Kewaskum High Defeats Franklin on TV6's 'Who Knows?'



Milwaukee — Kewaskum Community High School of Kewaskum defeated last year's champion, Franklin High School of Franklin, Wis. 245-228 in a play-off match of WITI-TV6's quiz program "Who Knows?" The match was televised on Sunday, Sept. 15, at 3:00 p. m. on TV6.

By winning, Kewaskum

advances to a quarter final match and on Nov. 10 will compete against another play-off winner.

Representing Kewaskum were team captain Tom Degnitz, Dale Secor, Ralph Butz, and alternate Mark Smucker. Franklin's panelists were team captain Paul Pagel, Jim De Lopst, Craig Pollack, and alternate Lou

Jost.

"Who Knows?" is presented every Sunday afternoon at 3:00 p. m. on TV6. Since the series began in April of 1967, one hundred high schools in Milwaukee and southeastern Wisconsin have competed on "Who Knows?" and have won over \$11,500 in prize money. The library

of the winning school receives \$50 and the loser \$25.

The moderator of "Who Knows?" is Tony Karr. Dr. Ed Midura of the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee serves as authoritarian for the show and prepares questions from school textbooks and the Encyclopedia Britanica.

Over 400 Birds Taken at Turkey Shoot Sunday

Despite quite cool weather the 22nd annual Kewaskum Kiwanis Turkey Shoot at the Bar-N Ranch Sunday was another fine success. It is expected that the proceeds will equal or exceed that of last year's shoot.

It was reported there were 500 more shooters this year than last year and the gross take should exceed last year's figure of \$12,000. However, the profit may be a little less due to higher costs.

All 400 turkeys were taken home and an additional 5 had to be ordered to give to the winners. The food stands were also emptied because of increased business and the ammunition was almost exhausted when the shoot was brought to an end. As a result the shoot ended earlier than usual. About 260 trout were caught in the trout pond by anglers of all ages.

The Kiwanis sponsors various youth activities with the profits from the shoot. The club this year also pledged some \$70,000 to the Village of Kewaskum for a new park.

Awarded Short Course Scholarship

More than \$13,000 in scholarships has been awarded to 64 Wisconsin young people to attend the University of Wisconsin - Madison Farm and Industry Short Course.

The scholarships are awarded on a state-wide competitive basis, according to Maurice E. White, assistant dean in the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences and Short Course Director.

The 1974-75 term begins Nov. 18. Nearly 60 courses in

industry and all phases of agriculture are offered each year with some 20 to 25 courses offered during each of three 5-week sessions. Short Course graduation is March 15, 1975.

Scholarship funds are awarded at one-third of the amount for each of the three 5-week terms, according to White.

The 64 scholarship winners included Elizabeth Faber, Kewaskum (\$300 Atwood Scholarship).

Following the ceremony a reception was held at Nonn's Resort, Dundee.

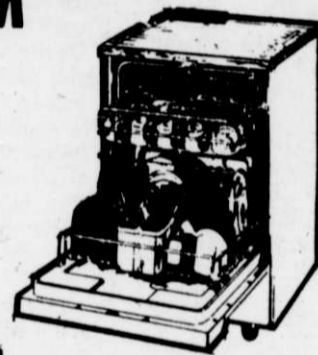

Indians Crush Slinger, 45-6, In Opening Conference Game

Kewaskum didn't give a "hoot" about the Owls as the Indians "tomahawked" Slinger in their opening Scenic Moraine game here Friday night, 45-6. It was strictly no contest as the Indians ran roughshod over the Owls for 7 touchdowns.

A happy Parents Nigh crowd witnessed the rout. Parents of the players and cheer leaders were introduced prior to the game and refreshments were served after it was over.

It was the third straight victory for Kewaskum, all by one-sided scores. The Indians now have totaled 104 points in 3 games while holding their opponents to a slim 20. Kewaskum led at the half, 25-6, and added 20 more points in the second half as they scored in every quarter.

The Indians rolled up over 400 yards total offense while holding Slinger to 116. Kewaskum had 17 first downs compared to the Owls' 5 and held them to just 2 yards passing. The Indian quarterbacks completed 8 of 16 passes.

Slinger took the kickoff and was stopped in their first series, forcing them to punt. Kewaskum took over on their own 26 yardline and wasted little time getting on the board. With quarterback Randy Koepke mixing his plays well, the Indians drove 74 yards in 9 plays for a score. Koepke took it over from the 8.

On the Owls' next series, they fumbled and Jim Kern recovered for Kewaskum on the Slinger 26. Koepke immediately went to work and hit his cousin, Mike Koepke, with a 26-yard pass on the next play. A little later Dave Menzel blasted in from the one.

The Owls, who failed to get a first down in the first quarter, were forced to punt again minutes later. Kewaskum put together a 53-yard drive, with Scott Koth scoring from the 6. Menzel added another TD in the second quarter, making the score 25-0.

Slinger finally got a score with seconds remaining before the half. A 2-yard pass from Jack Held to Tom Lucas on a 4th down play gave the Owls their only score of the night.

The Indians added another score in the 3rd period when Koth dashed 39 yards to cross the goal line. After the kickoff, Slinger got in one play when sophomore defensive end Leon Laatsch grabbed the ball in mid air on a mixup in the Slinger backfield and rambled 22 yards for another score. Laatsch scored a second TD on a pass from Jim Bilgo, reserve quarterback. Mike Koepke kicked 3 extra points in the game.

Koth was the game's leading rusher with 149 yards in 10 carries. He now has scored 8 touchdowns in 3 games and has a total of 501 yards rushing. Randy Koepke added 71 yards in 8 carries. For Slinger, Steve Rahlf had 59 yards in 13 carries.

In other Scenic openers on Friday, Germantown downed

Pewaukee without any trouble as expected, 27-0, and Mayville surprised by squeaking past Hartland, 7-1.

This Friday night (7:30) Kewaskum gets its first real test of the season when Hartland comes here. Arrowhead had been picked as a leading contender to unseat Germantown, although upset by Mayville last week.
