School Board Approves New **Assistant Principal Position**

Approval was given by the Board at its meeting to create a half-time Assistant High Regal Names School Principal position for been discussed for some time in the district. Because of the high school enrollment which will be over 700 next year, a part-time Assistant Principal is felt to be necessary. Also, with our entry into North Central Association of Secondary Schools, there is a requirement that there be a part-time assistant principal when the high school enrollment goes over 500.

A number of items were authorized for purchase. A set of chimes for the band, new curtains for the high school stage and in-wall tables for the new middle school. The Board also authorized a list of equipment for the library-media center in the new middle school and authorized the Building Committee to select the equipment when proposals from various suppliers are in.

A special meeting was set for Wednesday, April 3, at 7:30 p. m. for the purpose of canvassing ballots.

The report prepared by Mr. Brenholt on the bussing complaints was accepted. The reports of speeding at 70 miles per hour were rejected since the busses are equipped with governors which allow a top speed no greater than 55. It was also pointed out that the law does permit busses to move before children are seated when loading. However, it was felt that with kindergarten children especially, this is a question-able practice and should not be done. The Board also accepted the idea that these problems should not reach Board meetings until all administrative channels have been exhausted.

Policeman Shot Theusch, Gundrum Elected At West Bend Is To School Board; Incumbent Former Resident Village Trustees Re-elected

Patrolman John "Jack" Spartz, 35. of West Bend. who was shot and wounded early Sunday when he tried to disarm a man after being sent to a family trouble call, is a former resident of R. 2, Kewaskum, and a graduate of Kewaskum High School.

Spartz was listed in satisfactory condition at St. Mary's Hospital, Milwaukee, where he underwent surgery on a gunshot wound to his left leg Sunday. He was transferred to St. Mary's from St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, where he was first taken.

Police said a 27 year old man, Gerald Charles, 607 E. Decorah Road, Apartment 5, West Bend, was arrested and was being held in the county jail in connection with the shooting. Bail for Charles was set at \$10,000 Monday morning.

West Bend police gave this account: Spartz and another officer were sent to a home on the city's southeast side shortly after 2 a.m. The man answered the door and after talking for a few minutes, said, "I'm going to get my gun." He then slammed the door in their face.

A few minutes later, he returned, partly opened the door and stuck the barrel of a rifle out. Spartz grabbed the rifle barrel, trying to disarm him, but the gun fired, striking Spartz in the leg.

The second officer radioed for asstance and within minutes, about 20 officers from the West Bend Police Department and the Washington County Sheriff's Department were at the scene.,

About 45 minutes after the shooting, Detective Arthur Wellner talked the man into surrendering. The man's wife and children were in the house during the incident and Spartz reportedly warned other officers not to shoot because of them.

By Ruth Held Richard Theusch and Thomas Gundrum were top votegetters in the four-way Tuesday election for two positions on the board of education for the Kewaskum Community Schools district. Theusch was a board member from 1970 to 1973. Gundrum is an incumbent.

The total vote in the district gave Theusch 841 votes; Gundrum 705; Richard L. Edwards 569, and Mrs. Clara Trapp 464. Theusch carried all voting areas except the Village of Kewaskum. Defeated incumbent Edwards had spent ten years on the school board and served as board chairman for eight of those years.

In the village, the vote was: Gundrum 256; Theusch 234; Edwards 212, and Trapp 124. The terms for Theusch and Gundrum will begin immediately following the annual electors' meeting in July. Each is a three-year term.

In a four-way race, all three incumbent village trustees won re-election Tuesday, outpolling their challenger, Richard E. Zarling. The vote was: Raynor Herriges 347; Gregor A. Nigh 344; Elmer Yoost 337, and Zarling 239.

Charles Miller was re-elected county supervisor representing the village on the county board. He polled 435 votes, running unopposed. A total of 462 votes were cast, about 50 per cent of the potential vote.

In the judicial election, village voters gave Horace W. Wilkie 290 votes and Raymond C. Johnson 142. Wilkie won out easily over his opponent for justice of the supreme court.

In the referenda voting, local voters -voted as follows: Number 1 (increasing pensions) Yes 229. No 163; Number 2 (removal of judges) Yes 301, No 72; Number 3 (taxation of various types of land) Yes 200, No 184.







'Involvement 74' Program Held At High School

The strengths of a community depend upon the diversity of its educational services. With this in mind, the KHS Student Government arranged "Involvement which was held March 21. The purpose of "INVOL-VEMENT 74" was to utilize all the educational opportunities that are available in the community. 
