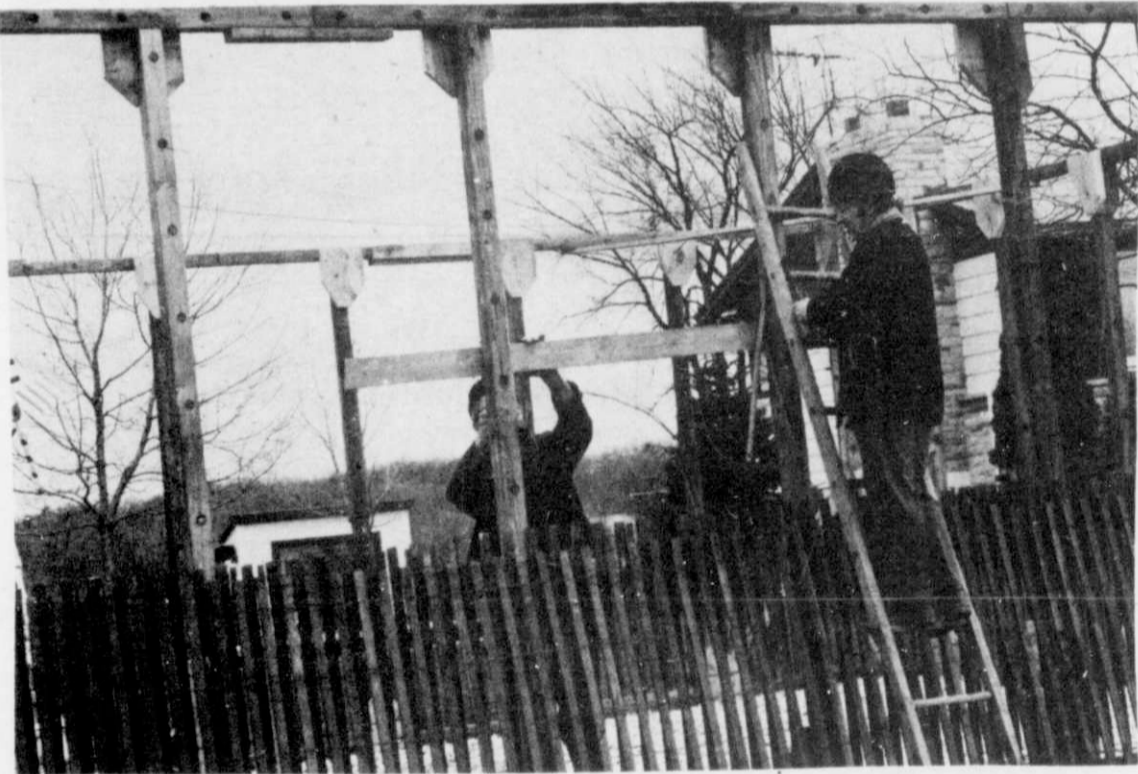
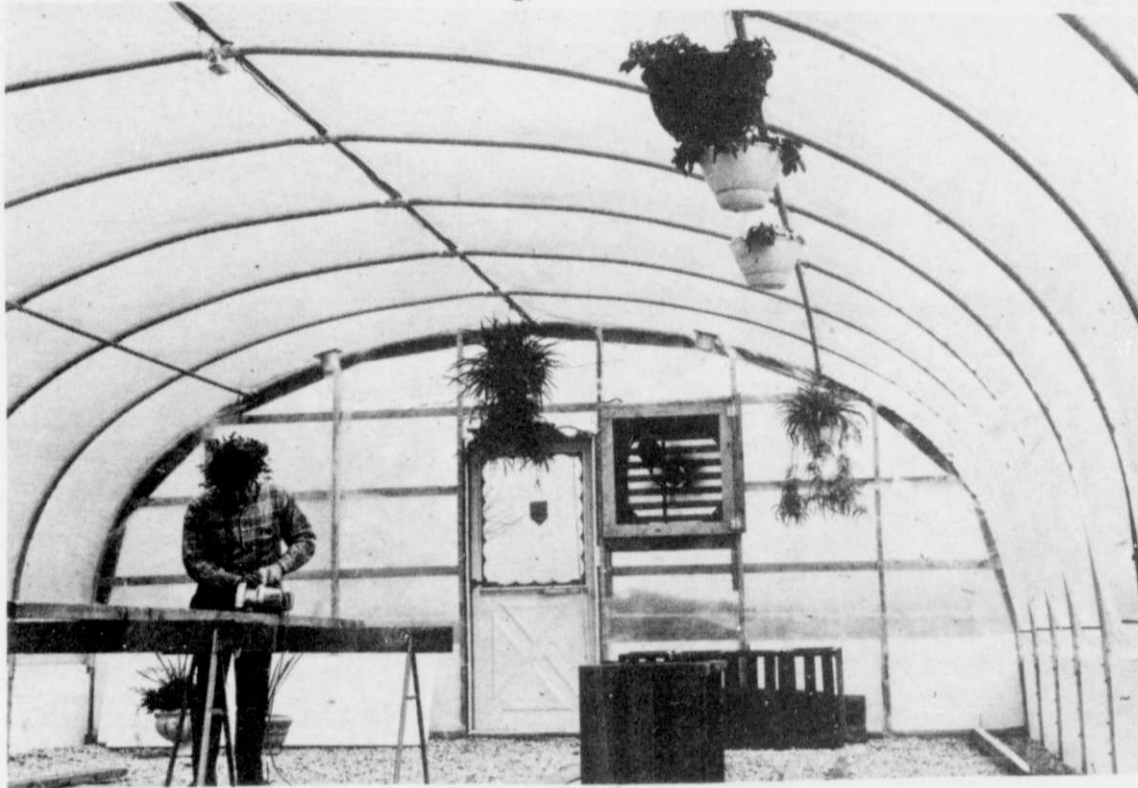

The Heart Fund collection for the Town of Auburn totaled \$232.50. Mrs. Ralph Strassburg, Chairman, wishes to thank all those who helped get the envelopes started, and those who made personal contacts. We proved that passing the envelopes in the country can be done. Special thanks goes to each and everyone who donated to make our 1974 Heart Fund Campaign a success.

Two men were added to the board of directors and new financial highs were reported at the annual shareholders' meeting of Valley Bancorporation held Tuesday in Appleton.

F. Harwood Orbison, President, Appleton Mills and James D. Reigle, President, Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum, were elected to serve on the board of directors of the holding company. Orbison will continue to serve as a director of the holding company's largest bank, Appleton State Bank, and Reigle will continue to serve as a director on the board of Valley Bank, Kewaskum. All other holding company directors were re-elected.

As of March 31, consolidated income before securities transactions for the first quarter increased 16.7% to \$494,445, compared to \$423,610 on the same date a year ago. On a per share basis, this is equivalent to \$.79 per share for 1974 up 12.9% from \$.70 per share reported in 1973. Consolidated net income climbed to \$499,125, or \$.80 per share, compared to \$399,179 or \$.66 per share recorded at the end of the first quarter of 1973.

Total assets jumped 18.5% to \$247.5 million compared to \$208.8 million reported on March 31, 1973. Consolidated loans totalled \$150.4 million at the end of the first quarter of 1974, up 12.8% from \$133.4 million on the same date a year ago. Total deposits equalled \$212.1 million in 1974, compared to \$184.4 million at the end of the first quarter of 1973, an increase of 15.0%. Stockholders' equity per share on March 31, 1974 totalled \$23.87 based on total stockholders' equity of \$15.0 million.

TORNADO SAFETY RULES

If 1974 is anything like last year, tornado safety rules may be the most important tools in your preparedness package. Here they are:

KNOW THE WARNING TERMS

A **TORNADO WATCH** means weather conditions indicate tornadoes are expected to develop. Listen for further advisories, and stay alert for sudden strong wind, rain, hail, or a funnel-shaped cloud.

A **TORNADO WARNING** means a tornado has actually been sighted or indicated on radar. Take shelter immediately.

PROTECTIVE ACTIONS

■ **At home**, the basement usually offers the best shelter. Get under a sturdy workbench or table. In a home with no basement, take cover in the central part of the lowest floor in a bathroom, a closet, or under heavy furniture. Keep some windows open but *stay away from them*.

■ **In school**, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with wide-span roofs.

■ **In office buildings**, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor.

■ **In factories**, go to the designated portion of the plant offering the greatest protection.

■ **In shopping centers**, go to a designated shelter area, *not* to your parked car.

■ **If caught in open country**, move away from the tornado's path at a right angle. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest ditch or depression.

■ **Mobile homes** are particularly vulnerable to overturning during strong winds, and should be evacuated when strong winds are forecast. (Damage can be minimized by securing mobile homes with proper anchoring and tie-down gear.) If there is no shelter nearby, leave the mobile home area for low, protected ground.

In the event a tornado is sighted, the siren will be sounded at high pitch for three to five minutes.

Bicycle Safety Clinic Success

The Bicycle Safety Clinic co-sponsored by the Kewaskum Auxiliary Police and the Kewaskum Jr. Woman's Club, received a large response from children in Kewaskum and surrounding areas.

On Tuesday, April 9, 100 children watched films on bicycle safety and received literature covering all aspects of bicycling. Bicycle enthusiast, Dan Asch, displayed his racing bicycle and safety equipment to the children, and spoke to them about his racing experience. On Wednesday, April 10, 75 children returned to take the written test, and the skill test where they demonstrated their riding ability.

Children, who were successful in passing both tests, received a luminous Safe Driver Sticker to display on their bicycle indicating their achievement. They also received an additional safety sticker. Safe Driver Stickers were awarded to 36 children. Children who did not pass the tests are reminded that this was a good learning experience for them.
