Rev. Schowalter Honored on 20th Anniversary of His Ordination

Persons of various faiths and associations honored the Rev. Daniel Schowalter here Sunday in commemoration of the 20th anniversary of his ordination. For ten of these years he has been pastor of Peace United Church of Christ here.

"Rev. Dan's Day" began with a 10:15 a. m. worship service. Delivering the sermon was the Rev. Roy Alberswerth, Southeast Wisconsin Association Minister, of Brookfield.

"A pastor is not an individual set apart from his fellow members, but rather one who serves as an ambassador and advocate of the Christ,"

said the Rev. Alberswerth. Former Peace Church pastor, the Rev. Clarence F. Hammen was liturgist.

Festivities moved to the high school where close to 500 persons attended a noon dinner followed by a program that featured a look in retrospect of Rev. Dan's life. Master of ceremonies for "This is your life, Rev. Dan" was L. N. Peterson.

Taking part were the celebrant's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Schowalter, and his brother Reuben, all of Jackson; his wife Laura, and the couple's four children, Debbie 19; Mary 18; Barbara 15; and Jim 10.

From "the past" came the Misses Inez and Gladys Muehl, of West Bend, who taught Dan reading, writing and arithmetic in the Elmwood Elementary School near Jackson.

Also recalling former associations were a cousin and college classmate, the Rev. Phillip Schowalter of Port Washington, and the Rev. John Heinbuch, now pastor of St. Peter's UCC near Jackson, the Schowalter family's home church.

Rev. Heinbuch's association was a significant, two-fold one. Not only did he officiate when Rev. Dan and the former Laura Koehler were united in marriage at Reeseville on June 20, 1952; he also officiated when the young pastor was ordained on June 6, 1954 in St. Peter's Church.

In May of 1953, while a student at what was then Mission House College and Seminary (now Lakeland College), young Schowalter became student pastor for what was then Faith E & R Church, Erdmann, outside Sheboygan. For two of those years, Mrs. Schowalter, also a Mission House graduate, taught in Glenbeulah High School. After his ordination, he became regular pastor, remaining until Dec. 1957.

Bringing reflections on the years at Erdmann was Norman Fasse. Rev. Dan earned a bachelor of arts degree from the college in 1951 and a divinity degree from the seminary in 1954.

From Jan. 1958 to May 1964, Rev. Schowalter served Peace UCC at Browntown and St. Paul's UCC, South Wayne, in southwestern Wisconsin. Reflecting on those years were Ralph Dueck and Mrs. Herbert Fernstaedt.

The Schowalters came to Kewaskum in June 1964. He was instrumental in organizing a senior citizens' group here about five years ago, and for a time it met in the social rooms of Peace Church. Speaking on behalf of the "XYZ Senior Citizens' Club" was August C. Bilgo, who told of the growth from an initial five members to about 100.

In true "this is your life fashion," the Schowalters were presented with gifts, a set of cuff links for Rev. Dan, and a charm bracelet for Laura together with a monetary gift from Peace Church members and friends.

The list of affiliations, both within and outside Rev. Dan's professional domain, is long. Among them is being a member of the Department of Religion of St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend. He was promoted ecumenical ventures among Washington County churches and the Schowalters are active in an inter-faith campers' group.

That there should be harmony among religions is one of his deep-seated beliefs.

In charge of Rev. Dan's Day was Peace Church President Elmer Yoost and Mrs. Yoost, Mrs. Ronald Schultz, Arnold Fellenz, Mrs. Howard Zemlicka, Mrs. Carl Freehauf, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Fickler, the Hammens and the L. N. Petersons, many of whom are consistory members.

Village Beach, Swim Lessons To Open Monday

The Kewaskum Village Beach will officially open Monday, June 17. Supervised swimming hours have been extended this year—12:00 noon to 7:00 p. m. daily, 9:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m. on Saturdays and 1:00 p. m. to 7:00 p. m. on Sundays.

Swim lessons will also be conducted in the morning from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon for children 5 to 12 years of age. Those not taking lessons are advised to not swim in the forenoon. There will be two two-week sessions. Session I will be from June 17-28 and Session II from July 8-19.

The schedule for Session I is as follows:

9:00 to 9:30 - Intermediates
9:30 to 10:00 - Advanced Beginners

10:00 to 10:30 - Beginner II

10:30 to 11:00 - Beginner I (age 7 to 12)

11:00 to 11:30 - Beginner I (age 6)

11:30 to 12:00 - Beginner I (age 5)

Personnel at the beach will be Nancy Backhaus (head swimming instructor and assistant lifeguard), Kathy Ahl (assistant instructor and assistant lifeguard), and Dan Meilahn (head lifeguard and assistant instructor).

Parents are urged to remind their children of the rules which must be obeyed.

1. Rocks, sand, gravel, mud or other objects must not be thrown anywhere in the beach or swimming area.

2. Floating devices and swimming aids (inner tubes, inflatable rafts, or large beach balls, etc.) are not permitted in the water as such devices can carry an inexperienced swimmer to water of dangerous depth where he may fall off.

3. Glass and metal objects are not allowed on the beach. Soft plastic pails are acceptable but must never be thrown.

4. Pushing, shoving and horseplay is not permitted on either the raft or pier. Running on the pier is prohibited as it is dangerous to yourself and others, especially when the pier is wet and slippery. Swimming is never allowed under the raft or pier because if someone bumps their head or injures themselves they may not be spotted in due time. Going down the slide in a standing position is not allowed. This is extremely dangerous.

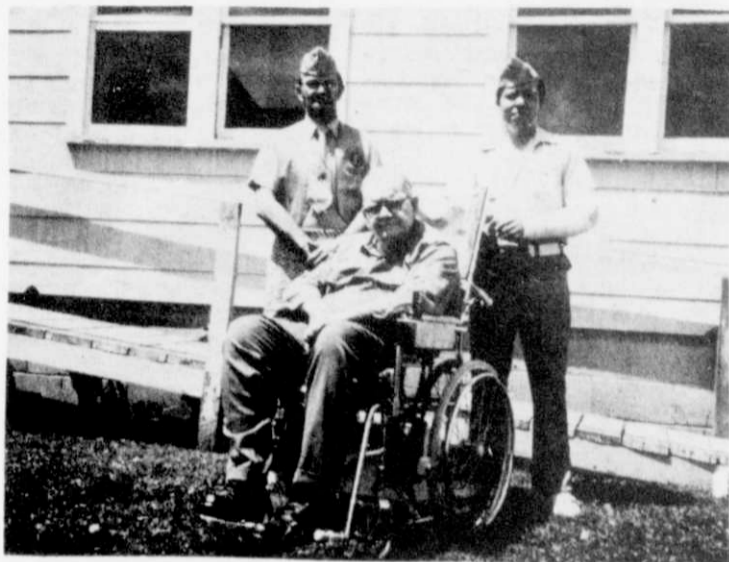
5. Bikes are to be parked well away from the beach area, preferably in the available bike rack. Bicycles are never to be ridden on the beach and certainly not into the water.

6. Food should not be brought onto the beach or into the water. Picnic facilities are available elsewhere in the park.

7. Anyone under age 6

School Board Votes 4-3 to Approve House Plan for New Middle School

The School Board voted 4 to 3 to approve the House Plan for the new middle school at the School Board meeting held on Monday, June 10. Ken Erickson, the middle school principal, recommended the House Plan as being more flexible than the traditional scheduling of classes. The motion was made that the House Plan be evaluated by the teachers and the Board members throughout the first year. The members who voted to approve the House Plan were: Dick Edwards, Tom Gundrum, Gerald Secor, and Ailen Tessar. Those opposed were: Byron Gessner, Jim Oelhafen, and Dr. Charles Ogi.

A report on how the new middle school and Farmington Elementary additions are progressing was presented. Under new business, approval of the contract for the school social worker was approved, along with the 30 and

10 day extensions on contracts for the two agriculture instructors.

A check for \$200.00 was presented to the Board by the 1972-73 Activity Banquet Committee toward the purchase of curtains for the stage in the high school.

New teacher contracts were presented and approved for Nancy R. Kulvekoski, as a home economics teacher for the high school, Debra Ann Holder, home economics, junior and senior high school, Christine E. Leitgeb, physical education, Krysten M. Stepke, German, and Rhonda Kopitzke, elementary education.

The question of paid insurance for personnel who are retiring was tabled until the next meeting.

The Board adjourned to an executive session on non-certified salaries and the applications for the assistant high school principal position.

must be accompanied by a responsible adult. Also, guards cannot be requested to watch over any specific individuals. This is not a baby-sitting service. The guard stand is for guards only. It is neither a seat for others nor a depository for miscellaneous items as children's watches, radios, towels, etc. Guards are for your protection. Their orders and judgments should be heeded at all times. If a guard deems someone's behavior irresponsible or dangerous the offender will be ordered to leave the beach-area.

8. In past years litter has become a problem. Parents should instruct their children to use the trash barrels for depositing any paper wrappers, bottles or cans.

9. The matter of jumping and diving off the dam is a critical one. This is extremely hazardous and foolhardy. Above the dam tree limbs and other jagged objects can collect and may not be seen by a jumper. Below the dam, there are deep holes and swifter currents which pose threats to novice swimmers. Also there is a concrete ledge which can be struck by jumping or diving. The greatest hazard is that the antics of older children attract younger inexperienced swimmers to the dam area where an accident may occur. This year no one will be allowed to jump or dive off the dam. Guards will discourage these actions and the police will cooperate to enforce this rule.

Within these limitations and with the cooperation of parents, children and all swimmers, a safe swimming season may be enjoyed by all.

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Blacktopping Contract Decided By Flip of Coin

A flip of a coin Monday night decided which of two firms would be awarded a contract for a blacktopping project here, after both submitted identical bids one week ago.

The flip of a 25-cent piece, coming up on "heads," won the contract for Payne and Dolan of Waukesha. The loser was Scott Construction Co. of Lake Delton. Both submitted bids of \$2.68 per square yard for a total cost of \$49,848 for approximately 18,600 square yards of four-inch bituminous in Bel-Ric Acres.

The flip was made during a special village board meeting called expressly to resolve the problem. Both bidders were present. Both were agreeable to the coin toss. Building Inspector Edward Brandt made the flip.

In seeking an opinion from legal counsel for the Wisconsin League of Municipalities, Village Attorney Roger McKenna was informed that the village could ask either of the firms to withdraw its bid or it could proceed with the coin flip if it felt that neither bid was more advantageous than the other. The opinion stated that it would be "in the best interest" if

representatives from both firms were present.

Before making a decision, board members discussed another alternative, that of splitting the contract between the two firms. That suggestion was put to both representatives when they were interviewed very briefly, individually, by Village President Charles Miller and trustees Monday night.

Both felt there would be no problem, paving-wise, but the grading portion could not be equitably assigned because some streets require fill, other require excavating.

The project is not in the current budget but residents of the subdivision pressured village officials, beginning late last winter, when thawing made streets virtually impassable. At one point, the post office cut off mail service and milk deliveries were stopped.

Payne and Dolan said they will start work as soon as contracts are ready, weather permitting.

Miller said a loan is available at Valley Bank, Kewaskum, at an interest rate of 4% or 5 per cent.

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Panzer Announces for Assembly

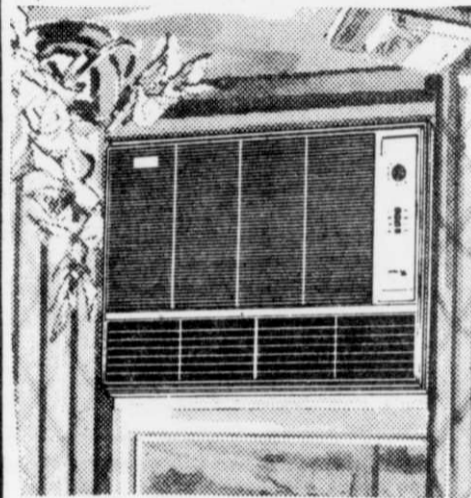

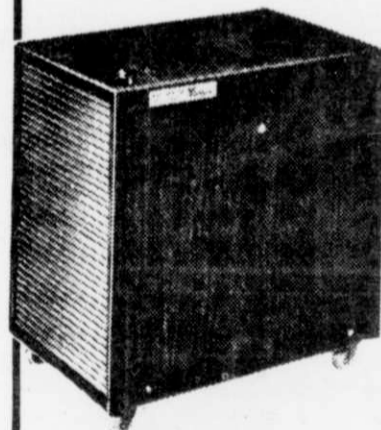

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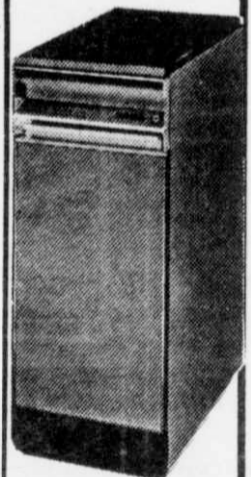


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Living Color Award Winners

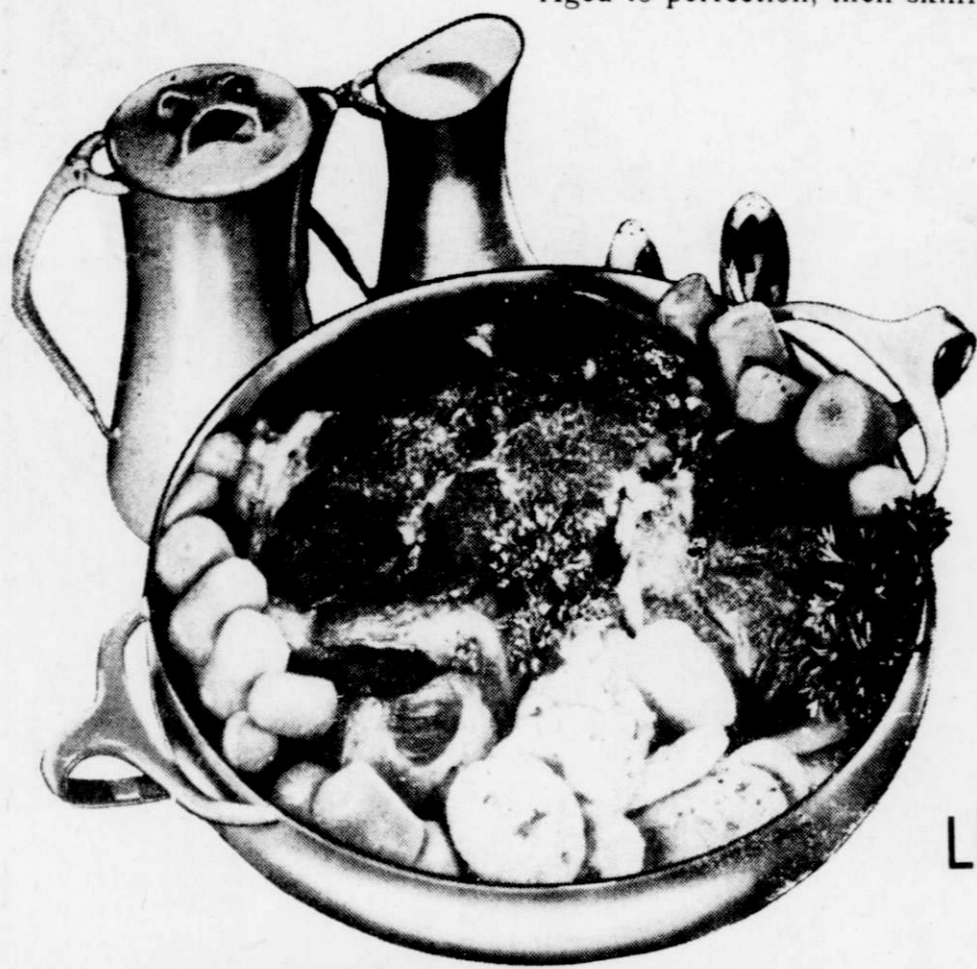

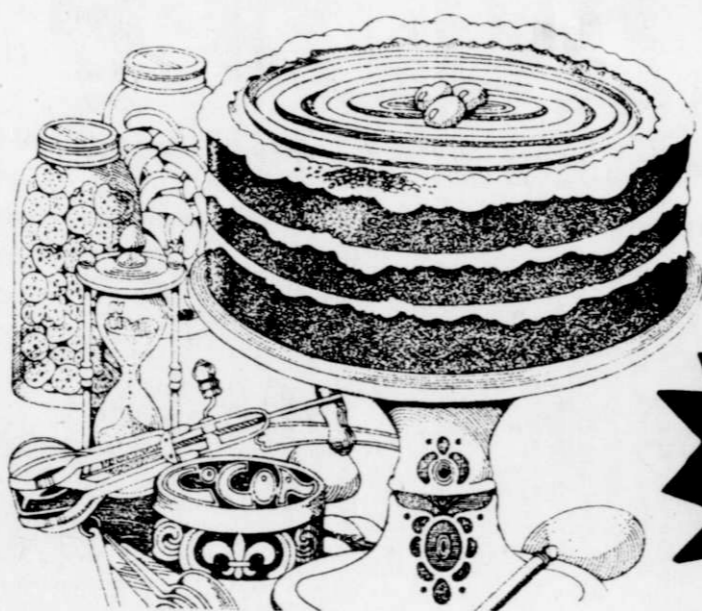

Indians' Star Athlete Al Schmidt Accepts UW Athletic Scholarship

Al Schmidt, outstanding Kewaskum High School senior athlete, has selected the University of Wisconsin as the school he will attend next fall. He will receive a partial athletic scholarship for wrestling and additional UW financial aid.

Al had a great year in wrestling, climaxed by winning third place in the state meet. Other titles included the Sectional title, Regional runner up, Scenic Moraine runner up, Kiel Invitational champ, Horicon champ and most outstanding wrestler in the North Fond du Lac triple dual as he pinned all three opponents in the first periods.

He fought as a heavy-weight although weighing only 206 pounds. In the state tournament he went up against opponents that weighed 245 pounds and 265. But Al is strong and exceptional-

ly quick.

Al also starred in football and was named all-conference in both his junior and senior years as a defensive lineman. He played the "nose guard" position and stopped most running plays up the middle, even though he was usually double teamed. Al was a leader on the field and fans enjoyed seeing "Big Al" put jarring tackles on opposing running backs. He also played offensive guard his senior year, in which the Indians had a 3,000-yard offensive effort.

After the state wrestling meet, Wisconsin Coach Duane Kleven and Assistant Russ Hellickson recruited Schmidt. Al had also received an appointment to the Air Force Academy for football but failed to pass the physical exam because of an ear problem.

Al is now recovering from knee surgery he had done at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, so he will be ready to compete at the university in fall.

While in school, Al also competed in track his sophomore year (placing fifth in conference in the shotput), was on the prom court, was Homecoming king and named as one of the Outstanding Teenagers of America.

Schmidt is the second Kewaskum High School athlete to be recruited by the University of Wisconsin at Madison in recent years.
