In an adjourned session Monday night, the Village Board approved motions that approved execution of a quit claim deed that erases an easement for a drainage ditch and granted a variance on a maintenance guarantee, both with Ideal Land Co., in their subdivision at the west village limits.

The easement held for drainage purposes is no longer needed because the subdividers straightened out the ditch. Edgewood Road will be located on either side of the ditch.

The variance on the maintenance guarantee was granted after it was found that it was not possible for Ideal Land Co. to obtain a three-year maintenance bond on the underground utilities, as is called for in the village subdividing and platting ordinance. William Ruth, Sr., one of the subdividers, told the board on previous occasions that no bonding company will issue that type of bond for a three-year period. The variance calls for a one-year deposit, held in escrow, based upon 20 per cent of the total cost of the underground installations which comes to about \$9,600. Following adoption of these two motions, a third was passed accepting the agreement between Ideal

Land Co. and the village. Miller's Furniture's request that a light standard be moved from ahead of their new addition was granted with Miller's paying for costs involved. The standard may be northward to the moved nearest lot line.

Arnold Stommel was granted a building permit to equip a kitchen in the basement of his home at 1415 Roseland Drive for the purpose of baking cakes. The board approved a restricted permit last week after no objections were voiced at a public hearing on the matter.

A building permit was approved for Leroy Zipperer of West Bend to build a twounit, side by side, apartment on the corner of Bel-Ric Dr.

The property involves some 400 acres and would affect two children, both the children of Mr. and Mrs. Schmidt. The transfer includes both privately owned property and state lands. Equalized valuation of the private property would total

approximately \$250,000. There was no concensus reached by the Kewaskum Board member on a stand to be taken. Three members expressed general opposition to the petition, three reserved an opinion until the hearing. Board members expressed concern over the general idea of property transfers, generally feeling they preferred to keep school district boundaries stable.
