# School Board Discusses Staffing, Change in Bus Contract Rates

At a special school board meeting on May 20, discussions were held on the staffing for next year in the schools and also on a request by Johnson Bus for a change in contract rates for next year. No final action was taken on either item.

The board did approve three teaching contracts for next year. Patricia Strebig was hired for a learning disabilities room. She has no teaching experience and is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin at Oshkosh. A contract was approved for Marilyn Averbeck, also in the learning disability area. She is also a graduate of Oshkosh and has done substitue teaching in the area. Diane Kachelmeyer was hired for the TMR room. Also a new graduate, she did her college work at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

The Board also approved applying for a Title I federally funded program for next year. The program will be a pupil-to-pupil and aide-topupil tutoring program under the direction of Mr. DeMotts.

Brief discussion was held on the preliminary 1974-75 budget figures. Only a portion of the budget is yet completed, and figures are tentative at this time. The next regular meeting of the board will be held May 28, at which time the budget will be taken up in more detail.
