## Two Identical Bids Submitted For Blacktopping Bel-Ric Acres

When bids were opened Monday night for blacktopping of streets in Bel-Ric Acres subdivision, two of the three submitted were for identical amounts. Bid opening took place at a meeting of the village board.

Payne and Dolan of Waukesha and Scott Construction Co. of Lake Delton both submitted a bid for \$2.68 per square yard for a total of \$49,848 for approximately 18,600 square yards of four-inch bituminous covering. The third bid came from Reliance Construction Co., Sheboygan, in the amount of \$69,936.

Bids were referred to committee and to village legal counsel for study. Village trustees have not given the go-ahead for the project for it is not included in the current budget. Pressure to have the streets blacktopped in the subdivision came from residents in late winter when they appeared at board meetings several times to complain of road conditions.

Village trustees felt that asking for bids would give them a better notion of whether village coffers can stand the added drain. After the bid opening, Village President Charles Miller said the bids came to a better price than was anticipated. Consulting engineers last month estimated the project at \$62,725.

Miller noted that the village tax base will be decreased by about \$4 million next year. "Either the tax rate goes up or we spend less

## Town Kewaskum Open House for Fiftieth Wedding Contracts for Revaluation

The Town Board of the Town of Kewaskum has contracted with Arrow Appraisal Company of Green Bay, Wis. to revalue the taxable Real Estate Property in the Town.

In the near future Arrow personnel will be measuring the exterior of all major improvements and checking legal descriptions to provide accurate and adequate identification of all parcels. The interior inspection of the properties will follow. All Arrow personnel will be identifiable by green name badges bearing the company name and the name of the employee.

Upon completion of the revaluation, Arrow Appraisal will send a notice to each property owner stating therein the new assessed valuation of the property and the date and place of an "Open House" period to allow comparison of assessments and discussion and clarification with the taxpayer. A sufficient period of time will be allowed for informal hearings with all interested persons.

money," he said. Reason for the lowered tax base is that the state has eliminated from local assessing all manufacturing machinery, stock and equipment.

Apparently with an eye to the street project, board members approved dividing equally the \$22,132 in federal revenue sharing funds between streets and public safety. The revenue funds are for the period July 1, 1974 to June 30, 1975.

Miller told him he has gone to the plant repeatedly since Mlodzik first complained. He said he and several board members visited disposal plants in several area communities and that none is odor-free.

"The problem is universal," said Miller. He told Mlodzik that the superintendent of the plant is trying his best — he also wants a

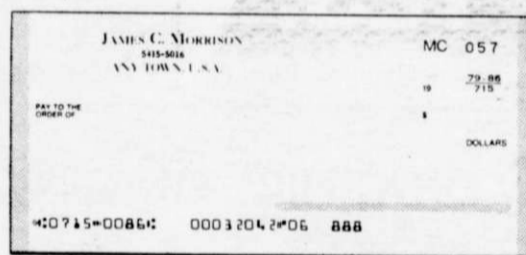
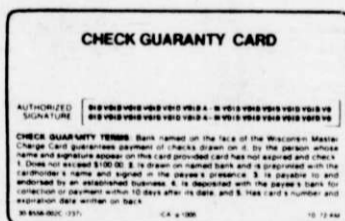

## Conservation Districts Receive Funds



Governor Lucey signs for \$220,000 additional State aid to County Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Gov. Lucey took action to release \$40,000 immediately to the Board of Soil & Water Conservation Districts. An additional \$180,000 will be available during the 1974-75 Fiscal Year. These funds are used to cost share with County Soil & Water Conservation Districts for hiring technical assistance to install conservation practices. A total of \$220,000 was appropriated from the Bureau of Government Operations to the Board of Soil & Water Conservation Districts for accelerating conservation application, according to Savage.

The 1973 Rural Environmental Assistance Programs and the 1974 Rural Environ-

mental Conservation Programs have made OVER \$6 MILLION available to landowners in Wisconsin for aid in constructing and applying conservation practices during the 1974 calendar year. To earn this money landowners need technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service, Department of Natural Resources and additional technical assistance from the County Soil & Water Conservation Districts to accomplish this overwhelming

work load. Districts are providing about (20) full-time positions plus about (80) part-time and secretarial positions. Currently, state funds are being appropriated to cost-share with Districts to hire additional technical assistance during 1973-74 and 1974-75.

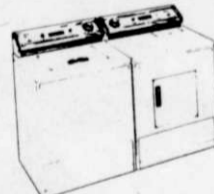

## Staffing Schools Again Main Topic At Board Meeting

Staffing the schools for next year was again the main discussion topic at the Board of Education meeting held Tuesday evening, May 28. The board unanimously approved two additional teaching posts at Farmington, two at the Kewaskum Elementary School, and an additional home economics teacher, but did not reach a decision on middle school staffing. A motion to eliminate the proposed house plan lost on a 3-3 vote.

At Farmington, there will be one additional primary level teacher and one additional intermediate level teacher. The proposal to hire an additional half-time teacher so that Mr. Kittleson would have half-time as a principal

was dropped. The primary grades will have 5 teachers for approximately 118 students, the intermediate grades 5 teachers for about 135 students. At the Kewaskum Elementary School, there will be one fifth and one sixth grade teacher added. The classes at these levels are presently running well over 30 students per group.

In other action, the board approved resolutions to borrow money to refinance the notes on the original Farmington School and on the 1966 high school addition. These notes were originally issued with large payments in the final year, and it is these large payments which will be refinanced. The alternative would be to levy an additional \$430,000.00 in taxes in the coming year to pay

the issues off.

A change in rates to Johnson Bus Company was approved for 1974-75. An additional 85c will be paid for each route run.

Approval was given for Johann Plumbing to proceed with work in the basement area of the high school in preparation for pouring a concrete floor in that area.

The resignation of Kay Kongevick was accepted. Miss Kongevick has served as guidance counselor in the Junior High School for the past two years.

A contract was approved for Christine Leitgeb for girls physical education for next year to replace Mrs. Hock. Miss Urban will move to the middle school and Miss Leitgeb will teach in the high school. She is a graduate of Oshkosh this year, and has a

major in physical education and a minor in health education.

Approval was also given to Mr. Brenholt and Mr. Esser to begin working with the Soil Conservation Service on plans for development of the high school site along the river.

The meeting adjourned to executive session to discuss salaries.
