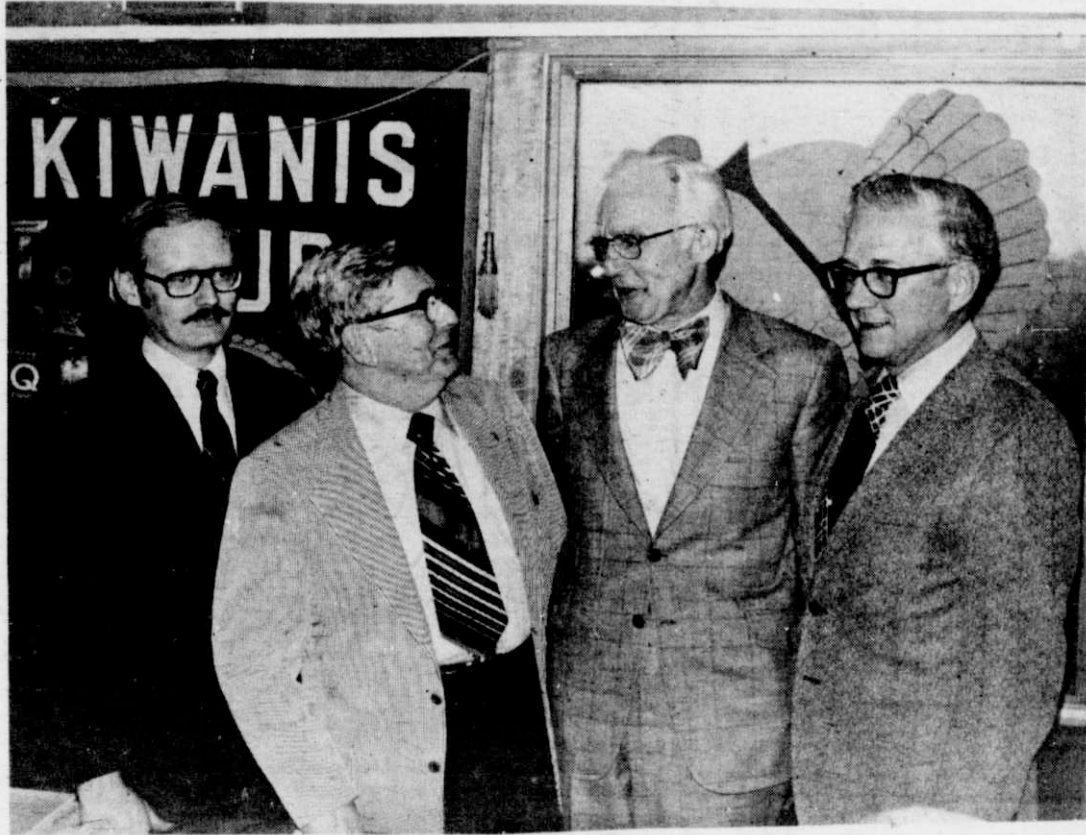

Kiwanis Presents Village With \$77,000 for New Park



At a special meeting Monday at Hon-E-Kor Country Club, the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club presented the Village of Kewaskum with a pledge for \$77,000 to purchase 35 acres of park land for the village.

Making the presentation to Village President Charles Miller was L. N. "Pete" Peterson, first president of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club and current president of the Kewaskum Foundation, which administers the club's contributions to civic groups and charities.

The bulk of the capital accumulated by the Kewaskum

Kiwanis Club over and above the regular expenditures has been derived from the annual Turkey Shoots sponsored by the club. The popular Turkey Shoot, started over twenty years ago, used live turkeys until a few years ago when artificial targets replaced live birds.

Since 1953, the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club has collected over \$150,000 in Turkey Shoot revenue and contributions from local citizens and businesses. Before this major contribution, the club had already donated money toward tennis courts in Kewaskum,

St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend and Boy Scouts Camp.

The main speaker of the evening was Wisconsin-Upper Michigan District Governor, Art Peterson, of Madison, who complimented the group on their outstanding community service in the presentation of this gift.

Town of Kewaskum Reassessment Ordered by Department of Revenue

The Wisconsin Department of Revenue has notified the town board of the Town of Kewaskum that it has ordered a supervised reassessment of all taxable property for the 1974 tax roll, according to Town Clerk Barbara Hinz.

The decision follows a public hearing held here on March 14 after 12 residents of the Town of Kewaskum petitioned for reassessment because of inequities in present assessments.

Mrs. Hinz said the reassessment will be done by a certified appraiser selected from a list the Department of Revenue will provide. "We will meet with the state revenue department this week," she said. Costs for the project will be charged to the township.

During the March 14 public hearing, sworn testimony was taken from a number of town residents. The majority spoke in favor of reassessment. Spearheading the petition was Miss Marilyn Reinhardt who said she had examined tax listings and came to

the conclusion that more recent property owners are being assessed at a higher level than those who have held property in the town for a longer time. She also charged that owners of a home and lot are assessed higher than those who own farms.

Miss Reinhardt also said she searched the Washington County Register of Deeds records, looking at recent property sales in the town and then cited numerous instances, from almost every section of the township, in which properties were sold for substantially higher prices than their assessed values.

Sr. Mary Aquin Will Resign College Post

Sister Mary Aquin Miller, O.S.F., will resign as president of Cardinal Stritch College, Fox Point, effective July 31, ending 19 years as head of the coeducational liberal arts college.

A native of Kewaskum, Sister Aquin attended Holy Trinity Elementary School and Kewaskum Public High School. A daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edward F. Miller, she is a sister of Edward E. (Pat), Joseph and Fred Miller of Kewaskum.

The 70-year-old nun is a Marquette University graduate who also holds a doctorate from the Catholic University of America, has been associated with Stritch since 1942. Before being named president she was head of the biology department and dean of residents.

During her three decades at Stritch, Sister Aquin coordinated many developments—including the opening of the graduate division in 1956, construction of its Fox Point-Glendale campus, erection of the Stritch reading laboratory and opening the college to male students.

Tornadoes Rip Nearby Areas

Devastating tornadoes bounced across east central Wisconsin late Sunday afternoon, leaving two people dead, more than 50 injured and tremendous damage in four hard-hit counties.

First Dodge, then Fond du Lac, Winnebago and Sheboygan Counties felt the storm's wrath, with the most severe property damage in Oshkosh.

The tornadoes, which struck at about 4 p. m., blasted along a 35-mile wide band from Oshkosh south to Lomira.

Four hundred homes were damaged when a tornado struck along a 200-foot wide path through seven to ten blocks of an Oshkosh residential district.

Mrs. Frances Whitty, 74, was killed late Sunday afternoon when a tornado destroyed her trailer home about five miles northeast of Campbellsport. Also killed was Brian Palbrach, five-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Palbrach of rural Stevens Point, when a tree was sent crashing onto the car in which he was riding on a county road.

Unconfirmed reports listed extensive damage to 15 barns and four homes in the Campbellsport-Ashford area.

Club 49 at the intersection of Hwys. 175 and 45 near Lomira was destroyed by the twister which covered an area of approximately 400 yards there. Six houses were badly damaged as well as five hay barns and the large Kindt Lumber Co. was left in shambles. Power lines were down.

About 10 to 15 homes received some damage in Lomira, also several buildings on the south side. Parts of the roofs of the Star Malting Co. and the Lomira American Legion building were blown away. The worst damage in the village occurred at the Martin H. Enderle residence, where the home was lifted from its foundation and landed upside down a few feet away. Enderle and his wife had just taken cover in the basement when the tornado struck.

Damage from the tornado ran into millions of dollars.

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3 Hour Public Hearing Held On Gas Pipeline Extension From Green Bay to Kewaskum

A three hour public forum was held on Wednesday, Apr. 10, at Heller's Hall in Brant, Wis., located six miles northwest of Chilton, to discuss the effects of the proposed Michigan - Wisconsin natural gas pipeline extension from Green Bay to Kewaskum.

It was a truly representative meeting with residents coming from Brown, Outagamie, Calumet, Fond du Lac and Sheboygan Counties. Michigan - Wisconsin Pipe Line Company plans to build the extension from the Green Bay area down the east side of Lake Winnebago to its existing compressor station at Kewaskum.

The Pipeline Company, which plans to install a 59-mile, 30-inch pipeline extension along one of three routes between Green Bay and Kewaskum to meet peak day requirements of nine Wisconsin natural gas utilities, was advised at the public hearing to further examine its procedure for obtaining easements from property owners; to re-negotiate with signers of those easements; and to do additional work on proper appraisals of land along the planned corridor.

The recommendations came from Orville Manz, president of the Calumet County Civics Association, at the conclusion of the 3 hour informational meeting. Approximately 250 persons crowded into the old dance hall for the meeting sponsored by the Civic Association to find out about the project for which some had already signed easements.

State Rep. Gervase Hephner, D - Chilton, who had brought the pipeline proposal to the attention of the Civic Association, said he had received complaints from some area residents about the easements they were signing and thought more information should be made available about the pipeline.

About half of the easements along the route have been acquired, Robert L. Jones, vice president of Michigan - Wisconsin, told the crowd.

After easements have been acquired for right-of-way, he said, a trench 44 inches wide and 5 1/2 feet deep is made for the pipeline. It meets not only federal standards, he explained, but the "most stringent regulations of the company."

Pipe sections are welded together and then X-rayed from time to time, he said. The land is restored to its normal state after the work

is done, Jones added.

Russ Besadney, director of the Environmental Impact Bureau of the State Department of Natural Resources, said his agency has been directly involved with the project for several months. He added, however, that the DNR has no jurisdiction over the federal regulations for siting of the pipeline.

The Federal Power Commission in Washington, D.C. has the primary responsibility of granting the right to build the pipeline to Michigan-Wisconsin. It was his understanding, he said, that as of this time the federal agency has not given its final okay to the company.

The state DNR ultimately must decide if it will allow the pipeline to go through a portion of state property which lies in the Kettle Moraine area in Sheboygan County.

"The entire project still is being evaluated," Besadney said. "However, I know that studies will be determined to have the pipeline placed in the area so as not to disturb the environment."

Several representatives from Wisconsin Public Service Corp., which services customers in the general area covered by the proposed corridor, and the gas utilities spoke in favor of the pipeline.

Hephner said persons were concerned about the easements, especially regarding tiling (either previously or in the future), crop damage, and use of new farm machinery which might hit the gas line.

Extension agricultural engineers had said there will be a reduction in average yield on the construction strip for

two to five years after the line was laid and this would result in loss in crop values at present prices, Hephner explained.

He urged concerned citizens to file their objections with the Federal Power Commission promptly. A representative of the federal agency, according to Hephner, said the pipeline company has no authority to condemn property and confiscate right-of-way, except upon final order of the commission.

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Filling Assistant Principal Post Main Item at School Board Meeting

Filling the position of half-time assistant high school principal was the major item of discussion at the School Board meeting held last Monday evening. The question centered around procedures used in making recommendations for filling the position.

Clark Pearson, as high school principal, recommended Mike Williams for the position, and this was supported by Floyd Brenholt, Superintendent. Some board members felt that two or three candidates should have been submitted for their consideration. When the item came up on the agenda, discussion was begun by Chuck Theusch and Robert Gavin, who questioned the procedures used in making the recommendation. It was pointed out in the course of the discussion by Brenholt that promotion from within is not an unusual procedure. Judy Harlow commented on information she had requested from West Bend Schools which set forth their procedures for taking applications and interviewing for administrative positions.

Jerry Secor moved to table discussion until another meeting since two members (Dick Edwards and Allen Tassar) were not present. That motion died for lack of a second. Byron Gessner then moved to seek additional applicants. This motion passed on a 4-1 vote.

In other major business on the agenda, the work stoppage at the middle school construction project was discussed. Both driveways to the project are being picketed. A charge has been filed by Westra Construction with the National Labor Relations Board that this is not a legal practice.

Holly DeMotts was appointed as director of the summer school for this summer. Forms for registering students will be out shortly.

A bid from Wisconsin School Service for lockers for physical education and athletics was approved at a cost of \$5,521. These lockers would be for the new middle school and for the high school addition. Cabinetry, sinks, etc. were approved

also on a bid from School Interiors of Brookfield, Wis. This is for the home economics area of the middle school. The Board Building Committee was authorized to select kitchen equipment for the middle school.

Resignations were accepted from Mrs. Kathy Hock, Jr. High Girls Phy. Ed. and Health, Mrs. Strohacker, Business Ed., Miss Adrienne Dolata, Home Economics and Mrs. Delores Ward, Special Learning Disabilities.

An open house in the Wayne addition was tentatively set for the first Sunday afternoon in May (May 5). The times were set from 1 to 5 p. m.

The Board adjourned to

executive session to discuss negotiations, administrator salaries and custodial personnel questions.

A special presentation of a secretaries handbook was made to a student of the Kewaskum Community High School business classes selected by the teacher and committee.

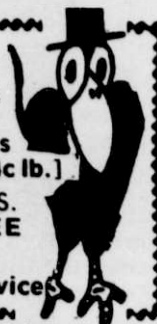

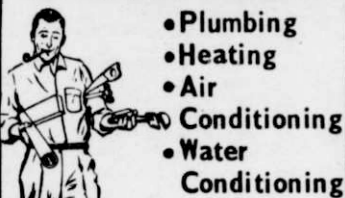
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Notice to Automobile Dealers

Indian Golfers Tie Cougars, 4th In Invitational

With very little practice, Kewaskum's golfers played their first meet last Wednesday with Campbellsport and ended up in a 187-187 tie. The Indians did well considering the Cougars have a veteran team with four returning regulars.

Junior Tom Timblin, playing in his first varsity match, led both teams with a 45. Other counters were Scott Koth and Kip Weiss with 47's and Jim Ciha 48. For Campbellsport Jeff Diekvoss and Jeff Pelischek carded 46's while Al Miller had 47 and Gordy Pierret 48. The Cougars had a 4-0 record coming into the match.

Campbellsport won the B match, 215 to 221, and Kewaskum took the C match, 237 to 243.

Although it was a cold day the Indian Invitational was held as scheduled Friday for the fourth year, with six teams competing. The winner was Campbellsport with 359. The Cougars' Pelischek was medalist with an 85 for 18 holes.

Second was Oakfield with 369, followed by Horicon 373, host Kewaskum 374, Elkhart Lake 377 and Random Lake 417. Plymouth and Dodgefield were unable to make it.

This was the first time Kewaskum has not finished first or second in the meet. The Indians have to replace four regulars from last year. For the Indians Mark Halfmann had a 90, followed by Ciha 93, Weiss 95 and Koth 96.

The Indians, who last year had an undefeated 11-0 season, won the conference title and a second place Regional finish, are in a rebuilding year.
