An excellent parade at 12:30 p. m. sharp will highlight the picnic and get festivities underway. Campbellsport Youth Drowns In Crooked Lake

A 16-year-old Campbellsport youth drowned Tuesday evening while swimming with companions in Crooked Lake, near Beechwood, Sheboygan County.

He was Carl R. Zimmer. 16, of 221 Spring St., who Mil imming with Jay ler, 17, and Jerry Klotz. both of Campbellsport, on the east side of the lake in the resort area. Authorities said the youths had been out on the raft and were swimming back when Zimmer began to shout for help. Miller and Klotz swam to his aid and brought him to the surface twice but were unable to hold him up. The Kewaskum rescue squad was called, and efforts were made to drag the lake. The body was recovered at 9:48 p.m., two and a half hours after the drowning. Zimmer was born Oct. 23 1957, the son of Gerald and Antonia Claas Zimmer. He would have been a senior at Campbellsport High School in the fall.

Approve Plans For Elementary **School Addition**

A special School Board meeting was held Monday evening, July 1. Purpose of the meeting was to approve plans for the addition to the Kewaskum Elementary School and to approve the wage scales for non-certified personnel for next year.

Plans for the elementary school addition were approved. This will be an open concept area, the equivalent of six classrooms, and will be around 7,000 square feet in total area. It will be attached on the east side of the north section of the existing building. Since the Board meeting, and getting state and village approval, construction has already begun.

At Farmington, the addition is progressing well. Floors are poured. the connecting corridor walls are up. and the steel framing is up for the rest of the building. Walls (again precast concrete) are expected to be up next week. Full crews are again working at the Middle School. Completion dates are uncertain at this time because of the earlier delays.

Wage scales were approved for non-certified personnel for 1974-75 school year. With the exception of four people. all non-certified people arc on salary schedules. The four exceptions are central office personnel and the head of maintenance.

The question from a village resident of what is being done to eliminate odors coming from the local wastewater treatment plant was answered when Village President Charles Miller read a report following a study of the plant. Donald Mlodzik complained last month of odors and he was present again at the July 1 village board meeting to ask what has been done since then.

The report read was from Dr. Raymond Kipp of Water Engineers and Associates, Milwaukee, who made the study at village request. Lab technicians visited the plant and took samples. Analysis showed a high concentration of toxic copper, the report stated. Local industries have been tested for copper concentration. The source has not been pinned down but testing will continue.

Some operational changes within the plant were recommended but these are already in use, Miller stated. "I have spent quite a bit of time at the plant and I think there is an improvement." Mlodzik was assured that testing and study will continue.




