# Bids for New Fire Truck Opened: Addition to Fire House Planned

Bids for a new fire truck for the Kewaskum Volunteer Fire Dept. were opened during a village board meeting Monday night. There were four, in amounts of \$72,356, \$74,700, \$79,168 and \$146,060. They were turned over to a fire department committee for study and recommendation

The type of truck bid on is a "Tele-Squirt" with a 50foot aerial ladder and telescopic water tower. The new vehicle will supplement the present fire equipment.

Preliminary plans for an addition to the fire station were presented. No action was taken. Plans were drawn at the request of Fire Chief Armin Oppermann by an ararchitectural firm and without cost to the village. The plan calls for expansion to the north of the existing building on what is now parking lot.

There were two drawings, one with a basement and one without. The basement plan would provide a meeting room. It was suggested that the walls of the proposed addition be built strong enough, to support a second floor, if ever needed. Should the village, at some future time. have a full-time fire department, the second floor could become a dormitory.

Village President Charles Miller observed that financing is a prime issue if plans are to proceed and he asked Village Commissioner William Martin to check into possible federal funding.

There was a discussion of

# Local Students, Bowe & Weninger Teachers on Trip to Spain

Southern Spain with its beautiful beaches along the Mediterranean Sea, its majestic mountains, the quaint little towns and the impressive Holy Week processions became a dream come true for twenty Kewaskum students and three high school teachers during Easter vacation.

Miss Kathy Spencer, Spanish teacher, described the trip as follows:

"Our trip began April 6 when we flew from O'Hare Airport via Capital International Airways direct to Malaga, Spain. We were met at the airport and taken by bus to Playamar, a condiminium apartment complex located on the sea, where we lived in luxury for one week.

# Village Board

(Continued from Page 1) stipulates that time and one-half be paid for any work week over 40 hours. These employes are now paid on a straight time basis.

The alternatives were pointed out—cut back the work week to 40 hours or pay time and one-half. The matter was referred to committee for recommendation.

At village request, consulting engineer Forest Robinson presented some figures on what it would cost to black-top the streets in Bel-Ric Acres subdivision. This move follows recent complaints from residents there of extremely muddy conditions in the spring and questions of what the village board plans to do to improve the road conditions.

The project had to be deleted from the present budget in order to keep it within limits set by the state.

Based on recent road projects, Robinson said it would cost about \$62,725 to lay four-inch asphalt on all streets in the subdivision that have curb and gutter. The price would include grading and shaping and would call for use of gravel from the village stockpile.

It would require about 3,500 tons of asphalt. This year's price is up about \$3.50 per ton for a 30 per cent increase, it was noted. Robinson suggested going to a "skin coat" of asphalt but board members were doubtful of it in view of the fact that the subdivision has a very poor sub-soil condition. Board members will "go out and take a look" next Monday night.
