80 Persons Attend Annual School Meeting

A total of some 80 persons attended the Kewaskum School District annual meeting Monday evening. Those in attendance routinely passed the yearly resolutions concerning approval of minutes, board reports, authorizing legal actions, pupil insurance, making temporary loans, etc.

Board salaries were left the same as in previous years, \$400.00. The meeting also authorized a levy of \$1,651,361.04 for the 1974-75 school year. The only question came on an item to be purchased for the high school graphic arts department, and explanations were given on why the equipment was requisitioned.

It was explained that satisfactory progress is now being made on the building projects, and that no dates have been set for any further legal action pending on the building program.

At the Board meeting following the annual meeting, Dr. Ogi was elected President, Jim Oelhafen was re-elected Clerk and Byron Gessner was re-elected Treasurer.

The first reading was held on a revised policy on non-certified personnel. The new policy would provide three weeks of vacation after 10 years and improved the sick leave benefits.

David Vande Vrede was approved as school psychologist for next year. Vande Vrede has been teaching in West Bend for the past five years, and will have Level I certification as a school psychologist.

John Engelhardt was awarded the milk contract for school lunches for 1974-75 pending clarification of a point on price variations.

The resignation of Paul Schoenberger was accepted. Schoenberger received an offer as an assistant principal.

A closed session to interview candidates for the assistant high school principal was set for Monday, July 29, at 8 p. m.

Stodola to Direct Youth Activities At State Fair

All Washington County youth activities at the Wisconsin State Fair, Milwaukee, Aug. 9 - 18, will be directed by Robert A. Stodola, Court House Annex, P. O. Box 537, West Bend.

Stodola's appointment as County Youth Committee Chairman was announced by Jack Denton, State Fair Agriculture Director.

As Chairman, Stodola will be responsible for the selection of all entrants, supervision of youth exhibits, and co-ordinating the activities of Washington County's 4-H, FHA, and FFA participants in the State Fair.

Michael Schweighardt Attends Convention in West Germany

In a news release from Bonn, West Germany, the Statesman was informed that Michael A. Schweighardt, a German instructor in the Kewaskum school system the past several years, attended the annual convention of the American Association of Teachers of German (AATG) in Bonn recently. He will be teaching in Germany the next year.

The six days of the meeting were filled mainly with professional activities: attending lectures and workshops, listening to speeches and discussions and seeing some of the modern language-teaching aids.

"We've seen and heard a lot of new things," the teachers agreed, "and in the end, this knowledge, we have gained will benefit our students."

This year's convention was the largest ever in the nearly fifty-year history of the AATG, and the first meeting it has ever held outside the United States. The cultural and political significance of the AATG was demonstrated by the fact that West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt sent a welcoming address to the nearly 600 American German-teachers in which he emphasized the importance of mastering foreign languages in furthering bilateral relations between nations.

On the last day of the meeting, a delegation of AATG representatives was received by the new Federal President, former Foreign Minister Walter Scheel. It was his first act of office since being sworn in as West Germany's Chief of State.

The AATG has over 8,000 members of the approximately 15,000 teachers and professors of German in 49 states. The importance of this language - which has been increas-

ing steadily - is documented by the fact that it has been selected as a foreign language major by over 650,000 high school, college and university students all over the United States. This puts German in third place, surpassed only by Spanish and French.

For many of the teachers, the meeting was sort of "homecoming." Many of them are themselves either German-born or of German descent. The schedule of the convention left everyone plenty of time to meet colleagues from America, for serious conversations or just a chat with locals on all levels. And that everybody took advantage of, trying out their more-or-less perfect German on the Rhinelanders.

The organizers saw to it that sight-seeing trips and theater-going were included. The climax of these extra-curricular activities was on the last day, when a special train took the participants up-river to Bacharach on the most beautiful section of the Rhine. After a guided tour through this picturesque, medieval town surrounded by vineyards and green hills, the teachers boarded one of the country's most luxurious excursion-cruisers.

The trip took them through famous wine-country, by the legendary Rock of Loreley, through the Binger Loch stretch with huge rocks in the waters, along hills with ancient castles and topped by fortress ruins overlooking the Rhine valley and eventually back to Bonn.

On board, they were hosted by the German Government and many a German of first-class Rhine-wine was downed in a "gemuetliche" atmosphere of singing and swaying to the tunes of well-remembered folksongs...undoubtedly providing a lasting impression of "Good Old Germany!"

Soil Conservationist Kumrow Promoted

Ivan W. Kumrow, Soil Conservation Technician at the West Bend Field Office of the Soil Conservation Service, was promoted to a position of greater responsibility, District Conservationist Myron Johansen announced this week. This action is a result of the service's career program.

Kumrow, a native of Sheboygan, began his career with the Soil Conservation Service as a soil conservation aid in 1965 progressing to soil conservation technician in 1967. Kumrow received an outstanding award in 1972 and a special achievement award in 1974 for the overall performance of all his duties. He also served with the U. S. Army for two years.

Kumrow will continue to be responsible for providing technical assistance and guidance to the Washington and Ozaukee County Soil and Water Conservation District

cooperators in the servicing, application, installation, and maintenance of conservation measures.

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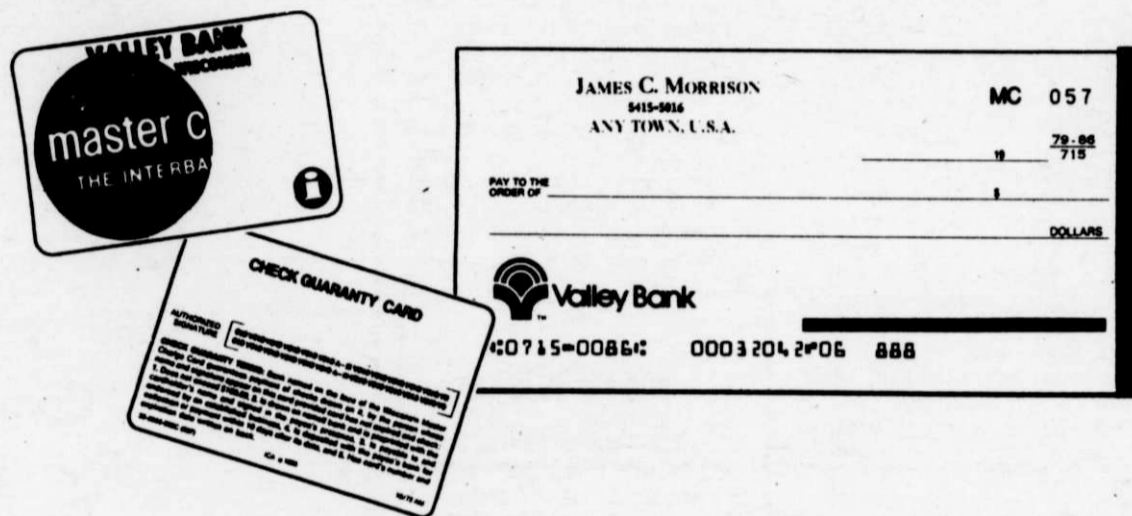
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Adelman Goes To the Fair

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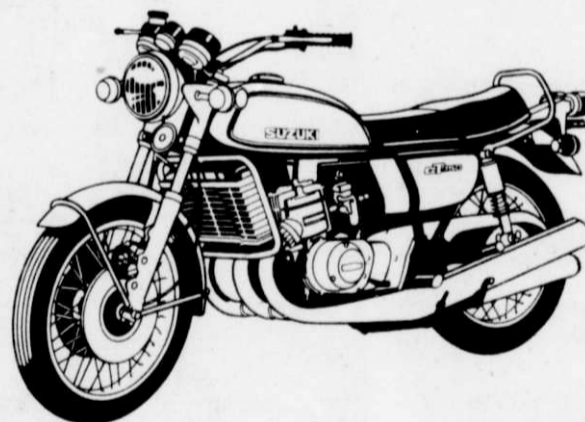
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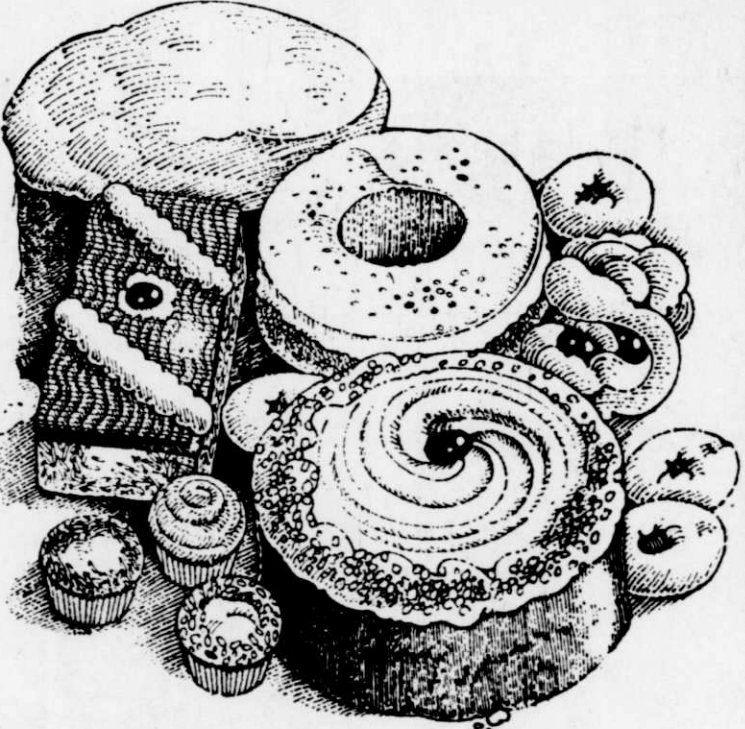



West Bend East Edges Indians in Sectional Final, 1-0, in 10 Innings

In one of the most exciting games anyone could ask for that had a cheering crowd of approximately 700 people on the edge of their seats, West Bend East and Kewaskum battled it out for 10 innings in a 0-0 deadlock before the Suns finally emerged with a run and a 1-0 victory in the last of the tenth in the finals of the WIAA Sectional Tournament at West Bend Friday night.

While West Bend jumped with joy, it was a real heart-breaker to lose for a fine Indian team that put up a great battle. Both teams had numerous scoring opportunities throughout the marathon but neither team could push over a run until the last of the 10th inning.

It was the first Sectional championship for West Bend and would also have been the first for Kewaskum. The Suns advanced to the State Meet, also being held at West Bend this week (on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday). They were edged by Homestead, one of the tourney favorites, by a similar score of 1-0 in the State opener Tuesday.

Steve Sachse, East senior, and Scott Koth, Indian junior, locked up in a tight pitching duel. Each team had only three hits in the long encounter, all singles. Both pitchers had no-hitters going until the 5th inning when Mike Donath singled for the Indians. Koth also mowed down the Suns until their first hit came on a bunt. Sachse and Koth both struck out 13 batters. Sachse walked only one, however, while Koth issued eight walks, but both always wriggled out of trouble until the last inning. Many runners were stranded on the bases.

The lone run was scored when Geoff Radloff singled

and went to second on an error. Tom Galante pinch hit for Rob McGarvie and another error was committed on a bad throw on a ground ball to third (which should have been a putout at first), putting runners on 1st and 3rd. Jeff Pfeiffer was intentionally walked to fill the bases. Don Liebetrau then hit a long sacrifice fly ball to centerfield to score the winning run.

Koth got out of a jam in the 5th when he walked two batters before Mark Knuth was safe on a bunt to load them up with nobody out. But then Koth struck out the next two and Pfeiffer popped out to first.

Kewaskum reached the Sectional finals by eliminating Horicon, 6-4, in the opening round Tuesday, while West Bend shaded Oakfield, 3-2, assuring Washington County of a berth in the State Meet. The Indians teed off for all six of their runs in the first inning and then held on. Later they stranded five men on third base. Ten batters faced Horicon pitcher Karel in the first frame. The six runs were scored on four hits, an error, two walks and four wild pitches. Karel escaped with shutout ball the rest of the way.

Koth started for the Indians and with a good lead Randy Koepke took over in the 5th and was given the victory. The Koepke cousins (Randy and Mike), both juniors, drove in three of the six runs. Freshman Leon Laatsch was the only Indian with two hits. A fine leaping catch by Mike in the 6th in centerfield resulted in a double play as the runner on first was doubled up. Horicon scored one in the 5th and added two in the last of the 7th but that was it.
