Awarded Wildlife Conservation Award



Elmer Zuehlke, R. 1, Kewaskum, was awarded the Area Wildlife Conservation Award at the S. E. Wisconsin Area Soil and Water Conservation District Association meeting recently. The Washington County Wildlife Conservation Award was presented to Mr. Zuehlke by the West Bend Kiwanis, on Nov. 13, 1973.

A total of 20,000 pine and spruce trees were planted during 1972 and 1973 to cover a 26 acre cropland field that was originally a native forest of oak and hickory prior to homesteading

Three fish and wildlife ponds have been constructed on their land with the technical assistance of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service.

A four-acre wetland area and seven acre upland area of natural vegetation is also being protected for wildlife

By providing food for wild-

life from adjacent cropland and trees and ponds for cover and water, the Zuehlkes have linked the ecological chain which is so essential for wild-



County Cancer Crusade Goal Is \$16,900

This year's Washington County Cancer Crusade goal has been set at \$16,900, according to Richard Semler, Chairman of this year's crusade. Semler, who is Assistant Secretary and Data Processing Manager at Gehl Company, West Bend, said the 1974 goal of \$16,900 compares to last year's goal of \$15,000 and reflects the continued population growth of Washington County

"We need the added help of everyone in the county in fighting this dread disease," Semler said.

Objectives of this year's crusade is to solicit funds for needed cancer research at major institutions like the University of Wisconsin and Marquette University, to alert area citizens to the importance of kowing cancer's pirtance of kowing cancer's seven warning signals, and to assist victims of the disease.

"No money or possessions could mean more to future generations of Washington County than the satisfaction of knowing that, should cancer strike, adequate research into preventing and curing the disease has been on-going. When cancer strikes, we call immediately for the best medical care and the best medical knowledge that money can provide. The best is not too good. Money is no object when life hangs in the balance," Semler said.

This year's drive is scheduled to be in full operation by April 1, 1974. This includes house-to-house calls and industry solicitations throughout the county. Justice Wilkie Addresses Local Kiwanis Club

In his quest for reelection to the position he has held for nearly 12 years, Justice Horace W. Wilkie of the Wisconsin Supreme Court visited Washington County Monday, March 11, talking to the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club.

Justice Wilkie, who outpolled the other two Supreme Court candidates in Washington County in the March 5 primary, declared that he was gratified with the primary results. He stated: "One of the principal points established by Watergate and other related proceedings is that the Judicial Branch is most important as the 'balance wheel' in our American system of government."

"In this year's final contest for justice of the Wisconsin Supreme Court, Wisconsin voters have an opportunity to demonstrate, as they did in the primary, their support of an experienced and indepen-dent judiciary," Wilkie concluded. In addition to his 12 years of experience on the Supreme Court, Wilkie cited his 17 years of prior legal experience. "The only issue in this year's court race is 'Who is best qualified?' I believe that my record demonstrates the qualifications the voters have come to expect in a Supreme court justice: independence and impartiality, knowledge of intricate legal questions that come before the court, experience, integrity and thoroughness in the work of the court, a forward-look-

ing and progressive approach

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on problems which the court must resolve."

Wilkie noted that he has written nearly 500 principal opinions for the court as well as joining in 3,500 full-court decisions. "The essence of the Supreme Court" Wilkie stated, "is that every decision we make is made by seven justices, not just one."



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



Thanks Postal Customers for Using Zip Code

Postmaster Harry E. Koch today thanked postal customers in Kewaskum for their regular use of the ZIP Code with mailing addresses.

"Customers in the 13-state Central Region in which Kewaskum is a part leads the other four Postal Regions with an 89.1 percent ZIP Code usage. According to recent figures, the national average for ZIP Code usage by mailers reached 87.3 percent," Postmaster Koch said.

Postmaster Koch said the success of the ZIP Code is well established. Its public acceptance has come a long way from that first day nearly 11 years ago when the program was launched in Washington with a special Ethel Merman version of "Zip-A-Dee Doo-Dah" that was to be heard in thousands of promotional spots on radio and television around the country.

It was on July 1, 1963, that the Postal System's Zoning Improvement Program went intò effect. There was an immediate furor over the advent of ZIP Coding, but the people who predicted dire things for the future of the U. S. mail as a result of adding five figures to an address have long since been proven wrong.

"Fortunately, there were those who also recognized that a growing population, a more mobile life style, and a growing volume of mail (it was 30 billion pieces in 1942, 49 billion in 1952, 67 billion in 1962, and now 90 billion) would require an addressing system more sophisticated than the one that had been used for the previous hundred years," Postmaster Koch

"There also had been great public controversy in 1863, when the Post Office Department came up with the then radical concept that mail should be addressed by street and number. Before then, mail was sent to a name in a city or town and that individual had to come to the post office to pick it up," he said.

He noted that fears that the ZIP Code would speed the demise of the identity of American place names have proved groundless. "Just look, through the current directory

of post offices, and you'll find the continuing existence of such places as Alpha, Illinois, Gas, Kansas; Weeping Water, Nebraska; Zap, North Dakota; Tea, South Dakota; and Luck, Wisconsin," he

"None has been endangered by the addition of the fivedigit ZIP Code as part of its mailing address. On the contrary, the residents of these places — as well as those who live in the most congested part of any metropolis - now can be located more quickly, more accurately, and at less cost than would be possible without the mechanized applications of ZIP Coding."
