## Board Approves Final Plat For 29-Lot Subdivision

The final plat for a 29-lot subdivision at the west limits of Kewaskum was approved by members of the village board during an adjourned session Monday night.

Approval came after all village requirements were met by the subdividers, known as Ideal Land, Inc. Representing the firm have been William Ruth, Route 2, Campbellsport and Al Tennes, West Bend. The subdivision encompasses the western portion of the former Wallace Geidel farm.

Before approval could be given, it was necessary that the subdividers completed and submitted to the village a contract stating they will complete the subdivision, and posted the required amount of money to cover the uncompleted items. The money will be placed in escrow for one year and will be returned, with interest, if all conditions are met.

If not met, the money in escrow will be used by the village to complete the required items. Remaining are installing manhole covers, gravelling of streets and installing utilities. Sewer and water lines were installed last fall.

In other action, a resolution was passed authorizing village officials to execute contracts for installation of permanent phosphate removal equipment at the waste water treatment plant.

Contracts include one with R. P. Honold, Sheboygan, in the amount of \$21,367 for tanks and pumps; with Kettle Moraine Electric, Kewaskum, for electrical work in the amount of \$13,198; with Stocker Ford, West Bend, for a truck chassis for hauling sludge at \$6,771; and with Blohm Bros. Steeplejack Construction Co., Cudahy, for \$6,840 for general construction and removal of existing incinerator and miscellaneous items. Phosphate removal equipment will be placed in the area vacated by the incinerator. All four were low bids when opened on March 4.

Village trustees also authorized the Kewaskum Fire Department to enter into contract with Snorkel Fire Equipment Co., St. Joseph, Mo., for a new fire truck with Diesel motor at a cost of \$73,479. The bid was low among four when opened on May 6. The new truck will supplement present fire equipment.

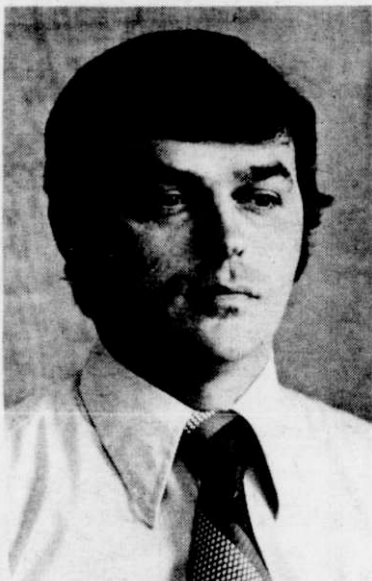
Fred W. Welch and Associates, consulting engineers, were authorized to make a preliminary rough sketch of Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park, as required by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), in order for the village to qualify for federal and state funding. The new park is in the planning stage.

The rough sketch will show

the proposed lay-out and recreational facilities that will probably be included, such as swimming pool, picnic area, ball fields and tennis courts. Once funding is approved, the village will be required to come up with a detailed plan for the DNR. The cost of the rough sketch is not to exceed \$50.

Following a tour Monday night of streets in Bel-Ric Acres for a look at street conditions, the board voted to advertise for bids for blacktopping. Residents there have appeared before the board and complained of mud and water in the spring asking what plans the village has to improve the streets. Whether or not the blacktopping project will be carried out has not yet been decided by the board. However, board members feel they would like an idea of what the project cost will be.

## Blood Bank Time Again

The Kewaskum blood bank will be held on Wednesday, June 5, from 1 to 7 p. m. in the gym of the high school. The local chairmen, Sandy Rimmel and Gloria Rodenkirch, have set this year's goal at 175 pints.

Donors are eligible at age 17 with parental consent (forms to sign will be available the day of the bank). If you are in good physical condition, blood can be donated every 10 weeks from age 17 to the 66th birthday, but no more than five times in 12 consecutive months. A woman must weigh 110 pounds and men 126 pounds.

Volunteers from the Jr. Woman's Club will be calling all past donors for appointment times. New donors are asked to call 626-2210.

Blood for transfusions comes only from people. It cannot be manufactured. When blood is needed to save lives, donors must give it. Although the need for blood is growing in this area at a rate of 14% a year, only 3% of the eligible donor population gives blood. To keep up with the demand, the blood bank needs to recruit many more "first-time" donors and to persuade infrequent donors to give more often.
