Plans for New Community Park In Kewaskum Take Step Forward

Plans for a new community type park in Kewaskum took a step forward Monday night. Village trustees voted to enter into agreement with Arthur and Associates of Fond du Lac to prepare a comprehensive park layout and plan for approximately 35 acres of land at the west village limits which will be known as Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park.

Village Commissioner William Martin told the board that the application by the village for a state grant has been approved by the Department of Natural Resources and that \$29,000 has been pledged through the state Outdoor Recreation Act Program (ORAP-200). That amount is to be used only toward acquisition of park land, Martin said.

When village plans have reached the development stage, it will make application for another grant toward development. Another application for a grant through the federally sponsored Land and Water (LAWCON) program has been made. To date, none has been received.

The Kewaskum Kiwanis Club in April gave the village a commitment for some \$77,000 toward park costs. But the Kiwanians will not release the money until the village has a title to the park land. The board voted last December to take a 12-month option on the land owned by Mrs. Viola Spoerl at a cost of \$2,200 per acre. The gross purchase price will be determined from a land survey made after the option is exercised.

Trustee Dan Schmidt's motion which was given unanimous approval stated further that the Arthur firm prepare the park layout after a meeting with the village board so the village may

move with all swiftness to achieve a completed park project.

Representatives of the firm appeared at the Aug. 5 board meeting to explain the services it can provide as engineering consultants. It was then that Arthur was asked what expertise his firm has in park layouts and he showed other park plans his firm has drawn up. Arthur said then that his company was started 20 years ago to serve small communities.

"No parking" signs placed earlier this summer on a portion of the east side of River View Drive leading to Hon-E-Kor Country Club brought personal complaints from residents, and as a result there will be no parking on either side of the street only for about 60 feet extending south from Main Street.

Residents claimed the no parking on the entire east side to the point where the street widens was a hardship for those families with more than one car and no extra room in driveways and garages. They noted also there is no room for visitors' cars.

Asked for his comments, Police Chief Don Hlavaty said cars parked on both sides of the street just off Main created a hazard. Not only was it impossible to see if a car was coming to the corner but with the new wider cars, one had to pull aside for another.

The matter of no parking along the east side was brought up at the Aug. 5

The regular meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education will be held Monday, Sept. 16, at 8 p. m. in the administrative offices.

A major item on the agenda will be discussion of the petition filed to transfer some territory from the Campbellsport District to the Kewaskum District. A hearing will be held by the Agency School Committees of CESA's 13 and 16 on Thursday, Sept. 19, at 8 p. m. in the Campbellsport School. The committees from the two CESA areas will rule on whether to grant or deny the petition.

Included on the agenda will be a second reading and possible action on the Internal Board Policies and Board Bylaws. There will be a report by the building committee and action as is necessary by the board.

There will also be discussion and action on the sale of a few items which were offered for bids, and the appointment of a board committee to evaluate the Middle School house plan.

Kasten Ousts Davis, Adelman, Lewis Win; Only 261 Vote Here

Only about one-fourth of the eligible voters in the Village of Kewaskum turned out to vote in Tuesday's primary election. A total of 261 votes were cast in the village.

Candidates nominated on the state ticket where there was opposition were: Democratic ticket—Lucey for governor, Schreiber for lieutenant governor, D. LaFollette for secretary of state, B. LaFollette for attorney general. There was no opposition on the state Republican ticket.

For U.S. Senator Petri easily won over Sigl on the GOP ticket. Nelson was unopposed on the Democratic ballot.

For Representative in Congress, 9th District, Adelman was nominated on the Democratic ticket and Kasten ousted incumbent Davis on the Republican ticket.

For Representative to the Assembly, 6th Dist. (which includes the Village of Kewaskum) Democratic incumbent Hephner was unopposed. There was no GOP candidate.

Nominated in the only Washington County opposition were: Democrat—Hoerig for county treasurer, Frank for clerk of circuit court; Republican—Nehrbass for county clerk and Steilen for register of deeds.

The program will be aired over channel 6-Milwaukee at 3:00 p. m. Sunday, Sept. 15. The program was videotaped last Sunday for replay this week.

Representing Kewaskum are Tom Degnitz, team captain; Ralph Butz and Dale Secor. Mark Smucker served as an alternate. All are seniors, except for Smucker, who is a junior. Their advisor is George Allmann, an English instructor.

In defeating Franklin High School, last year's champion, Kewaskum now will meet the winner of the Sept. 22 filming in the quarter final round. For the team's efforts, a \$50.00 check will be given to the school library for additional books.

This is the third time that Kewaskum has participated

in the program, which has seen some 100 schools from southeastern Wisconsin participate.

The basic philosophy of the show is one which is designed to aid the whole community and to stimulate youth to seek knowledge in today's complicated society. The show offers an opportunity for adults to witness youth's refreshing spontaneity and competitive spirit. The program attempts to stimulate interest in both academic and human affairs.

Seven rounds of competition make up the half hour program. Round one and three are general academic knowledge, round two an identification round and round four a challenge round in which each team submits two categories and the opposing team picks one for questioning. Rounds five, six and seven include people, places and current events, all at increasing levels of difficulty.

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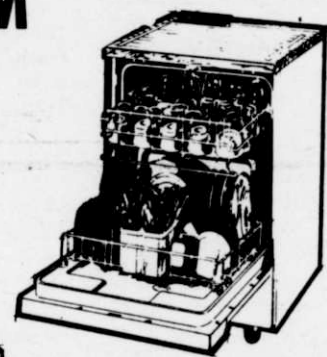
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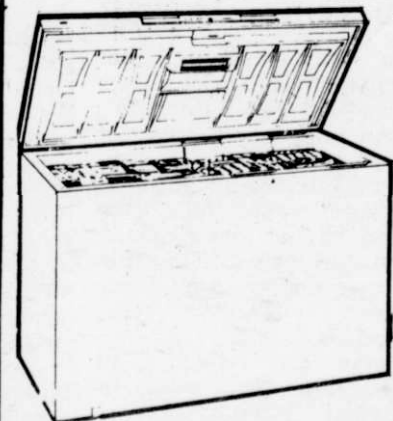


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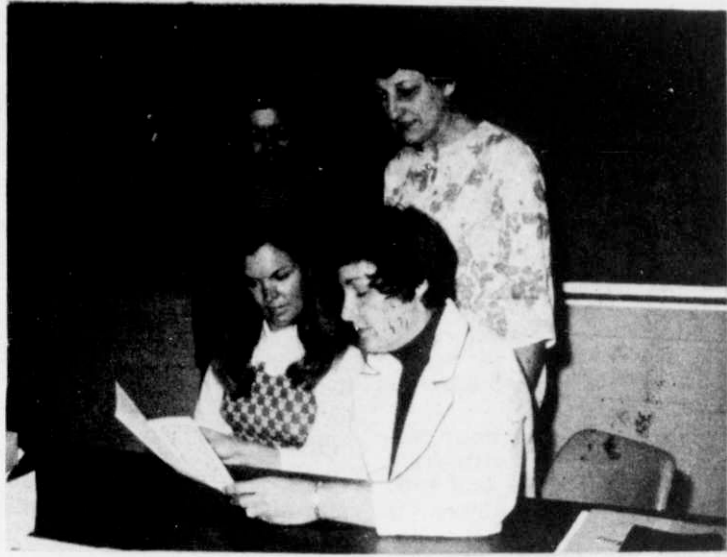
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Women Voters Begin 1974-75 Program

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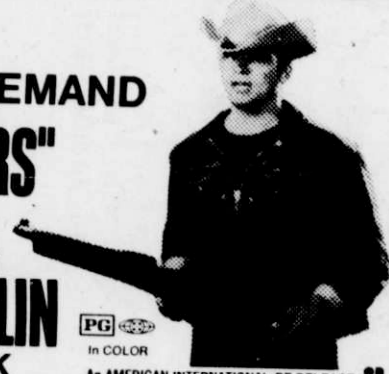

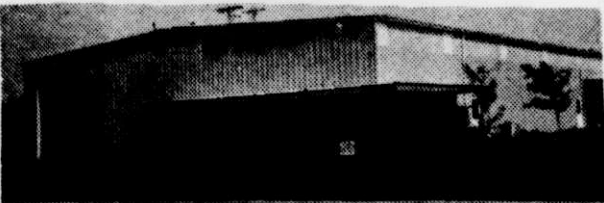

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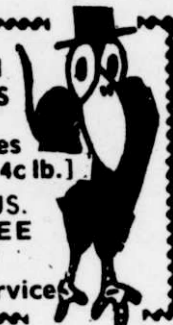

\$16,900 County Cancer Crusade Goal Surpassed

Washington County's \$16,900 Cancer Crusade goal has been surpassed again in 1974, according to final figures released this week by this year's County Crusade Chairman, Richard Semler.

Semler said \$18,700 had been raised so far. This represents 110% of the \$16,900 goal. Residential receipts totaled \$8,844; special gifts \$4,449; and \$1,557 came from memorials. The county-wide "Buckboard" campaign yielded \$3,850, up \$2,400 from last year.

Proceeds from the County Crusade go to the American Cancer Society, Wisconsin Division, of which 40% goes directly to National for Cancer Research. Part of the remaining 60% of the money goes to support cancer research programs in Wisconsin, such as that taking place at McArdel Laboratories in Madison. Another part of the remaining funds comes back to Washington County in the form of literature, films and materials to support the public education programs of the American Cancer Society. Another part of the money goes to support the service programs of Washington County which provide free cancer dressings, loan closet equipment, rehabilitation programs, patient transportation and information services for county victims of the disease.

Chairman Semler expressed his gratitude to all who assisted in making this year's drive a success. He gave special thanks to Kliner and the Washington County Tavern League for their support in this year's successful "Buckboard" campaign.

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Indians Roll Over Cougars In Football Opener, 32 to 8

The Kewaskum Indians opened the football season with an easy 32-8 victory at Campbellsport Friday night over the Cougars of the Flyway Conference.

All 37 players on the Indian squad saw action in the game with many reserves seeing most of the action in the second half. After the regulars built up a 32-8 lead, the reserves were unable to add to the score but came very close when a pass was dropped at the goal line in the closing seconds.

The Cougars threw a scare into the Indians at the start with four straight first downs but then Kewaskum stopped them and took command the rest of the way.

Kewaskum more than doubled the Cougars in total yardage from scrimmage, paced by Scott Koth, who scored three touchdowns as he ripped the Campbellsport defense for TD runs of five, seven and 27 yards. He rambled for 131 yards in 13 carries. The ground minded Indians had a 93-yard scoring drive in the second quarter. When they did take to the air they were sparked by the passing arm of Quarterback Randy Koepke with the help of a number of other individuals.

Bob Gundrum recovered a Cougar fumble on the Indian 7 yard line early in the game and this was a turning point. The Indians then drove 93 yards in six plays for a score on an 18 yard run by Koepke.

A bone-crushing tackle by John Sekeres caused another Cougar fumble in the second quarter and he scooped up the ball, running 30 yards to score. Mike Koepke's kick made it 13-0. Koth climaxed a 36 yard drive minutes later with a 5 yard scoring run to make it 19-0.

Campbellsport's lone score came on a fine 30-yard scoring pass from Jim Immel to Randy Stoffel in the end zone. The two point conversion was good. Tim Flood, who missed all of last year with a broken leg, led the Cougars with 51 yards in 10 carries.

The Indians came right back scoring on a 57 yard drive on only four plays. Randy Koepke hit on three passes and Koth scored from 7 yards out. The final TD came the first time Kewaskum had the ball in the third quarter. Koth knifed into the end zone to cap the 60 yard march. Mike Koepke

made good on one more kick to bring the Indians total to 32.

On offense the Indians open with Randy Koepke at quarterback, Gary Schmidt at fullback, Koth at tailback and Paul Stoffel at wingback. Koepke got the nod over Jim Bilgo at QB but both have looked good. Returnees Mike Koepke, Don Gruber and Jim Ciha are back in the offensive line along with Jack Westerman, Jack Kern, Keith Mueller and Tom Timblin. These boys have really been doing a job. On defense it is a front line of Timblin, Tim Ramthun, Randy Edgar, Gruber and soph Gary Gavin. Linebackers include Koepke, John Sekeres and Bob Gundrum. Deep backs are Randy Koepke, Koth and Mike Strigenz. John Kleinman and Dave Menzel were injured for the opener.

In other games involving Scenic Moraine teams Mayville edged Ripon, 7-6, Slinger shaded Horicon, 12-7, Germantown trimmed West Bend West, 21-6, Hartland ousted Waterford, 31-14, Pewaukee lost to Stoughton, 13-0, Kettle Moraine was defeated by Elkhorn, 18-9, and Grafton lost to a Milwaukee team.

Kewaskum will play its home opener this Friday night against a new and tougher opponent, JFK Prep of St. Nazianz, in another non-loop game. JFK Prep already has notched victories over Campbellsport, 20-0, and Kohler, 12-7. Game time is 7:30.

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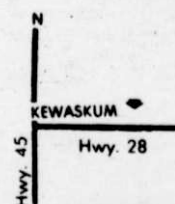
