## Basketball Coach Mike Williams Resigns; 3 More Teachers Hired

The Kewaskum Board of Education accepted the resignation of Mike Williams at its special meeting Monday evening. Williams has taught social studies, coached basketball for four years and served as assistant football coach at Kewaskum High School. He has accepted a position as Principal of Wild Rose High School.

No replacement was named for the basketball position but a new coach will probably be named within a few weeks. Williams' best finish in the Scenic Moraine Conference was a second place tie in his first year in 1971 when his team had a 16-5 overall record. The team may have had a chance at gaining a berth in the Sectional tournament had it not been for an injury suffered by the Indians' top player, Clark Eichstedt. The next year the team qualified for the Sectional by defeating highly rated Sheboygan Falls in the Regional final.

Three teacher contracts were approved at Monday's meeting. Wendy Wallner will teach business education at the Kewaskum Elementary school, Zipora Filter will teach at the Kewaskum Elementary School and Kenneth Soerens will teach social studies at the high school, succeeding Williams. Soerens is a native of Cedar Grove and will also be an assistant football coach.

Since the district has not filled the Assistant High School Principal position, the board eliminated that position and created a position of teacher to handle some administrative duties and to supervise some study halls.

## Strack Writes Another Letter From Austria

Doug Strack, Kewaskum High School student, who is spending the summer in Austria under the American Field Service Exchange Program, sent another letter, which reads as follows:

Gramastetten  
Aug. 9, 1974

To the Statesman  
Hello Everyone,

As most of you know I live on a farm near Gramastetten, Upper Austria. We are about 12 miles from the industrial city of Linz. The Danube River can be seen from here. Our farm consists of 34 hectares (340,000 sq. meters), which I would guess to be near 100 acres. The farmstead itself is one main building, along with a few smaller sheds. It is square in shape, with a courtyard in the center. The living quarters are in one corner, the hogs in another corner, and the cows take up the rest of the space. In the upper part there is the hay mow, grainery, and the like. This is the typical farmstead of Upper Austria and is called Vierkanthaus. The terrain of the area is made up of large, steep hills. These hills make farming difficult as well as walking or riding a bicycle up them. Many small forests dot the countryside and it is very beautiful. It is somewhat like the Kettle Moraine, only on a larger scale.

They raise the same crops as we do in America. Wheat, oats and barley are the main grains, sometimes grown together. There is some corn, and most farmers have a small field of potatoes. The main crop is hay. It had rained very much in May, June and July, the worst in 70 years. The wet hay had to be put on wooden racks to dry. When the sun did come out, we had to take it off the racks and then collect it. On our farm we do not bale the hay, but I have seen balers in other parts of Austria. The hay is collected with a machine that sweeps it up and then stored loose in the hay mow.

Austria makes her own tractors and machinery. There are also American name tractors made in Great Britain. My family has two tractors, one Austrian make and an International Harvester made in England. Even though most farmers are quite modern, horses are sometimes used to cultivate potatoes on the steep hills.

I have been fortunate during my stay here, having many visitors. One week a girl from Delaware, that I met at the Language Camp, came to visit. During the same week my former German teacher, Mr. Schweighardt, now teaching in Germany, also visited. He then went on to Vienna and I went with my friend to visit her family in Lower Austria, very close to the

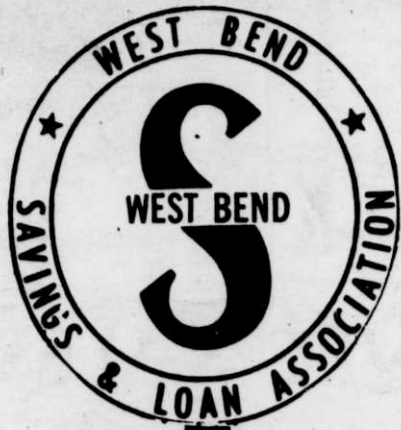

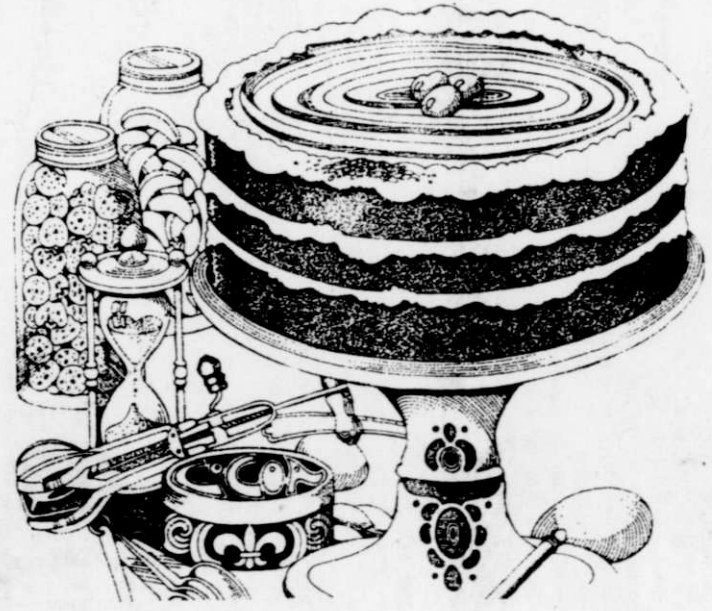

of August 1960 upon petition of the Counties of Kenosha, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Racine, Walworth, Washington and Waukesha, has the function and duty of making and adopting a master plan for the physical development of the Region; and

WHEREAS, the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission has completed and adopted a regional land use plan at its meeting held on the 1st day of December, 1966; and

WHEREAS, the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission has:

1. Collected, compiled, processed, and analyzed various types of demographic, economic, land use, natural resource base, and sanitary sewerage data and materials pertaining to the development of the Region.

2. Prepared objectives, principles, and standards for regional land and water use and sewerage system development.

3. Forecast regional growth and change as related to population, land use, and sanitary sewerage demand.

4. Developed, compared, and evaluated alternative sanitary sewerage system plans for the Region.

5. Selected and adopted on the day of March 22, 1974, a regional sanitary sewerage system plan to the year 1990; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned inventories, analyses, objectives, principles, standards, forecasts, alternative plans, and adopted plan are set forth in a report entitled, SEWRPC Planning Report No. 16, A Regional Sanitary Sewerage System Plan for Southeastern Wisconsin, published in February 1974; and

WHEREAS, the Commis-

sion has transmitted certified copies of its resolution adopting such regional sanitary sewerage system plan, together with the aforementioned SEWRPC Planning Report No. 16, to the local units of government; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, has supported, participated in the financing of, and generally concurred in the regional planning programs undertaken by the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission and believes that the regional sanitary sewerage system plan prepared by the Commission is a sound and valuable guide, not only to the development of the Region, but also of the community, and the adoption of such plan by the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, will assure a common understanding by the several governmental levels and agencies concerned and enable these levels and agencies of government to program the necessary areawide and local plan implementation work; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, did on the 22nd day of March, 1971, approve a resolution adopting the regional land use plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that, pursuant to Section 66.945 (12) of the Wisconsin Statutes, the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, on the 5th day of August, 1974, hereby adopts the regional sanitary sewerage system plan previously adopted by the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission as set forth in SEWRPC Planning Report No. 16 as a guide for regional and community development.

## Germantown Picked in Scenic; Kewaskum Could Be Contender

Germantown apparently is loaded in the backfield and as a result the Warhawks have been tabbed by football coaches as the favorite in the Scenic Moraine Conference.

Hartland Arrowhead has been given an outside chance to unseat the defending champion. Kewaskum and Mayville have the personnel to cause some trouble.

Coach Phil Datka of Germantown has quarterback Bob Kiepert and Lew Potter, flanker backs Larry Hart and Brian Krueger, fullback Kurt Kreuter and halfback Chris Canter returning.

According to Datka, the Warhawks need lots of help in the line. He reports they lost nine offensive starters and seven defensive backs and that's his problem.
