a sophomore and was now 27-0. Schmidt gave Meyer a tough fight before losing 3-2. Later Meyer said that he and Schmidt should have met in the finals rather than semis.

Schmidt then eliminated Racine Horlick's Jack Hanson in the wrestle backs 7-3 and then had to meet Jim Miller of Kohler again for third. Al had been pinned by Miller in the Regional finals but beat him in the Sectional finals 4-1. Schmidt made it two out of three over Miller by winning, 2-1.
