Arson Blamed For Fires in Local Park

After a long, hard day of work at their picnic Sunday, Kewaskum firemen received two fire calls shortly after the picnic was over, which kept them going until the wee hours of Monday morning.

Just after closing up the park Sunday night the firemen received their first call shortly after midnight to put out a car fire. Mark H. Oppermann, 20, R. 2, Campbellsport, was injured when a wheel apparently came off its axle, causing his car to go out of control, roll over, strike two trees, and burst into flames alongside County Trunk G about 500 feet north of County Trunk DD northeast of the village. Local firemen extinguished the car blaze.

Oppermann, who is a nephew of Fire Chief Armin Oppermann, fortunately escaped serious injury, sustaining facial and arm lacerations. He was taken to see a doctor. A car behind Oppermann, driven by Marc S. Roehl, R. 2, Campbellsport, was damaged when it drove over the loose wheel. The driver stopped and pulled Oppermann from the overturned flaming car. He pulled him out of a window which was opened part way.

After getting home from that call, the firemen had to respond a short time later, at 2:35 a. m., back to the village park where the hamburger stand and kitchen building, the large beer garden tent and a waste barrel of paper were all afire simultaneously. Arson is definitely blamed as the cause of the fires as an empty can of lighter fluid was found at one end of the tent.

The arsonists apparently

moved from north to south in the park, first igniting a waste barrel full of paper left from the picnic alongside a tree near the ice cream stand. The tree was also scorched.

Then they forced open a hinged wooden drop door and tore a screen on the hamburger stand. It is believed they first sprayed some lighter fluid on it and then ignited another waste barrel of paper inside the stand along the west wall. A section of the wall and a counter were burned, the wall and ceiling were scorched and there was much smoke damage.

Then they moved to the beer tent where they apparently used some more lighter fluid to ignite the fireproof tent. Approximately 15 feet of tent on the northeast corner burned and some picnic tables in the tent were also damaged by the fire. The tent was reported to be ablaze in about 10 different spots when the fire was first discovered.

The fire was reported by Tom Spartz of R. 2, Kewaskum, and Mr. and Mrs. Don Davenport of Madison, son-in-law and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Felix. They had attended the picnic earlier and then the Davenports left with Mr. and Mrs. Spartz. Later Spartz brought them back to pick up their car which had been left on the parking lot, when they discovered the fire. They ran across the street to the Bud Korth residence, awoke them and the fire was reported from there.

The firemen remained at the scene nearly an hour. Twenty-five firemen responded to the call. Chief Oppermann estimated the damage

between \$1,000 and \$1,500.

The state fire marshal was called in Monday to investigate and the fire is still under investigation by him and the local police department.

The firemen answered a third call at 1:44 p. m. Tuesday to the Kenneth Krieser home at 1145 Midland Ave. Dan Krieser was working on his car in the garage when apparently a fuel line broke and sparks touched off a fire around the motor. The blaze was out when firemen arrived.

Firemen's Picnic Is Biggest Ever

Hot, sunny weather helped make the annual Kewaskum Volunteer Fire Department's Picnic Sunday one of the most successful if not the biggest ever held with the gross receipts surpassing those of past years. Final figures will not be determined until all of the ticket sales money and expenses are turned in.

Thousands of persons witnessed another outstanding parade and attended the picnic in the park throughout the afternoon and evening. The crowd was especially large in the evening when it cooled off some. Both the water fights and balloon ascension in the early evening attracted many spectators.

The excellent parade lasted a full hour. There were a total of 77 units in the parade, highlighted by eight bands and drum and bugle corps (three bands from Germantown failed to participate because of the heat). Hartford band, drill teams, and approximately 15 floats. Other features included other musical organizations, Milwaukee Motorcycle Club, and other cycles, race cars, clowns, twirlers, comic entries, children's specialties, visiting firemen and old and new equipment, dozens of horses, and numerous other units.

The theme for floats in the parade this year was "Back

Following the parade some of the drum and bugle corps performed in the park. Live music by The Julida Boys, Bill Thull Orchestra and Bill Sackett's Band was enjoyed from the bandstand and in the popular beer garden. There was a variety of rides, games including bingo (legal for the first time in Wisconsin in many years), amusements, food and refreshments for everyone.

The two bottle beer, hamburger, brat and hot dog stands were completely sold out at quite an early hour at night as sales were beyond expectations. More cases of beer were obtained from a local tavern and liquor store and more hamburger and buns were also acquired and these too were all sold out.

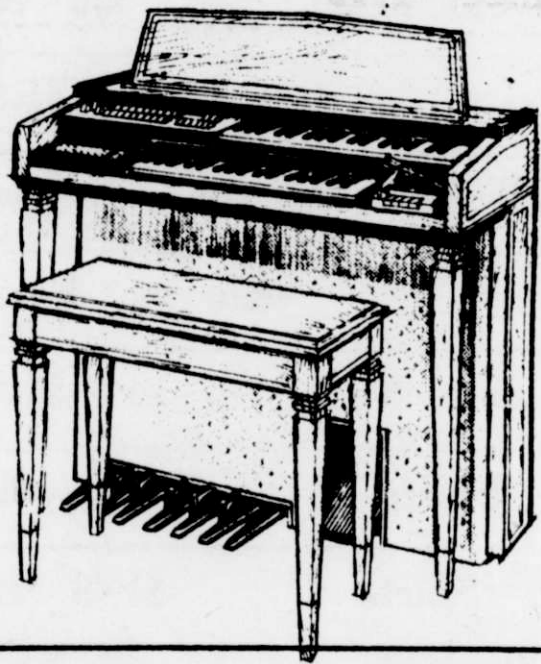

School Board Accepts Teacher Resignations

The School Board voted on Monday, July 15, at the School Board meeting to accept the resignations from Curt Kittleson, Myra Bakalyar and Kathryn Brandt. Kittleson is the building principal at the Farmington School and has accepted a principalship in Colorado. Miss Bakalyar is a sixth grade teacher at Farmington School and Miss Kathryn Brandt is the elementary art teacher for the Kewaskum schools.

The Board also approved the sale of the 1,000 gallon oil tank from the Kewaskum Elementary School. The 1,000 gallon tank was removed when the large, 8,000 gallon tank had to be moved for the new building construction. The school is heated by gas and the oil is used as a standby. (The tank can be seen at the rear entrance

of the Elementary School and will be sold to the highest bidder. Anyone interested can turn his bid into the School Business Office to the attention of Jack Sutton).

Approval of teaching contracts for the following teachers was approved: Arnie Dittbrenner, Middle School social studies teacher and Middle School wrestling coach; Miss Diane Endlich, 5th grade teacher at Kewaskum Elementary; Miss Monica M. Sierp, intermediate teacher; Barbara Deters, Middle School librarian, and Michael Wood, Middle School guidance.

The Board reviewed the choices of students for the naming of the new Middle School. The name that drew 199 student votes was Kewaskum Middle School.

AFS Student Sends Letter From Denmark

The following letter was received by Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Wilkens, 488 E. Newark Dr., West Bend, from their daughter Cheryl, who is spending the summer in Denmark as a Kewaskum exchange student:

June 30, 1974
Mama & Daddy:

I've had a pretty hectic schedule the last four days. I have a grand total of 9 hours of sleep. I made a brand new record for staying awake for 38 hours straight. After our bus left Milwaukee we had to pick up more kids in Chicago, Cleveland and Pittsburgh. It was full with no place to sleep.

All the chaperones here say I'm going to the toughest place and that I'll really have to learn the language more than the others. I'm kind of happy about it but I hope I can handle it. The language is a lot different than what I thought it would be.

Borris, where I'm now, is a school where 18-25 year

olds come to learn mainly about agriculture. I didn't realize how much of a farm girl I really am until I came here. No one else is from a farm in our whole group. The school owns a farm here. They have a great big new blue Harvestore A. O. Smith silo, a couple of Massey-Ferguson tractors, and a Holland baler. It looks very much like at home. The main breed of cow is the Red Danish, very beautiful. The Holstein breed is also very popular though. They have a milking parlor here, they milk about 60 cows, all Red Danish.

Everything is so beautiful in this country. It is very open even Copenhagen doesn't have tall buildings like New York. Their graveyards are the most beautiful, they have hedges around each plot with also a lot of flowers. There are beautiful forests surrounding this whole area and the windows in all the houses as well as around them are lined with flowers. You'd have to see it to believe it. A very outstanding characteristic of this country is all the bright orange color roofs on the houses. Some older houses or rich ones have thatched roofs. This is very expensive

but in great demand. All the people here are so neat about everything. They also say that Americans are very noisy and loud.

It's been so exciting this past week. I've learned more about the U.S. than you'd believe. In New York I roomed with a real southerner, a Negro and a Spanish Indian from a reservation. In our group here we have those and there's a Mormon guy, a Jewish girl, and other people representing every section of the country, beliefs and culture. It's been a real melting pot. I've discovered how much stuff Kewaskum kids aren't exposed to, that is so common in different parts of the country. It really seems backward but I like it that way.

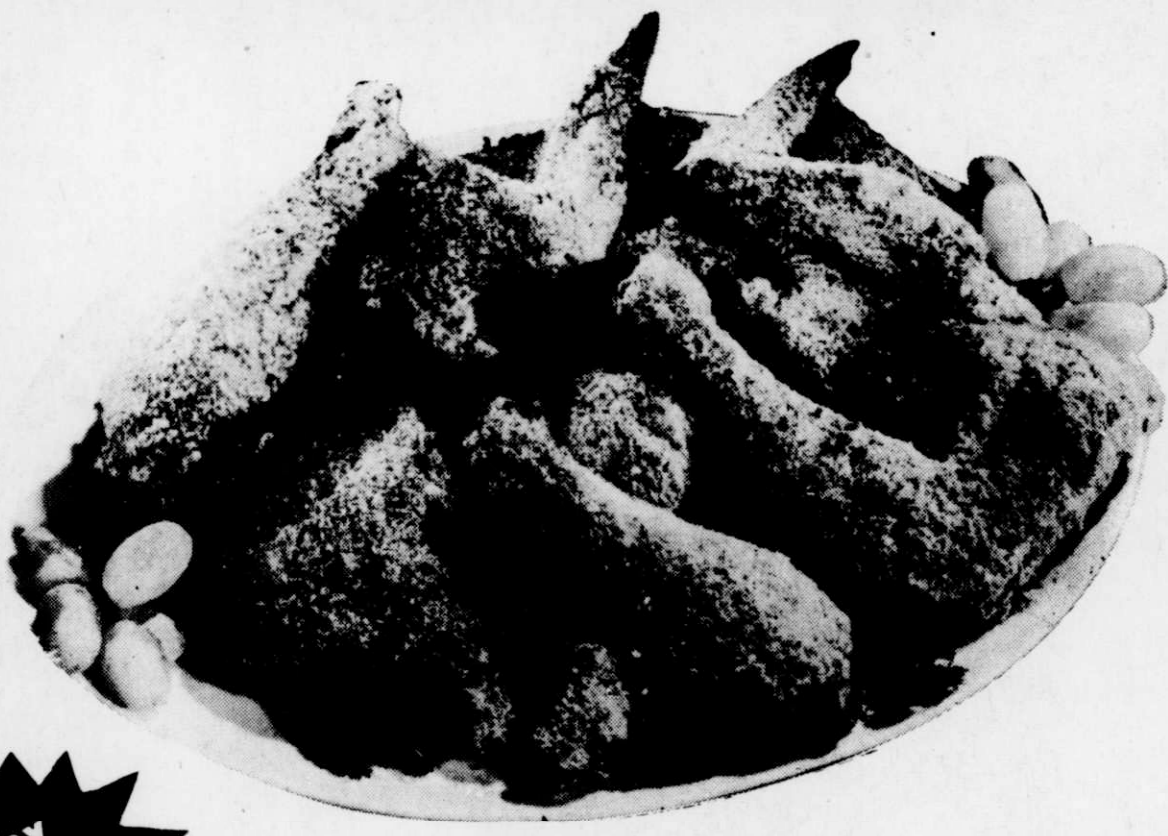

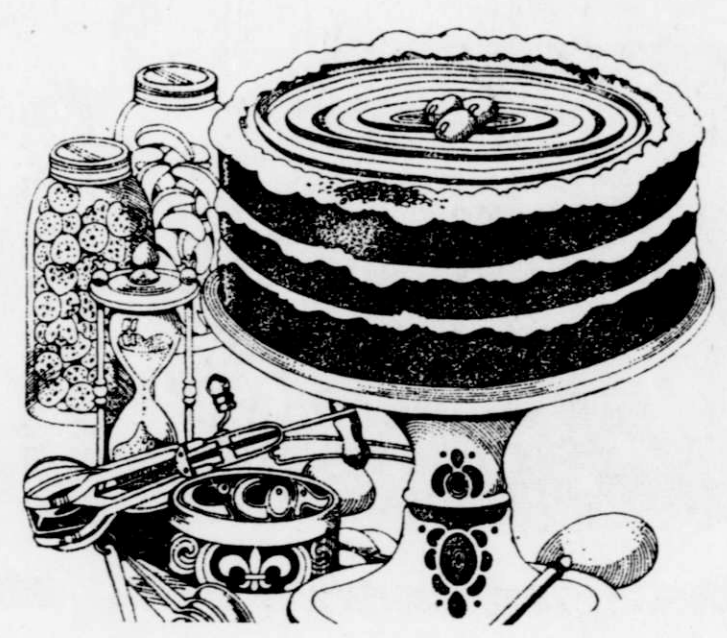

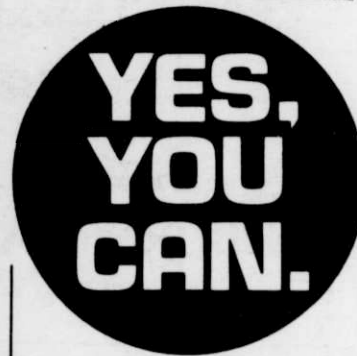

For Design Approval For Interstate 57 and Highway 10 Between The Sheboygan River In Sheboygan County And County Trunk Highway "MM" In Brown County Sheboygan, Manitowoc, And Brown Counties

All interested persons are hereby given notice that the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, Division of Highways, has, on June 25, 1974, requested approval from the Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, for the design of about 52.1 miles of Interstate Highway 57 between the Sheboygan River in Sheboygan County and County Trunk Highway "MM" in Brown County, and 4.1 miles of Highway 10. A series of three design public hearings were held, with the first being held in the City of Sheboygan on November 1, 1973, the second in the City of Manitowoc on November 6, 1973, and the third in the Village of Denmark on November 8, 1973.

After analyzing the social, economic, and environmental effects of the alternates developed for these highway segments, and after reviewing the transcripts of the public hearings and subsequent written testimony, the Division of Highways requested approval of a design for Interstate 57 presented at the hearings, described as follows:

The project begins at the junction of the Sheboygan River and Highway 141 in Sheboygan County and proceeds northerly along Highway 141 to the interchange at Highway 42. Two north-bound lanes will be constructed from the river to the interchange with Highway 42 utilizing the existing highway right of way. The interchange with Highway 23 will be reconstructed to be compatible with the future development of Highway 23. From the interchange with Highway 42 to the junction with County Trunk Highway "X", the roadways will be on relocation generally one-half mile west of existing Highway 141, bypassing the Village of Cleveland. From County Trunk Highway "X" to the interchange with County Trunk Highway "C", the roadways follow existing Highway 141. From County

Trunk Highway "C" to the junction with Middle Road, the roadways will parallel existing Highway 141 one-quarter mile to the west. The relocation from Middle Road to Hillcrest Road is due north, bypassing the residential development of White Water Acres to the west, and remaining westerly of existing Highway 141. The relocation from Hillcrest Road to County Trunk Highway "Z" remains about one mile west of Highway 141, proceeding northwesterly to Fisherville Road, then northerly to County Trunk Highway "Z". From County Trunk Highway "Z" to Highway 96 the relocated roadways remain westerly of Highway 141, with the segment from County Trunk Highway "Z" to Zander Road proceeding northerly,

the segment from Zander Road to the county line proceeding northwesterly, and then northerly to the interchange with Highway 96 westerly of the Village of Denmark. The roadways will then parallel existing Highway 141 from Highway 96 to the interchange with County Trunk Highway "MM" remaining one-half mile to the west.

The Division of Highways requested approval of a design for Highway 10 presented at the hearings, described as follows:

The project begins on Highway 10 at the Branch River Bridge in the Village of Branch. The roadway then proceeds northeasterly to County Trunk Highway "D" and then is concurrent with County Trunk Highway "D"

to existing Highway 141.

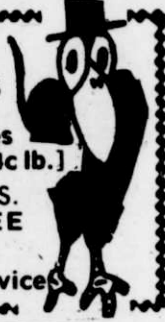

TOWN OF KEWASKUM DOG ORDINANCE
It shall be unlawful for any person to harbor or permit to remain about his premises any dog for which no license exists and for which one is required.
It shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of any dog to permit such dog to enter and roam on the premises of another, unless accompanied by the owner or keeper, and the owner or keeper has obtained permission to enter and trespass on the property.
It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or harbor within the limits of the township any dog which frequently or habitually barks, yells, or howls.
Any person violating any provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than one dollar (\$1.00) or more than twenty-five (\$25.00). Each day that the provisions of this ordinance or any part thereof are violated shall be and constitute a separate offense hereunder.
This ordinance was passed and adopted on the 25th day of April, 1972, by the Town Board, Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, State of Wisconsin, and is still in affect.
