Schools in Kewaskum District To Open for All Students Aug. 26

August 26 is the opening day of school for all students in the Kewaskum District. It will be a full school day for all students.

Kindergarten classes will run from 9:00 to 11:35 in the morning, and from 1:00 to 3:35 in the afternoon. Parents will be notified shortly of the times their children will attend. All elementary schools will run from 9 a. m. to 3:35 p. m. Parents are asked to please not have their children at the elementary schools before 8:45 in the morning.

Grades 7-12 will be on a split shift to begin the year. Grades 9-12 will run from 7 a. m. to 12 noon, grades 7 and 8 from 12:10 to 5:10. Students in grades 7 and 8 are asked not to arrive at school before 12 noon to avoid unnecessary congestion in the high school building.

Lunches will be served at all buildings except Kewaskum Elementary School. Because of the building delays, the cafeteria will not be available for lunches in the Kewaskum Elementary School. Students are asked

to bring bag lunches until further notice. Milk will be available with lunches and for milk breaks.

As with everything else, lunch costs will be higher. Elementary students (grades 1-6) will pay \$2.25 per five-day ticket; students in grades 7-12 will be charged \$2.50 for a five-day ticket. A daily ticket will be 60¢ for students at all grade levels. A carton of milk will be served with meals, but additional milk and milk for breaks will be 4¢ per carton for students. Lunches will be served beginning on the first day of school, again except at the Kewaskum Elementary School.

Students and parents will be notified of bus times and pickup points shortly. These times will change for students in grades 7-12 when the new Middle School is ready for occupancy.

It is hoped the split-shift will only last a few weeks, and that schools can soon return to a more normal day and to more normal programs.

Middle, High Schools to Split Shift; Name Larsen Farmington Principal

Final preparations for opening of schools was the main topic of discussion and action at the School Board meeting held Monday evening. Times were set, lunches were set and six teacher contracts were approved.

Because the Middle School is not yet ready for occupancy, the high school and middle school will have shortened sessions again. The high school (grades 9-12) will begin at 7 a. m. and run to 12 noon. Middle School students will have school from 12:10 to 5:10. Elementary students will be in school from 9 a. m. to 3:35 p. m. in all elementary schools of the district. When the new Middle School is ready to be occupied, grades 7-12 will have a school day from 7:45 to 2:45. Elementary school times will remain the same all year.

Hot lunch prices will be \$2.25 for elementary students (grades 1-6) for a five day ticket and \$2.50 for students in grades 7-12. Lunches will not be served at Kewaskum Elementary School for the first few weeks, again due to building needs. Students are asked to bring bag lunches temporarily. Milk will be available. All extra milk will be 4¢ per carton per student this year. Daily student tickets will be 60¢. Adult tickets will be 70¢ per day, or \$3.50 for a 5 day ticket and milk will be 8¢ per carton for adults.

It was decided to have two kindergarten sessions at Wayne, three at Kewaskum, two at Farmington and one at Beechwood. Another half-time kindergarten position

was authorized.

Approval was given for ordering audio-visual and industrial arts department equipment, and building checks were approved. The vote on the industrial arts equipment was 3-2, with two abstentions.

Released time for religious instruction during study halls was approved unanimously. It was agreed to offer parent contracts for transportation home from St. John's Ev. Lutheran Church School of Newburg and Good Shepherd Ev. Lutheran School of West Bend kindergarten classes, rather than run a special bus for three students.

Tom Larsen was approved as principal of the Farmington School. Other contracts approved included:

Village Population Grows To 2,302; Gain of 112

Lightning Hits Transformer, Hail Pelts Area

A series of thunderstorms hit this area Monday afternoon. In one of them at 3:45 p. m. lightning struck a transformer on an electric pole at the south boundary line of the village sewage treatment plant adjoining the Johnson Trailer Court.

The bolt knocked loose a live wire which fell into a tree, touched the ground and sputtered in the grass before it blew a fuse and burned out. The line fed the Hon-E-Kor Country Club water pumps which were without power temporarily. Kewaskum firemen were called and remained at the scene until an electric company unit arrived. Twenty-four firemen answered the call. There was no other damage.

In an earlier storm this area was pelted by large hail which caused some damage to trees, grain, corn, tomatoes and other crops as well as other damage. Golf ball size hail was reported in some areas but was about half that size and smaller locally. Hail as large as two and five-eighths inches in diameter was reported at Newburg. Golfers at Hon-E-Kor reported that the greens looked like they were covered with ice cubes. The Wisconsin Electric Company reported that power went out in part of the Wingate Subdivision at West Bend for a few minutes and there was one other transformer burn-out from lightning.

The preliminary 1974 population estimate issued by the Wisconsin Department of Administration puts the population of the Village of Kewaskum at 2,302 persons according to data received by Village Commissioner William Martin.

This is an increase of 112 over last year's preliminary estimate of 2,190 and an increase of 376 over the actual official U. S. 1970 census count of 1,926 persons.

The estimates are based on a formula used by the state to determine how much a local unit of government will receive in shared taxes. The final 1974 population estimate will be issued in October. The final 1973 population estimate was 2,160 persons.

Village officials were satisfied with the preliminary estimate of 2,302 when the information was distributed at the August board meeting. However, one year ago when estimates came out, they felt the state estimate of 2,190 was lower than the actual 1973 population and a house-to-house population count was taken under direction of the police department. That count showed 2,296 persons living in the village, 106 more than the state's estimate.

Using the count taken by police, the village challenged the state's estimate but it was told that results of enumerations of population conducted by any group, agency, or municipality other than the Bureau of Census is unacceptable evidence to support a challenge. The village could have arranged for a special federal census but in view of the cost involved, estimated at between \$2,180 and \$2,300 for a municipality of between 1,000 and 5,000 population, board members felt it was not worthwhile.

In view of the actual but unofficial count of 2,296 persons one year ago, village officials are satisfied with this year's state estimate of 2,302 persons.

In second was Linda Secor, who was known for her running talents at Kewaskum High School. Three Asch boys took part in the bike racing. All are experienced cyclists who have toured several states on their bikes in recent years.

Another feature was a wrist wrestling contest, possibly the first ever held in the state, which was enthusiastically received by the crowd watching. Close to 20 entrants tried their skill and muscle in this event. In the division up to 150 lbs. Bruce Kramer won by pinning Jim Backhaus for the championship. In the 151-190 lb. division it was Mark Gaffke over Lloyd Kanzenbach in the finals. In the 191 lbs. and over or heavyweight division Bob Tischendorf won over Russ Kumrow.

All winners in the events were awarded trophies, while all participants were given ribbons and certificates for prizes. Racers in the marathon were also given "Kettle 20" T-shirts.

Davis Announces Rural Postal Delivery Change

"Many rural residents may now be eligible for home mail delivery service since the Postal Service liberalized its standards," Congressman Glenn R. Davis, R-Ninth District, announced last week.

"Those rural residents who live within a mile's round-trip of a carrier's route can now get their mail delivered," Davis said. Previously, only those who lived within seven-tenths of a mile round-trip from a carrier's route could get home delivery.

The change was made because of the decreasing density of rural population and the large average farm size, Davis was told by Postmaster General E. T. Klassen. Klassen said the change was an indication that the Postal Service is interested in the quality of service provided.

Those eligible for mail service should apply with their local postmaster.

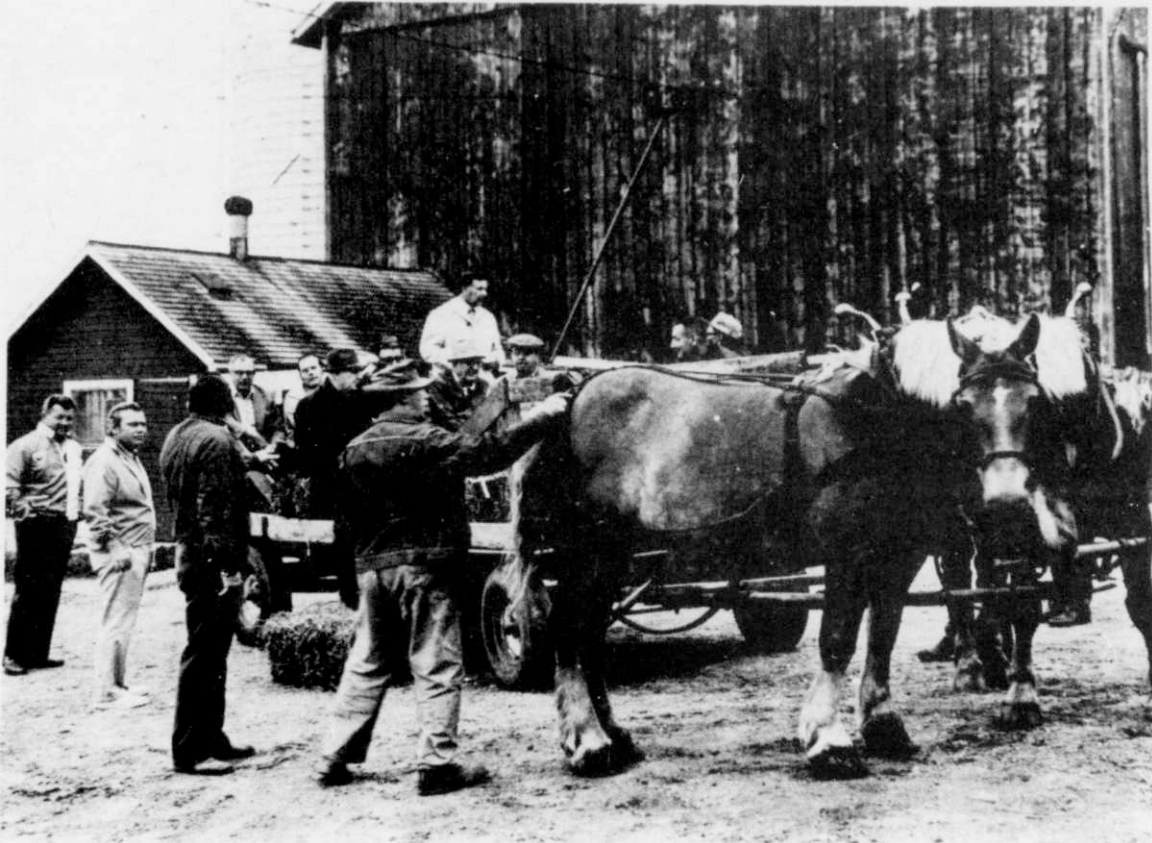

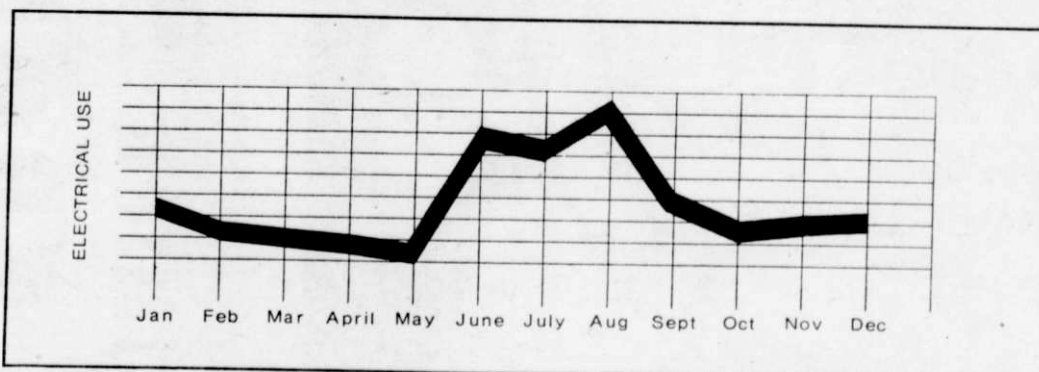

To figure the EER, divide the number of watts into the number of BTU's. The efficiency of two 7000 BTU units having metal plates like those shown above would look like this:

$$\frac{7000 \text{ BTU's}}{1000 \text{ WATTS}} = 7 \text{ EER}$$

$$\frac{7000 \text{ BTU's}}{1400 \text{ WATTS}} = 5 \text{ EER}$$

We recommend an EER of 7 or more. In the example above, the 1000 watt unit with an EER of 7 will keep you just as cool as the one with a rating of 1400 watts and an EER rating of 5, while using 40% less electricity.

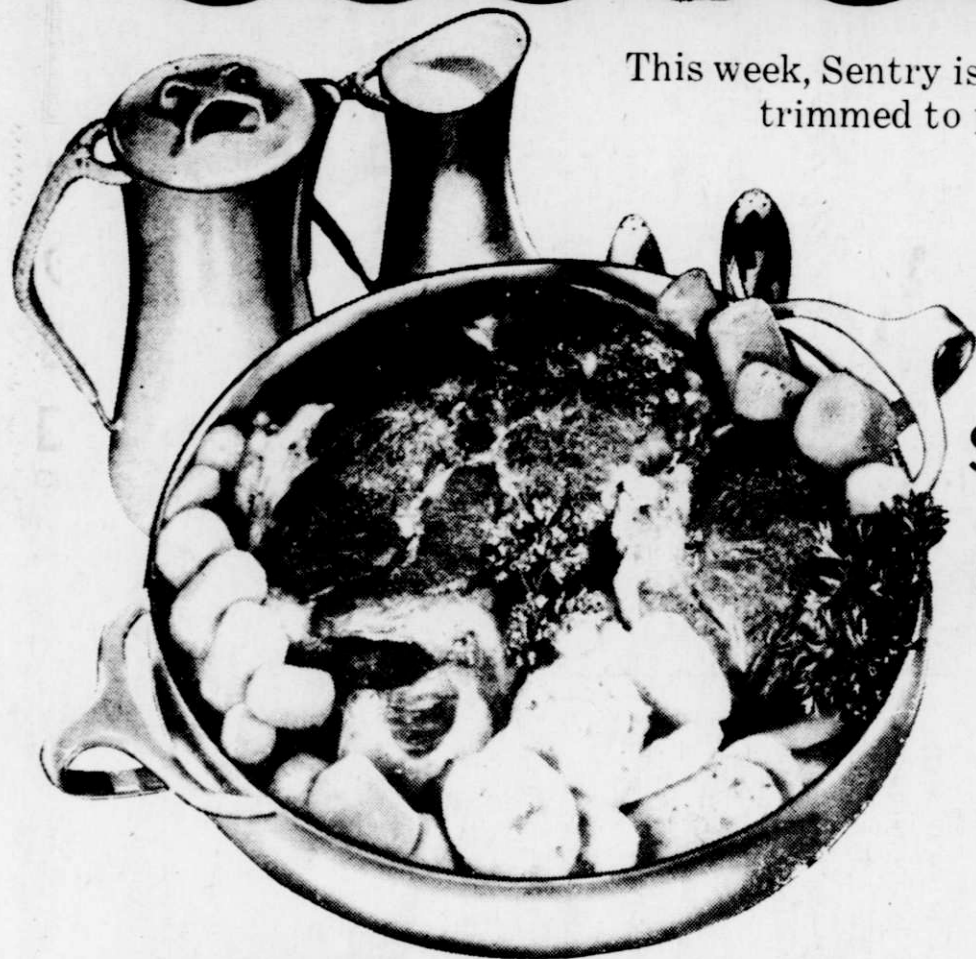

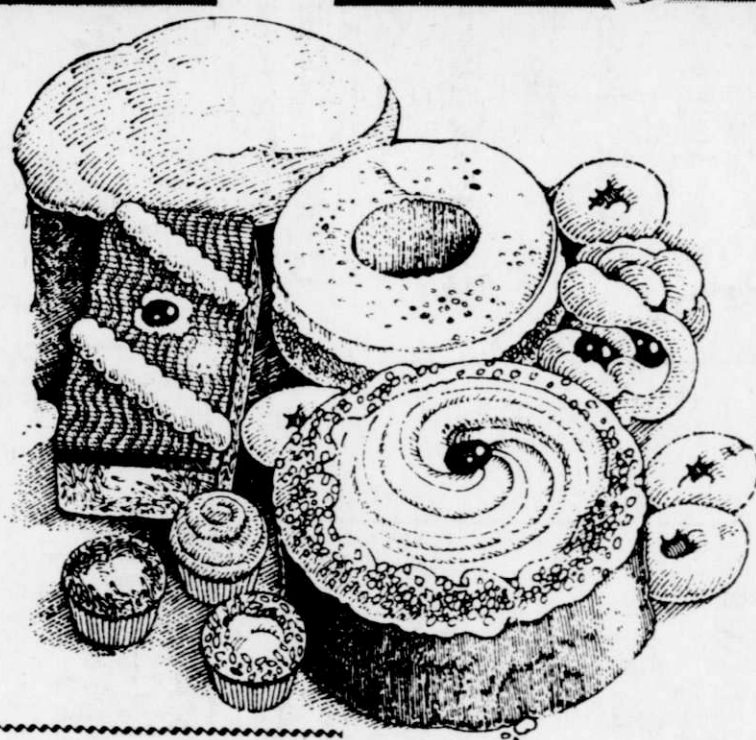


