Final' Tribute Paid To Kewaskum Marine

KEWASKUM - Final tribute was paid here to Marine Captain Edwin James Fickler, 25, presumed dead as of Feb. 4, after being listed as missing in action since Jan. 17, 1969. He was pilot of a fighter plane that did not return from a mission over South Vietnam.

Many persons from many places and with varied former associations with the young officer, filed into Peace United Church of Christ to pay a personal tribute. An honor guard from the U.S. Marines' Milwaukee Unit was stationed inside the entrance.

The Rev. Daniel Schowalter delivered the eulogy during the service and Marine Cap. Michael Gavlik, head of the Milwaukee unit, presented six medals and accompanying citations awarded posthumously to Jim, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Fickler.

The Rev. Schowalter spoke of the "unanimous sense of profound loss felt throughout this community where Captain Jim grew up.

"In the shadow of a black night of sorrow and grief," he continued, "some thoughts shine out like stars in the midnight sky: Let us express gratitude for Jim's life, rather than resentment at the status of presumed death. Let us be thankful for those years rather than submit to the temptation to become bitter. Exercise faith in God's love

and wisdom, rather than doubt and be hopeful of the future, rather than despairing.

"His life was not lived in vain. His influence was for good, his ambition and quality of spirit have affected many. He read a poem found by Mrs. Fickler in Capt. Fickler's book of memoirs which, in orderly fashion, covered much of his life from hunting experiences to school records to service records and, finally, Vietnam.

Medals presented included the Air Medal for "devotion to duty in face of hazardous flying conditions and being exposed to hostile fire at close range;" the Navy Commendation for "meritorious service performing his duties in an exemplary and highly professional manner;" The Purple Heart for the wounds presumed to have caused his death; National Defense Medal; Vietnamese Service Medal and Vietnam Campaign Medal. Also presented was the Honorable Service citation from the Secretary of the Navy, and a letter from Gen. R. E. Cushman, Jr., Commandant of the U.S. Marine Corps, which read, in part:

'These medals and accompanying citations are evidence of your son's character and deeds and they represent the high esteem in which he was held by the Corps and his fellow Marines. We take pride in the memory of your son; who was a brave man and a fine Marine."

proceeds from this year's event will be used toward the financing of the Muskeg Tractor. Advance tickets will be available from any club member by the end of May.






