Arson Blamed For Fires in Local Park

After a long, hard day of moved from north to south work at their picnic Sunday, Kewaskum firemen received two fire calls shortly after the picnic was over, which kept them going until the wee hours of Monday morning.

Just after closing up the park Sunday night the firemen received their first call shortly after midnight to put out a car fire. Mark H. Oppermann, 20, R. 2 ,Campbellsport, was injured when a wheel apparently came off its axle, causing his car to go out of control, roll over, strike two trees, and burst into flames alongside County Trunk G about 500 feet north of County Trunk DD northeast of the village. Local firemen extinguished the car blaze.

Oppermann, who is a nephew of Fire Chief Armin Oppermann, fortunately escaped serious injury, sustaining facial and arm lacerations. He was taken to see a doctor. A car behind Oppermann, driven by Marc S. Roehl, R. 2, Campbellsport, was damaged when it drove over the loose wheel. The driver stopped and pulled Oppermann from the overturned flaming car. He pulled him out of a window which was opened part way. After getting home from that call, the firemen had to respond a short time later, at 2:35 a. m., back to the village park where the hamburger stand and kitchen building, the large beer garden tent and a waste barrel of paper were all afire simultaneously. Arson is definitely blamed as the cause of , the fires as an empty can of lighter fluid was found at one end of the tent.

in the park, first igniting a waste barrel full of paper left from the picnic alongside a tree near the ice cream stand. The tree was also scorched.

Then they forced open a hinged wooden drop door and tore a screen on the hamburger stand. It is believed they first sprayed some lighter fluid on it and then ignited another waste barrel of paper inside the stand along the west wall. A section of the wall and a counter were burned, the wall and ceiling were scorched and there was much smoke damage.

Then they moved to the beer tent where they apparently used some more lighter fluid to ignite the fireproof tent. Approximately 15 feet of tent on the northeast corner burned and some picnic tables in the tent were also damaged by the fire. The tent was reported to be ablaze in about 10 different spots when the fire was first discovered. The fire was reported by Tom Spartz of R. 2, Kewaskum, and Mr. and Mrs. Don Davenport of Madison, sonin-law and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Felix. They had attended the picnic earlier and then the Davenports left with Mr. and Mrs. Spartz. Later Spartz brought them back to pick up their car which had been left on the parking lot, when they discovered the fire. They ran across the street to the Bud Korth residence, awoke them and the fire was reported from there. The firemen remained at the scene nearly an hour. Twenty-five firemen responded to the call. Chief Opper-The arsonists apparently mann estimated the damage

between \$1,000 and \$1,500. The state fire marshall was called in Monday to in-vestigate and the fire is still under investigation by him and the local police department.

The firemen answered a third call at 1:44 p. m. Tuesday to the Kenneth Krieser home at 1145 Midland Ave. Dan Krieser was working on his car in the garage when apparently a fuel line broke and sparks touched off a fire around the motor. The blaze was out when firemen arrived.




The theme for floats in the parade this year was "Back cle," Pauline Shaw. \$2.

School Board Accepts Teacher Resignations

The School Board voted on Monday, July 15, at the School Board meeting to accept the resignations from Curt Kittleson, Myra Bakalyar and Kathryn Brandt. Kittleson is the building principal at the Farmington School and has accepted a principalship in Colorado. Miss Bakalyar is a sixth grade teacher at Farmington School and Miss Kathryn Brandt is the elementary art teacher for the Kewaskum schools.

The Board also approved the sale of the 1,000 gallon oil tank from the Kewaskum Elementary School. The 1,000 gallon tank was removed when the large, 8,000 gallon tank had to be moved for the new building construction. The school is heated by gas and the oil is used as a standby. (The tank can be seen at the rear entrance of the Elementary School and will be sold to the highest bidder. The Board reviewed the choices of students for the naming of the new Middle School. The name that drew 199 student votes was Kewaskum Middle School.

NOTICE OF REQUEST

For Design Approval For Interstate 57 and Highway 10 Between The Sheboygan River In Sheboygan County And County Trunk Highway "MM" In Brown County Sheboygan, Manitowoc, And Brown Counties

All interested persons are hereby given notice that the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, Division of Highways, has, on June 25, 1974, requested approval from the Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, for the design of about 52.1 miles of Interstate Highway 57 be-tween the Sheboygan River in Sheboygan County and County Trunk Highway "MM" in Brown County, and 4.1 miles of Highway 10. A series of three design public hearings were held, with the first being held in the City. of Sheboygan on November 1, 1973, the second in the City of Manitowoc on No-vember 6, 1973, and the third in the Village of Denmark on November 8, 1973.

After analyzing the social, economic, and environmental effects of the alternates developed for these highway segments, and after reviewing the transcripts of the public hearings and subsequent written testimony, the Division of Highways requested approval of a design for Interstate 57 presented at the hearings, described as follows:

The project begins at the junction of the Sheboygan River and Highway 141 in Sheboygan County and proceeds northerly along Highway 141 to the interchange at Highway 42. Two northbound lanes will be con-structed from the river to the interchange with Highway 42 utilizing the existing highway right of way. The interchange with Highway 23 will be reconstructted to be compatible with the future development of Highway 23. From the interchange with Highway 42 to the junction with County Trunk Highway "X", the roadways will be on relocation generally one-half mile west of existing Highway 141, bypassing the Village of Cleveland. From County Trunk Highway "X" to the interchange with County Trunk Highway "C", the roadways follow existing Highway 141. From County

Trunk Highway "C" to the junction with Middle Road. the roadways will parallel existing Highway 141 onequarter mile to the west. The relocation from Middle Road to Hillcrest Road is due north, bypassing the residential development of White Water Acres to the west, and remaining westerly of existing Highway 141. The relocation from Hill-crest Road to County Trunk Highway "Z" remains about one mile west of Highway 141, proceeding northwesterly to Fisherville Road, then northerly to County Trunk Highway "Z" From County Trunk Highway "Z" to Highway 96 the relocated roadways remain westerly of Highway 141, with the segment from County Trunk Highway "Z" to Zander Road proceeding northerly,

the segment from Zander Road to the county line proceeding northwesterly, and then northerly to the interchange with Highway 96 westerly of the Village of Denmark. The roadways will then parallel existing Highway 141 from Highway 96 to the interchange with County Trunk Highway "MM" remaining one-half mile to the west.

The Division of Highways requested approval of a design for Highway 10 presented at the hearings, described as follows:

The project begins on Highway 10 at the Branch River Bridge in the Village of Branch. The roadway then proceeds northeasterly to County Trunk Highway "D" and then is concurrent with County Trunk Highway "D" to existing Highway 141.
