Final Teaching Positions Filled; Westphal Named Basketball Coach

Final teaching positions were filled at the School Board meeting held Monday evening. Mrs. Irene Stradtman was approved for a half-time teaching position at Beechwood, and Dan Leavitt as high school teacher to handle some study halls and certain administrative duties. Mrs. Stradtman is a graduate of Stout and Mr. Leavitt of La Crosse.

It was announced that Jim Westphal will be appointed head boys basketball coach and Neil Denniston assistant and J. V. coach. Both men have been with the district a number of years, and Westphal has been assistant and J. V. coach for the high school the past four years.

Westphal succeeds Mike Williams, who resigned two weeks ago after coaching the Indians for four years, to accept a position as principal at Wild Rose High School. Westphal is a native

of Jefferson and graduated from UW-Whitewater.

Besides basketball, Westphal also assisted in football, wrestling and baseball and took over as head baseball coach two years ago. His baseball team reached the Sectional finals this summer, losing a 1-0 extra inning game to West Bend East, which went on to lose to state champion Homestead. His J. V. basketball team the past year won the junior varsity championship with outstanding 13-1 record. Many games were won by 20 or 30 point margins as they averaged about 60 points per game. Westphal will have nine senior basketball lettermen back, four of them regulars for the entire 1973-74 season. With a nucleus of veterans and sophomores up from the J. V. team, the Indians could be title contenders.

Denniston, who is high school physical education instructor, is also head track coach at Kewaskum. He is from Pittsville and is a graduate of UW-La Crosse.

At Monday's meeting the top step of the teacher aide salary was increased by 15c, to \$2.70 an hour, and another custodial - maintenance position approved for the middle school.

Approval was given to revised lunch policies to correspond to federal free lunch policies.

Mrs. Sworske attended the meeting and expressed her opposition to candy and pop machines in schools and serving of sweets for birthdays. It was agreed to set up a committee of school personnel and others to review the question.

A petition has been filed to transfer some property from the Campbellsport School District to Kewaskum. No information was available as to the exact amount or description of the property, except that it includes pro-

Twisters Hit Nearby Areas

Tornados and thunderstorms ripped across southeastern Wisconsin, most severely in Dodge and Washington counties, Monday night, downing power lines, uprooting trees and damaging homes.

Tornados touched down in Mayville and south of Lomira in Dodge County and a unconfirmed funnel cloud was sighted at Wayne (five miles west of Kewaskum) in Washington County. One man was reported injured when strong winds overturned two mobile homes in Burnett, north of Beaver Dam. The other trailer was unoccupied.

The twisters were sighted between 9 and 10 p. m. Milwaukee and other radio and television stations interrupted their programs repeatedly to broadcast tornado warnings (not only watches) for Washington and Dodge counties. They reported the tornados were moving from west to east and Kewaskum apparently was right in the path of the storms. When they first heard of the strong winds near Beaver Dam, and then the funnel clouds mov-

ing this way, toward Mayville, to south of Lomira (near Theresa) and then to Wayne, local residents became worried and alarmed, and took precautionary measures.

Fortunately Kewaskum escaped the severe weather except for lightning and thunder which seemed to pass around to the south of us. The tornado warning was first issued until 10:30 p. m. and later was extended to 11 p. m. However, in an earlier storm, around 8:30 p. m., thunder and lightning, strong winds and hail struck the village, causing trees and limbs to be broken, some crop damage and a power failure in part of the county, including the Kewaskum, Alenton and Hartford areas. Total rainfall from the storms was reported at 1.33 inches.

The roof was blown off one home in Mayville and there was minor damage to other structures, and in Burnett in Dodge County by what was described as a "howling wind." The twister also downed wires, causing several small fires in Dodge

County. Wires were also reported down in Ozaukee and Waukesha counties and northern parts of Milwaukee County.

Last April tornados ripped through Oshkosh and the Lomira area, killing two persons, injuring at least 50 and doing an estimated \$9 million in property damage. The twisters tore a 35 mile wide path between the two towns, doing their heaviest damage in Winnebago and Dodge counties. A seven block area in Oshkosh was leveled and several houses, some barns and a lumber company were destroyed at Lomira.

School District Announces Policy for Free Meals, Milk

The Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School Dist. No. 2 has announced its policy for free meals and free milk for children unable to pay the full price for lunch and milk served in schools under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast and Special Milk programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for use in determining eligibility for free meals and free milk.

2	At or below 3,830
3	At or below 4,740
4	At or below 5,640

7	At or below 8,060

Each additional member	670

Children from families whose income is at or below those shown are eligible for free meals and milk. In addition, families not meeting this criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expense, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The informa-

tion provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has such children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, they should contact the school.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color or national origin.

Under the provision of the policy, the School Services Manager will review applications and determine eligibility.

If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendent of Schools, 1450 School Street, Kewaskum, Wisconsin 53040 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Each school and the district office has a copy of the complete policy which may be re-

viewed by any interested party.
