Sr. Battaglia Schools in Kewaskum District To Open for All Students Aug. 26 Professes

August 26 is the opening day of school for all students in the Kewaskum District. It will be a full school day for all students.

Kindergarten classes will run from 9:00 to 11:35 in the morning, and from 1:00 to 3:35 in the afternoon. Parents will be notified shortly of the times their children will attend. All elementary schools will run from 9 a.m. to 3:35 p.m. Parents are asked to please not have their children at the elementary schools before 8:45 in the morning.

Grades 7-12 will be on a split shift to begin the year. Grades 9-12 will run from 7 a. m. to 12 noon, grades 7 and 8 from 12:10 to 5:10. Students in grades 7 and 8 are asked not to arrive at school before 12 noon to avoid unnecessary congestion in the high school building.

Lunches will be served at all buildings except Kewaskum Elementary School. Because of the building delays, the cafeteria will not be available for lunches in the Kewaskum Elementary School. Students are asked

further notice. Milk will be available with lunches and for milk breaks.

As with everything else, lunch costs will be higher. Elementary students (grades 1-6) will pay \$2.25 per fiveday ticket; students in grades 7-12 will be charged \$2.50 for a five-day ticket. A daily ticket will be 60c for students at all grade levels. A carton of milk will be served with meals, but additional milk and milk for breaks will be 4c per carton for students. Lunches will be served beginning on the first day of school, again except at the Kewaskum Elementary School.

Students and parents will be notified of bus times and pickup points shortly. These times will change for stu-dents in grades 7-12 when the new Middle School is ready for occupancy.

It is hoped the split-shift will only last a few weeks, and that schools can soon re turn to a more normal day and to more normal programs.

The preliminary 1974 population estimate issued by the Wisconsin Department of Administration puts the population of the Village of Kewaskum at 2,302 persons according to data received by Village Commissioner William Martin.

This is an increase of 112 over last year's preliminary estimate of 2,190 and an increase of 376 over the actual official U.S. 1970 census count of 1,926 persons.

The estimates are based on a formula used by the state to determine how much a local unit of government will receive in shared taxes. The final 1974 population esti-mate will be issued in October. The final 1973 population estimate was 2,160 persons

Village officials were satisfied with the preliminary estimate of 2,302 when the information was distributed at the August board meeting. However, one year ago when estimates came out, they felt the state estimate of 2,190 was lower than the actual 1973 population and a house - to - house population count was taken under direction of the police department. That count showed 2,296 persons living in the village, 106 more than the state's estimate.

Using the count taken by police, the village challenged the state's estimate but it was told that results of enumerations of population conducted by any group, agency. or municipality other than the Bureau of Census is unacceptable evidence to support a challenge. The village could have arranged for a special federal census but in view of the cost involved, estimated at between \$2,180 and \$2,300 for a municipality of between 1,000 and 5,000 population, board members felt it was not worthwhile.

In view of the actual but unofficial count of 2,296 persons one year ago, village

Davis Announces **Rural Postal Delivery Change**

"Many rural residents may now be eligible for home mail delivery service since the Postal Service liberalized its standards," Congressman Glenn R. Davis, R-Ninth District, announced last week.

"Those rural residents who live within a mile's roundtrip of a carrier's route can now get their mail delivered," Davis said.

Previously, only those who lived within seven-tenths of a mile round-trip from a carrier's route could get home delivery.

The change was made because of the decreasing density of rural population and the large average farm size, Davis was told by Postmaster General E. T. Klassen. Klassen said the change was an indication that the Postal Service is interested in the quality of service provided.

Those eligible for mail service should apply with their local postmaster.






