Plan Commission Opposes Location Milwaukee Of Hwy. 45 By-Pass Around Village Woman Wi

The Plan Commission for the Village of Kewaskum has gone on record as opposing the location of the proposed Highway 45 by-pass west of here.

The decision came after commission members viewed the Washington County jurisdiction map at its regular monthly meeting July 30. The map shows the proposed by-pass around Kewaskum located along the west side of the proposed Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park.

Members of the commission went on record that they would prefer the by-pass be located one mile farther west in view of the fact that the proposed park will be a recreational site, and because they feel that the area west of Kewaskum is the one most likely to be developed in the future.

The proposed by-pass from the Highway 41 interchange about 10 miles south of West Bend will eliminate the bottleneck for traffic from the interchange to and around West Bend and Kewaskum.

She is a graduate of Lakeland and has 31/2 years of teaching experience, all at Sheboygan.

AFS Student Sends Letter From Austria

Doug Strack, who is spending the summer in Austria under the American Field Service Exchange Program, sent the following letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roger Strack, Kewaskum, telling of his trip and experiences:

Gramastetten, July 29, 1974 Greetings from Austria!

Sorry I did not write sooner, but life on this beautiful Austrian farm keeps me very busy. My experience started June 24th with a 21 hour bus ride from Milwaukee to New York. Approximately 20 kids from southern Wisconsin and then another 20 kids from the Chicago area rode along with me. In New York there were 500 other AFS kids starting their experience. We had a tour on Manhattan during our 1 day stay in New York. That night the students going to Austria and other European countries took off from JFK Airport. We flew into the sunrise and arrived in Brussels, Belgium at 11:00 in the morning. We were treated to a delicious lunch and our first taste of European beer. From lunch to 6:30 we toured the city.

From Brussels we boarded an overnight train bound for Linz, Austria. The train traveled along the Rhein and then across Germany, but because it was dark we couldn't see too much. Once in Linz the next morning, the 33 Americans to stay in Austria changed trains. This train took us to Spital am Phryn, a small village in the Alps. We then traveled by cable car to Wurzeralm, a ski resort, for our language orientation camp. The mountains were magnificent and looks a bit like Colorado. The kids are all very interesting and I made friends quickly, as 29 of the 33 were girls!

At this Camp we were to learn basic German and about Austrian society. The students were divided into six groups, depending on German they how much knew. I was in the second group because I had two years of Deutsch. My teacher was a young Austrian girl that did not speak much English, but we spoke German all the time anyway. The last two nights of camp we tried to learn Austrian polkas and waltzes. We had fun trying, but when we were finished we danced to American rock and roll.

Our language camp came to an end and everyone was disheartened to leave. But we were looking forward to meeting our families and we knew that we would all meet again at the end of our stay.

in Vienna. The cable car took us down the mountain and we then walked to the train station. My train took me back to Linz on the not-soblue Danube River.

There had been much rain in Austria in June and the farmers were very far behind in their hay crop. The day I arrived in Linz (July 2nd) was a beautiful day, therefore my family was in the fields and could not pick me up. Some friends that are not farmers met me at the station and took me to the farm.

My AFS family consists of 5 members. My father and mother, aunt and two brothers, Pepi, 25 and Hansi, 13. I am their 5th AFS son from the U.S.

I will try to write again soon and tell you about Austrian life and our farm. I had a special experience this weekend that I know everyone will be interested in. A few weeks ago I wrote to Gudrun Gansterer (Kewaskum's AFS student) in Vienna. I had asked her to visit our farm for the weekend of July 26th. A friend of the family, Heidi, was in Vienna and would hopefully return with Gudrun. I waited for a letter, but there was no answer. Then on Friday, we received a telephone call from Heidi that we should pick them up at the bus station. Gudrun was on vacation all this time and Heidi made many phone calls and finally succeeded to find her.

During Gudrun's brief stay. got to know her and tried to familiarize her with our area. She speaks English quite well. Saturday night we went dancing at a Sommernachtfest with friends, and I know she has the ability to get along with everyone. She is a beautiful, mature, and intelligent young woman, and we are all going to love her very much dur-



KEWASKUM STATESMAN Village Board Approves SWR Sewage System Plan

By Ruth Held Members of the village board Monday night gave their approval to a resolution which adopts the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Sewage System Plan. It carries projections from the present to the year 1990.

In looking over the goodsized volume, Village President Charles Miller noted that 13 sewage treatment plants in Southeastern Wisconsin are scheduled to be discontinued but Kewaskum's is not among them. He also noted that while some municipalities will be obliged to provide sewage systems to adjacent townships, Kewaskum will not be obliged to serve any adjacent areas, except to that which is acquired through annexation.

William Ruth and Al Tennies of Ideal Land Co. appeared and stated they have complied with all requirements set down by the board May 13 and that the Ideal subdivision at the west limits of Kewaskum is now complete. Ruth asked what direction they can now take and when they can expect to have their money, held in escrow by the village for what was then uncompleted items, returned.

lage Attorney Roger McKenna stated that the money will be returned upon receipt by the board of proof of payment for manhole covers, utilities and road graveling and upon approval by the village engineer and ultimately the village board.
