Present Building and Budget Report at School Board Meeting

port was presented at the Board of Education meeting held Monday evening, as well as a report on the meeting of the committee set up to review nutritional questions raised by Mrs. Sworske.

The budget report was favorable in that it was possible to make cuts in some salary areas with final staffing figures available. Also, an additional \$18,000 is anticipated in building fund interest. Because of the increased costs, some of the monies will be used for blacktopping and other increasing cost items. At present, the revised budget would also call for a tax levy decrease of between \$9,000 and \$10,000. However, the state aids are not yet set and the equalized valuations are not yet known, so final budget figures are still open to further revisions.

It was reported that the move into the Farmington addition is planned for the coming weekend.

The proposal of Payne and Dolan for blacktopping and graveling was accepted. The proposal was for \$33,975 for approximately 12,926 square yards to be graveled and blacktopped. There will also be about 950 lineal feet of curb and gutter at \$4.70 a lineal foot. A second proposal was from Scott Construction for 14,781 square yards for \$50,175.99. Drawings were used by the companies to determine square yards, and final area will be determined by actual measure-ment of the site.

The Board suggested that investigation be made of installing milk, juice and fruit vending machines to provide students alternates to the candy machine. This action came as a result of the report of the committee meeting held on nutrition. 2 Seniors Named Merit Commended Students at KHS

Two seniors at Kewaskum Community High School School have been named Merit Program Commended students by the National Merit Scho-

larship Corporation. Principal Clark A. Pearsor announced that the following students have received Letters of Commendation: Ralph A. Butz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Butz and Julie A. Zarling, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Zarling.

These students are among the 38,000 Commended Students named on the basis of their high performance on the 1973 Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT). Commended students are in the upper 2 percent of those who are expected to graduate from high school in 1975. Although the Commended students ranked high on the PSAT/NMSQT, their scores were just below those of the 15,000 semifinalists who were announced in September by NMSC; Commended students do not continue in the Merit Scholarship competition.

To increase their scholarship opportunities NMSC reports the Commended students' names to the regionally accredited colleges they named as their first and second choices when they took the PSAT/NMSQT in October 1973. The reports include home addresses, test scores, and anticipated college major and career intentions of the Commended students.

Regal Promotes Kewaskum to Host Badger Firemen's Exposition Sunday

The Western District of the West Bend, ladders; Jackson, Badger Firemen's Association will hold its 2nd annual exposition in Kewaskum on Sunday, Oct. 6, at 1:30 p. m. The expo will be held on the parking lot between Hon-E-Kor and the village park.

Village Board Holds Hearings to Change Zoning Dist.. Rezone Property

Two public hearings were held here by the Village Board Monday night, one to change a zoning district, the other to rezone property in the Ideal Subdivision.

No opposition was expressed by various property owners present from adjacent areas. Both proposals now go before the village trustees where the final course of action would be passing an ordinance updating the village zoning map.

It is proposed to change the zoning district for the east side of Fond du Lac Avenue which lies north of the Second Street intersection on to the north village limits from M-1 (light manufacturing) to B-3 (central community retail business and services). This action was initiated by the Plan Commission and Village Board.

Zoning Administrator Richard Zarling explained that any residence in the district involved comes under nonconforming usage in that its present status can be con-tinued if the building is not changed more than 50 per cent of its value.

The revised zoning would apply only if, in the future,

any existing residence were torn down or removed. In essence, the proposed change would extend the commercial area of the village. Present zoning does not permit any type of retail business or service in the district in-volved. It was pointed out that the west side of the street is already zoned commercial.

Clarence Prost, owner of a duplex at 1622 Fond du Lac Ave., raised the question of what happens to the value of his property if rezoned. He was told that in view of the fact that zoning is actually being upgraded, his property value would most likely be upgraded.

James Jaeger, also a property owner in the area, said changing the zoning district

'sounds like a good idea."
Ideal Land Co. has petitioned for rezoning of a triangular shaped piece of land, resulting from the straightening of Edgewood Road, to make it conform with the surrounding existing area.

The village zoning ordinance was passed in 1972. Village Attorney Roger Mc-Kenna commented changes such as these are not out of the ordinary in that "you don't get everything right the first time around,"
