Buildings and Budgets Dominate Meeting of Board of Education

Buildings and budgets dominated the meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education on June 24. The budget discussion was a carryover from the special meeting on June 17, and the regular meetings prior to that.

The budget as revised and presented to the board was approved unanimously for presentation to the annual meeting. The greatest discussion came in the capital outlay area, and within that primarily in the industrial arts area. The reason for this is that once negotiations are completed and staffing decided on, areas of the budget other than capital outlay become pretty much fixed. Salaries, benefits, items required by law, cleaning the buildings, heating and lighting the schools, debt service — there is little room for changes in these categories. Each year, then, major emphasis focuses on supplies and capital outlay.

This year the capital outlay category is larger than usual due to the new building program. Because of this, the board decided to use \$150,000 in carryover funds. It was felt this was a reasonable use of these funds to offset a heavier than usual expenditure year. Next year, expenses in this category should drop significantly.

The final budget will call for a tax levy of approximately \$1,651,361. This compares to \$1,369,926.70 for the current fiscal year. Because of uncertainties in state aids, this figure may have to be adjusted somewhat in the fall when equalized valuations, enrollments, etc., are finalized. The annual meeting will be asked to approve the above figure, however. This will result in an estimated tax rate of approximately 15.5 mills, based on equalized valuations.

In other business, the board discussed the building program. Concern centered around the lack of plumbers on the job, which is slowing progress. A building committee meeting was set to again check on progress and workers available.

Unanimous approval was given to providing three months of Wisconsin Physicians Medicare supplementary insurance to retiring employees who are eligible for it. This would cover the months of June, July and August following retirement.

Meetings for July were set for the 15th and also following the Annual Meeting on the 22nd. There will not be a meeting on July 29.

Teaching contracts for 1974-75 were approved for five people. Edward Schoening, a graduate of UWM, was offered a contract as intermediate teacher at Beechwood. Denise Leong, also of UWM, was approved for middle school language arts, and Susan Strege, a graduate of

University of Wisconsin at Madison, will be hired for math in the middle school. Lora Knebel, a graduate of Stevens Point, will be working in the area of speech therapy, and Colleen Reilly, a Lakeland College graduate, approved as an intermediate grade teacher for the Kewaskum Elementary School.

The board met in executive session following the regular meeting to discuss salaries of non-certified personnel.

Youth Dies, 3 Hurt in Crash

Ronald J. Reschke, 19, of R. 1, Fond du Lac, died at 8:30 p. m. Friday from severe head and internal injuries sustained in a car-truck crash at 6:16 p. m. at Hwy. 41 and Country Trunks I and N in Fond du Lac County. Reschke, who owned the car, was a passenger in the vehicle, according to the Highway Patrol.

The driver of the car, Daryl D. Ackerman, 19, of R. 1, Kewaskum, sustained a skull fracture, lacerations and internal injuries, while another passenger, Gayle G. Schumacher, 20, Van Dyne, suffered head injuries and lacerations.

The three men were taken to St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac, in the North Fond du Lac ambulance. A spokesman at the hospital said Saturday morning that Ackerman remained in serious condition and Schumacher in stable condition.

The driver of the semi-trailer, Reginald D. Lessor, 36, R. 1, Fox Lake, sustained a minor leg injury.

According to the State Patrol, the car struck the left rear side of the semi-trailer. The collision occurred as the semi was traveling south on Hwy. 41 and the auto was going west, crossing the highway.

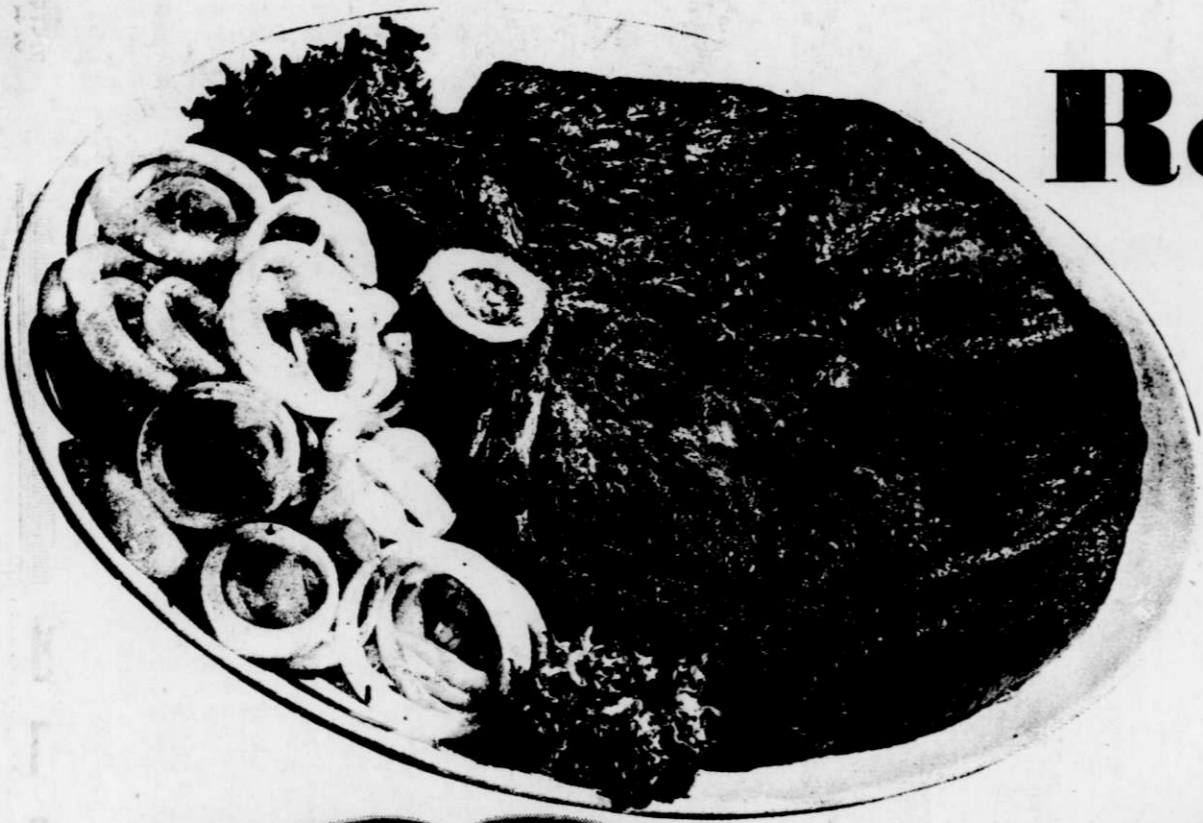

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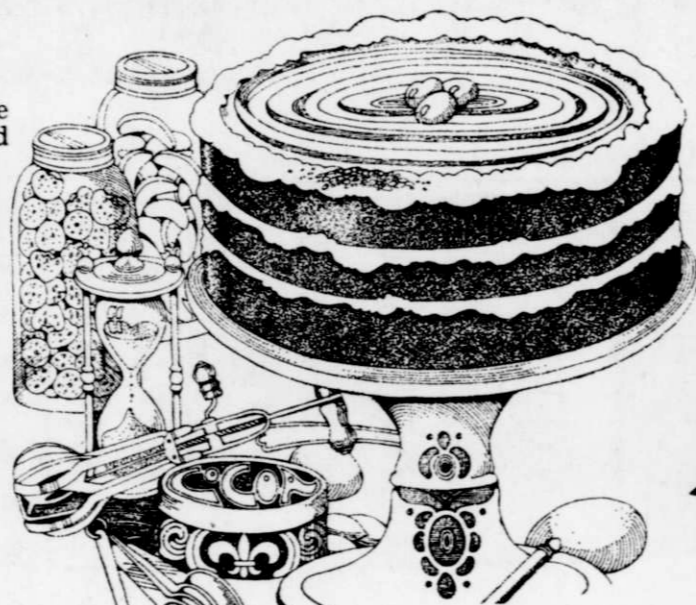

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
