Board Opens Bids; Bel-Ric Acres Presents Muddy Problem

permanent phosphate removtl equipment and a truck Public Hearing chassis for the village waste water control center during the regular meeting of the village board Monday night.

No action will be taken until the bids are tabulated and examined by Robinson and Welch, consulting engineers. A recommendation to the board will follow.

The R. P. Honold Co. of Sheboygan was apparent low bidder of two for the mechanical portion of the bidding. which consists of the equipment itself. Their bid was \$21,367. The other was for \$26.374

There were also two bids for the electrical portion. Apparent low bidder was Kettle Moraine Electric, Kewaskum. on a bid of \$13,198. The other was for \$13,953.

Blohm Bros. Steeplejack Construction of Cudahy filed the apparent low bid of \$6,-840 for general construction. which consists mainly of removing the existing incinerator. There was one other bid for \$9,760.

There were three bids, for a truck chassis which will be used in hauling sludge from the waste water plant. Cooley's, Inc. of West Bend was apparent low bidder on its base bid of \$6,444. The two other base bids were for \$6,-771 and \$6,928.20.

On orders of the Department of Natural Resources, the village must remove phosphate from its sewage effluent. It is now being removed with temporary equipment. The permanent equipment will be installed in the space now occupied by the incinerator.

Several residents of Bel-Ric Acres were present to inform the board that streets there are extremely muddy. especially on the lower end of Memorial, Drive. Richard Smucker said he "would like to know what is going to be done with the streets." The post office has cut off mail delivery and milk delivery is being stopped because "if you go down the street, you can't get out," he said. Sun-

The Lions will collect every third Saturday, beginning March 16. Papers must be tied in bundles and placed at the curb.

The Lions responded after recent meeting called by Village President Charles Miller at which he hoped some local organization or civic group would volunteer to take charge of the project. Miller felt such a project is needed here.

At the meeting it was noted that about 70 per cent of the refuse picked up by village crews and hauled to a sanitary landfill site is paper and cardboard. The village must pay \$9.60 to deposit a load at the landfill site.

It also recommends that village residents be given a voice in determining the type of pool that will be installed.

The announcement was made in the weekly Kiwanis newsletter and comes after members of the village board were Kiwanis guests at its weekly meeting to discuss the proposed village park.

According to the newsletter, the discussion covered the proposed park site, costs, the type of swimming pool to be installed and the role of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club in the project.

Last December the village board voted to take a 12month option on approximately 34 acres of land for park purposes at \$2.200 per acre. The option is with Mrs. Viola Spoerl on land at the southwest village limits.

The village is seeking funds through the state Outdoor Recreation Act Program (ORAP 200) toward purchase of land for a park that would be suitable for recreational facilities including the pool.

The first requirement set by the state was that the village have a comprehensive park plan, and it called upon the Department of Natural Resources to develop one. Adoption of the plan then paved the way for the village to become eligible in the federally-sponsored Land and Water Conservation (LAWCON) program and the state-sponsored ORAP 200.

At this point, the village is still waiting for the DNR to approve the site.

Theusch, Gundrum, Edwards, **Trapp Win in School Board Race**

Richard Theusch, Thomas Gundrum, Richard L. Edwards and Mrs. Clara J. Trapp captured the most votes among six candidates in a school board primary election Tuesday. The four will compete for two positions on the board of education for Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District No. 2 at the April 2 Spring election.

The vote was Theusch 353: Gundrum 285; Edwards 280; Mrs. Trapp 201; Paul Berg 164; and David Wenzel 131. Edwards has been on the board for 10 years; Gundrum,

who serves now as board chairman, will be after his second 3-year term. Theusch was a board member from 19-70 to '73 but did not seek reelection last year. Mrs. Trapp is a first-time candidate.

A total of only 257 votes were cast in the Village of Kewaskum. Results in the school board primary locally were: Edwards 131, Gundrum 118, Wenzel 57. Berg 60, Theusch 87, Trapp 43.

In the primary for judicial election in the village results were: Horace W. Wilkie 125, Raymond C. Johnson 76, Christ Alexopoulos 29.

Smucker then nag a compliment for village workers. "They go all out in doing their job."

Smucker noted that blacktopping for the subdivision was turned down by the board last year because it was reported the village didn't have the money. Miller replied that blacktopping was not put into the budget because it would have been impossible to keep the tax rate down as required by the state if it had been included. "But we will still give it consideration, although blacktopping materials are at a premium."

It was agreed to offer for sale an irregular-shaped piece of land to the rear of Holy Trinity property to Herriges Oil Co. for \$500 with the provision that Herriges take care of any expense incurred to obtain title evidence and with the option that he may decline the purchase

if he is not satisfied with the title.

Herriges offered to buy the land at a recent meeting and Robert Kirst, local realtor, was asked to appraise it. Kirst appraised it at \$500, stating that although it is zoned M-2 (heavy manufac-turing) it is too small for usage and it does not meet any of the minimum requirements of M-2 zoning. Originally, the Bank of Kewaskum acquired it when it took over the Farmers and Merchants Bank. Later Holy Trinity Congregation deeded it to the village. The piece of land is adjacent to storage tanks of Herriges Oil.


IS UW-PLATTEVILLE RESIDENT ASSISTANT



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Increase in

Postal Rates Now in Effect

The U.S. Postal Service implemented a scheduled increase in postal rates on Saturday, March 2.

This increase, previously scheduled for Jan. 5, but delayed until March 2 by a directive of the Cost of Living Council, raises first- class mail from 8 to 10 cents, airmail from 11 to 13 cents, and postal cards from 6 to 8 cents.

Rates for other types of mail including second- thirdand fourth-class were also increased.

International mail rates increased an average of 20 percent. The letter-mail rate to Canada and Mexico, however, was the same at the new 10cent first-class domestic rate.

The cost of mailing a oneounce surface letter to countries other than Canada and Mexico increased from 15 to 18 cents. Airmail to Western Hemisphere countries increased from 17 to 21 cents and other countries from 21 to 26 cents for each half ounce up to two ounces. Surface and air parcel rates increased about 15 percent.

The Postal Service's new rates are temporary until it receives a recommended decision on its proposal from the Postal Rate Commission which is currently studying the increases. The Postal Rate Commission is required to make a recommended decision to the Governors of the

Postal Reorganization Act. That act also gave the service authority to raise temporarily rates while the commission

studies its requests. The Postal Service said, however, that the Cost of Living Council order which delayed the rate increases eight weeks had resulted in further losses in fiscal 1974 of \$236 million. Congress has been asked to grant the service this amount in a supplemental appropriation.

Without the new rates the service predicted a fiscal 1974 deficit of \$1.3 billion, but after the March 2 increase, and if Congress approves the supplemental request, this defi-cit is expected to be reduced to \$385 million.

Projected revenue resulting from the new rates will help offset sharply rising labor costs due to a new wage contract effected on July 21, 1973, which included pay increases due to occur in fiscal 1974 and 1975.

The Postal Service said mailers having envelopes preprinted with the old rates are authorized to use such permit imprints through May 4, 1974. Mailing statements accompanying such permit mail must show, however, that proper postage amounts were paid.

This is the first increase in first class, airmail and postal cards since May 16, 1971 when first class, airmail and postal card rates rose, respectively, to 8, 11 and 6





Escape attempt proves costly

Charges of fleeing an officer, reckless driving and dis-orderly conduct that led to the destruction of a Kewaskum police car resulted Friday in fines totaling \$450, a 45-day county jail sentence and a 60-day driver license revocation for John E. Kocher, 21, of Route 2, West Bend.

Kocher was the driver of a van that fled police in the early morning hours of Feb. 23 and took Kewaskum patrolman Thomas Bauer, 21, on a 10-mile chase over snow-

packed roads.

Jail sentence was stayed, and Kocher was placed on probation for 18 months to the state Department of Health and Social Services. He pleaded guilty to all charges when he appeared with an attorney before Judge Robert J. Stoltz in Branch 2 of Washington County Court. Kocher was fined \$191 plus

\$9 costs for fleeing an officer, \$193 plus \$7 costs for reckless driving and \$45 plus \$5 costs for the disorderly conduct charge. He fled after a street dis-

turbance in West Bend. A West Bend police car had to drop out of the chase when his tire chains came loose. Bauer was alerted to carry on the chase which ended about 500 feet west of Highway 41 when the van rolled over.

In doing so, it swirled snow and blocked and blocked the vision of the pursuing patrolman. The squad car was demolished when it careened off the wheels of the van and struck two illegally parked cars along the roadway.




